The Office of Council District Seven has worked continuously with the Los Angeles Neighborhood 5 Land Trust (Trust) and the Bureau of Sanitation (BOS) to revitalize a City owned vacant lot in Mission Hills. This site has been identified as a brownfield site, which are parcels of land that are likely tainted with the presence of hazardous substances, pollutants, or contaminants. The site location is at 10702 N. Sharp Avenue in Mission Hills. The BOS has completed its initial due diligence on the parcel(s) via the Citywide Brownfields Program and has already identified contaminants and has determined the site is ready for remediation.

Through the Citywide Remediation Program, BOS intends to utilize the services of Ensafe, Inc. from its recently approved consultant bench to implement the cleanup plan. The Ensafe, Inc. scope of work includes, in addition to the cleanup plan, community notification, excavation and soil sampling, dust monitoring and overall administrative oversight of the project.

I THEREFORE MOVE that the Bureau of Sanitation be authorized to execute an agreement with Ensafe, Inc. for \$350,000 to continue the brownfield remediation cleanup plan at 10702 N. Sharp Avenue in Mission Hills and related components of the remediation project including its completion.

I FURTHER MOVE that \$350,000 be transferred/appropriated from the Council District 7 portion of General City Purposes Fund No. 100-56, Account No. 000A28 (Council Projects), to the Integrated Solid Waste Management Trust Fund No. 556-50, Account No. 50YMBA (Brownfields - Sharp Avenue), for work associated with the above contract, which may include environmental analysis, development of a cleanup remediation plan, and project administration for the remediation of the brownfield property located at 10702 N. RESOLUTION

WHEREAS, California Vehicle Code Section 22507 authorizes cities to restrict the parking of vehicles, including but not limited to, vehicles that are six feet or more in height, on identified City streets during certain hours; and

WHEREAS, certain residential street segments in Council District 8 are experiencing an increased problem with oversized vehicles parking during all hours of the day and night, blocking visibility, constricting travel lanes, and blocking the safe exit and entrance to driveways, thereby creating dangerous situations; and

WHEREAS, California Vehicle Code 22507 requires that with the exception of parking restrictions in alleys, a resolution that restricts the parking of vehicles, including but not limited to six feet or more in height, during all or certain hours of the day/night, will apply in areas in which signs are posted giving notice of the restrictions;

NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, that the City Council, pursuant to California Vehicle Code Section 22507, prohibits the parking of vehicles that are in excess of 22 feet in length or over 84 inches in height, during all hours of the day and night, on the following streets:

- On the south side of West 115th Street between South Figueroa Street and Denver Avenue;
- On the south side of West 115th Street, 500 feet east of Hoover Street; and
- West Gage Avenue between South Western Avenue and South Van Ness Avenue.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that upon adoption of this Resolution, the Department of Transportation be directed to post signs giving notice of the above restrictions for oversized vehicles; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Department of Transportation be authorized to make technical corrections or clarifications to the above instructions in order to effectuate the intent of this Resolution.

RESOLUTION

WHEREAS, California Vehicle Code Section 22507 authorizes cities to restrict the parking of vehicles, including but not limited to, vehicles that are six feet or more in height, on identified City streets during certain hours; and

WHEREAS, the Los Angeles Municipal Code Section 80.69.4 allows the Council to authorize by resolution, the streets upon which the parking of oversize vehicles shall be restricted between 2:00 a.m. and 6:00 a.m.; and

WHEREAS, on February 21, 2023, the City Council approved a resolution that established oversized vehicle parking restrictions between 2:00 a.m. and 6:00 a.m. on West 22nd Street between South Normandie Avenue and South Vermont Avenue; and

WHEREAS, this residential segment continues to experience problems with oversized vehicles parking during all hours of the day and night, blocking visibility, constricting travel lanes, and blocking the safe exit and entrance to driveways, thereby creating dangerous situations, and these issues will be more appropriately addressed through more restrictive signage;

NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, that the City Council, pursuant to the Municipal Code Section 80.69.4, and the California Vehicle Code Section 22507, hereby rescind the resolution prohibiting the parking of vehicles that are in excess of 22 feet in length or over 7 feet in height, during the hours of 2:00 a.m. to 6:00 a.m., on 22nd Street between South Normandie Avenue and South Vermont Avenue.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the City Council, pursuant to California Vehicle Code Section 22507, hereby prohibits the parking of vehicles that are in excess of 22 feet in length or over seven feet in height, during all hours of the day and night, along both sides of 22nd Street between South Normandie Avenue and South Vermont Avenue; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that upon adoption of this Resolution, the Department of Transportation be directed to remove the existing oversized parking restriction signs and post new signs giving notice of the above restrictions for oversized vehicles as detailed above; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Department of Transportation be authorized to make technical corrections or clarifications to the above instructions in order to effectuate the intent of this Resolution.

Safe Parking LA facilitates public-private partnerships to provide overnight access to underutilized parking lots for community members whose only source of shelter is their vehicle. Safe Parking LA sites also offer much-needed access to restrooms, running water, case management and related supportive services to help clients transition back to stable housing.

Beit T'Shuvah, a non-profit residential treatment program, has partnered with Safe Parking LA to provide critical transitional housing services and access to its gated parking lot at 8936 National Boulevard, for over 5 years.

In January 2025, Beit T'Shuvah was donated a prefabricated, American with Disabilities Act (ADA)-compliant restroom and shower unit for use by Safe Parking LA clients at the site. However, the Los Angeles Department of Building and Safety (LADBS) has classified the donated restroom and shower unit as a "temporary structure," which limits its use to a maximum of 180 days in accordance with Los Angeles Municipal Code Section 91.106.1.3.

Allowing this unit to serve the needs of Safe Parking LA clients beyond 180 days is a public benefit that aligns with the City's strategic objectives for addressing its declared homelessness emergency. It provides a critically needed hygiene service, improves public health, fosters dignity, and helps de-escalate the crisis in the surrounding area. Even more beneficially, Beit T'Shuvah providing the unit as a donation accomplishes these goals without a financial burden to the City.

I THEREFORE MOVE that the Council, in recognition of the City's housing emergency, instruct the Department of Building and Safety (LADBS) to grant an administrative waiver of Municipal Code Section 91.106.1.3 (*Temporary Permits*), to allow the prefabricated American with Disabilities Act (ADA) compliant restroom and shower unit located at 8936 National Boulevard, Los Angeles, CA 90034, to remain in place, so long as a public benefit is provided by Beit T'Shuvah, at the subject property.

The City of Los Angeles spends a significant amount of General Fund revenue each year on legal services, including settlement payouts, outside counsel contracts, and staffing for the City Attorney's Office. As the City continues to face significant fiscal challenges, we must explore alternative models for legal service delivery that promote long-term cost containment, efficient case management, and improved accountability.

In 2011, Council File 11-1127 initiated a review of legal service delivery models in comparable municipalities. That motion and report highlighted the importance of evaluating the structure, scope, and cost of legal services across jurisdictions to identify potential best practices. More than a decade later, the City's legal liabilities and associated expenditures continue to be a major driver of General Fund pressure, underscoring the need for renewed and expanded analysis.

To that end, the City must conduct a comprehensive, multi-year evaluation of alternative legal service models that looks beyond Los Angeles and adopts best practices from other large municipalities. This effort must prioritize long-term cost containment, improved caseload management, and measurable accountability.

I THEREFORE MOVE that the City Council instruct the Chief Legislative Analyst (CLA) and City Administrative Officer (CAO), with assistance from the Office of the City Attorney as necessary, to report back in 30 days with recommendations for a multi-year strategy to restructure and modernize the City's legal service delivery model. This strategy must include, at a minimum:

- Evaluation of alternative models for settlements, including potential delegation of settlement authority thresholds and administrative reforms to eliminate costly delays;
- A strict framework for the strategic use of outside counsel, including mandatory cost-effectiveness analysis, engagement criteria, and strengthened contract oversight;
- A comprehensive long-term staffing plan for the City Attorney's Office that addresses
 caseload realities, reduces reliance on outside counsel, and ensures accountability for
 results;
- Comparative research on legal service models in other large municipalities, with a focus
 on governance structures, cost drivers, performance outcomes, and lessons learned that
 Los Angeles can and should adopt; and
- A review of policy options for the Charter Reform Commission to consider for broader structural reforms of legal service delivery.

I FURTHER MOVE that this report include recommendations for convening an advisory panel to the City Council of former senior City administrators, former City Attorneys, and independent legal and finance experts to ensure that external perspectives inform structural reform. This panel should be tasked with challenging existing assumptions, benchmarking Los Angeles against its peers, and identifying concrete reforms to strengthen accountability and reduce costs.
