

MOTION

In 2016, California voters approved Proposition 64, the Adult Use of Marijuana Act (AUMA). With the passage of Proposition 64, adults 21 years of age or older can legally grow, possess, and use cannabis for non-medicinal purposes. In addition, AUMA also made it legal to sell and distribute cannabis through a regulated business beginning on January 1, 2018.

With the passage of the AUMA and the passage of a follow-up bill by the California State Legislature in June 2017, the Medicinal and Adult-Use Cannabis Regulation and Safety Act (MAUCRSA) was formed. MAUCRSA created a single regulatory system that governs the medical and adult-use cannabis industry in California.

In order to participate in Commercial Cannabis Activity within the City of Los Angeles (City), both a state and a local license is required. In Los Angeles, the City's Department of Cannabis Regulation (DCR) processes and issues commercial cannabis licenses under guidelines established by the City Council found in LAMC section 104. Section 104.19, establishes the fees and fines associated with application and license filing fees payable to the city.

The Mayor's Fiscal Year (FY) 2021-2022 Proposed Budget, estimates that over \$150 million will be generated by the Cannabis Business Tax that is composed by permit and license approvals by DCR and through new business growth. There are some states which have set aside a portion of their cannabis tax revenue for community reinvestment.

The state of Illinois' created the Restore, Reinvest, Renew Program, or R3 in April of 2019 which set aside 25% of cannabis tax revenue to fund grants for violence prevention, reentry, youth development, economic development and civil legal aid services in areas of need, defined by rates of gun injuries, child poverty, unemployment, and incarceration rates. A few months ago the state of New York, followed suit, and dedicated 40% of its cannabis tax revenue to minority communities that had disproportionate numbers of marijuana arrests.

In an effort to decrease disparities in life outcomes for marginalized communities, and to address the disproportionate impacts of communities harmed by the decades of criminalization of cannabis, the City should explore establishing a similar policy as the states of Illinois and New York, and dedicate a portion of its cannabis tax revenue to be reinvested into these communities.

I THEREFORE MOVE that the City Council instruct DCR, with assistance from the Chief Legislative Analyst (CLA) and the City Administrative Officer (CAO), to report on the feasibility of allocating a portion of the City's Cannabis Business Tax (CBT) to fund programs which serve communities that have been disproportionately harmed by the criminalization of cannabis, similar to the models that have been established by the states of New York and Illinois.

HOMELESSNESS AND POVERTY

MOTION

The City of Los Angeles received \$85,013,607 from the State of California Homeless Emergency Aid Program (HEAP), the State's first homeless grant allocation. The grant provided three (3) years to expend 100 percent of these funds, June 30, 2021. Any funds that are unexpended will be recaptured by the State of California. The City has used these funds to finance the construction and services for interim housing sites through A Bridge Home (ABH) Program and the COVID-19 Homelessness Roadmap, as well as homeless prevention, hygiene services and other crucial services for people experiencing homelessness.

The City Administrative Officer (CAO) has confirmed that \$135,981.74 from the HEAP set-aside for Skid Row must be reprogrammed and expended by June 30, 2021, to avoid losing these funds to recapture. These savings are derived from funds allocated to the Downtown Women's Center to provide rapid rehousing and related services to women on Skid Row. It is recommended that these savings be allocated to purchase equipment needed to establish four (4) cooling centers Skid Row to operate during the summer months. This motion also recommends \$583,233 in General Fund savings from a previous General City Purpose allocation for construction of a completed A Bridge Home project to pay Homeless Healthcare Los Angeles (HHCLA), through the ReFresh Spot contract, to operate the cooling centers in 2021. Operations include program staff during operating hours for 16 hours per day, and security for the 24 hours per day.

I THEREFORE MOVE that the City Council APPROVE the following State of California Homeless Emergency Aid Program (HEAP) reprogramming actions to ensure that the full amount of the City's HEAP allocation is expended by the statutory June 30, 2021 deadline:

- REPROGRAM \$33,279 allocated to the Los Angeles Homeless Services Authority for the Downtown Women's Center to provide rapid rehousing and related services to approximately 150 women in the Skid Row community, to HEAP Activity Category 2 - Capital and Operating Support - Skid Row (Activity Category 2);
- REPROGRAM \$5,700 allocated to Bureau of Sanitation for the cost of operations of a six (6) sharp collection boxes in Skid Row at four (4) Pit Stop locations, The Bin, and the ReFresh Spot to HEAP Activity Category 2;
- 3. REPROGRAM \$1,230.40 allocated to Board of Public Works for Mobile Pit Stop Program in Skid Row in Fiscal Year 2019-20 (\$1,025.40) and 2020-21 (\$205), to HEAP Activity Category 2;
- 4. APPROVE \$135,981.74 in savings (\$40,209.40) and reserved balance (\$95,772.34) from HEAP Activity Category 2 Capital and Operating Support -

MAY 1 1 2021

Skid Row to the Los Angeles Homeless Services Authority Homeless for the Health Care ReFresh Spot Program as follows:

- a. \$126,981.74 for furniture, fixtures, and equipment at four (4) cooling center sites in the Skid Row area:
- b. \$9,000 for one-time landscaping costs for sawcutting and planting trees for the ReFresh Spot in the Skid Row area.

I FURTHER MOVE that the City Council approve the following reprogramming actions to support the operations of the Skid Row cooling centers in 2021:

5. REPROGRAM \$583.233 in savings allocated to the Capital Improvement Expenditure Program Fund No. 100/54, Account No. 00S704 for the construction of the A Bridge Home site located at 828 Eubank Street in Council District 15, to HEAP Fund No 60P/43, Account No. 43S850 for the Homeless Health Care Los Angeles ReFresh Spot Program through Los Angeles Homeless Services Authority for the cost of labor associated with the four (4) Cooling Centers in Skid Row area from June 1, 2021 through August 31, 2021;

I FURTHER MOVE that the Council INSTRUCT the General Manager, Housing and Community Investment Department, or designee, to amend Contract no. C-133135 with the Los Angeles Homeless Services Authority to decrease the Downtown Women's Center Rapid Rehousing by \$33,279 and amend the necessary contract to increase funding for the Skid Row - Homeless Health Care Los Angeles ReFresh Spot by \$719,214,74 to establish and operate four (4) cooling centers in Skid Row through August 2021; and

WHEREAS, any official position of the City of Los Angeles with respect to legislation, rules, regulations or policies proposed or pending before a local, state or federal governmental body or agency must first have been adopted in the form of a Resolution by the City Council with the concurrence of the Mayor; and

WHEREAS, a 2018 California statewide poll conducted by the California Health Care Foundation and the Kaiser Family Foundation found that mental health care access is one of the top issue priorities in the minds of Californians; and

WHEREAS, the proliferation of mental health issues among the state's burgeoning homeless population has contributed to the public's understanding that mental health care has been underfunded and inadequately attended over the more than half-century since the state began restructuring how it addressed the needs of people with mental illness and/or mental health disorders; and

WHEREAS, a series of legislative initiatives – the Short-Doyle Act (1957), the Lanterman-Petris-Short Act (1968), the establishment of Medi-Cal (1965), the Bronzan-McCorquodale California Realignment Act (1990), and the Mental Health Services Act (Proposition 63 - 2004) – reconceptualized how and to what extent funding was redistributed to counties to provide mental health care, subject to Proposition 13 (1978) limits and the impacts of recessions over the years; and

WHEREAS, in addition to these laws creating unfunded or insufficiently funded local mental health care mandates, the Lanterman-Petris-Short Act has made it more difficult to provide involuntary treatment to our most vulnerable Californians, and Medi-Cal red tape has discouraged counties from applying for full funding reimbursements for which they would otherwise qualify to the tune of leaving up to \$100 million in federal pass-through funds unspent per year; and

WHEREAS, counties are overly dependent on five remaining state hospitals and a disconnected network of private clinics to provide housing and services for persons experiencing mental health issues, which clearly is not meeting the need; and

WHEREAS, on March 20, 2020, the City Council approved CF 19-0002-S187 (Koretz-Ryu), including in the City's 2019-20 State Legislative Program, support for legislation that would simplify Medi-Cal reimbursement procedures for counties, simplify institutionalization procedures, stabilize state mental health funding at levels sufficient to meet the needs of counties, and re-involve the state in the provision of community-based facilities to house and treat persons experiencing mental health issues; and

WHEREAS, the City should continue this effort in the new legislative session and support bills in harmony with its intent, including AB 822 (Rodriguez) which aims to improve Medi-Cal-related mental health services and reimbursements; SB 293 (Limon) which would simplify Medi-Cal specialty mental health application procedures; SB 106 (Umberg) which would simplify access to state mental health "innovation funds" for cities and counties; AB 1340 (Santiago) which would among other provisions, expand the definition of "gravely disabled," require the State Department of State Hospitals to create a model discharge plan for Counties, and clarify the use of Proposition 63 funds for these purposes; and AB 988 (Bauer-Kahan) which streamlines the procedures for obtaining help for those in crisis;

WHEREAS, the Protection of Lawful Commerce in Arms Act (PLCAA), which was signed into law in 2005, shields the gun industry from legal liability; and

WHEREAS, the PLCAA contributes to the ongoing gun violence epidemic in the United States by enabling the gun industry to evade accountability at the expense of victims and survivors of gun violence; and

WHEREAS, the gun industry has successfully argued that this law provides the industry immunity from civil liability, even when an entity has caused harm through negligence, the sale or manufacture of defective products, or irresponsible behavior; and

WHEREAS, in an effort to address this problem, HR 2814 (Schiff)/S. 1338 (Blumenthal), the Equal Access to Justice for Victims of Gun Violence Act, was introduced to repeal the sections of the PLCAA that have been interpreted by courts in such a way to give these extraordinary and unnecessary protections from liability to the gun industry; and

WHEREAS, HR 2814/S. 1338 would also permit victims and responsible industry actors to use gun trace data from the Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco and Firearms (ATF) in civil proceeding, which can show whether or not industry actors have acted irresponsibly; and


WHEREAS, HR 2814/S. 1338 would create more paths to justice and recovery for victims and survivors of gun violence; and

WHEREAS, HR 2814/S. 1338 would incentivize good business practices and make sure that irresponsible actors in the gun industry can be held to account;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, with the concurrence of the Mayor, that by the adoption of this Resolution, the City of Los Angeles hereby includes in its 2021 - 2022 Federal Legislative Program SUPPORT for HR 2814 (Schiff)/S. 1338 (Blumenthal), the Equal Access to Justice for Victims of Gun Violence Act, which would ensure that the gun industry is not shielded from liability when it acts with negligence and disregard for public safety.

WHEREAS, H.R. 1280 would have a significant impact on how policing is conducted in the United States, and would make it much easier for officers who abuse their authority or who engage in criminal activity to account; and

WHEREAS, the reforms included in H.R. 1280 are long overdue, and would ensure that police officers nationwide are held to a high standard, address certain practices by police officers that are unnecessarily dangerous and are no longer used, and that those that have been impacted by police misconduct can seek redress;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, with the concurrence of the Mayor, that by the adoption of this Resolution, the City of Los Angeles hereby includes in its 2021 - 2022 Federal Legislative Program SUPPORT for H.R. 1280 (Bass), the George Floyd Justice in Policing Act of 2021, which would hold law enforcement accountable for misconduct in court, improve transparency through data collection, and reform police training and policies.

WHEREAS, currently pending before the California State Legislature is AB 800 (Gabriel) which would require the California Department Forestry and Fire Protection to define and designate "moderate" and "high" fire severity zones, expanding the geographic areas of concern in the State's Safety Element reviews; and

WHEREAS, in Los Angeles, the immediate danger of wildfires, their environmental harms, and their aftermath continue to pose a notable, active risk to numerous residents during fire season; and
