- AUTHORIZE the Controller to transfer \$750,000 from the Liability Claims Fund No. 100/59, Account No. 009798, Miscellaneous Liability Payouts, to Fund No. 100/59, Account No. 009792, Police Liability Payouts.
- 3. AUTHORIZE the City Attorney to draw a demand from Fund No. 100/59, Account No. 009792, Police Liability Payouts, as follows: The Cochran Firm California and Jesse Pelaez, Nicholas Ramirez, and Rebecca Tollison in the amount of \$750,000.
- 4. AUTHORIZE the City Administrative Office, or designee, to make necessary technical adjustments; and, AUTHORIZE the Controller to implement the instructions.

MOTION

On October 7, 2021, the Board of Harbor Commissioners will consider a proposed First Amendment to Revocable Permit No. 19-10 between the Harbor Department and Toll Global Forwarding SCS, Inc. (Toll) for premises located at 2401 E. Pacific Coast Highway in Wilmington. The Revocable Permit allows Toll to use and occupy approximately 85 acres of Harbor Department property that is comprised of land and warehouses to operate a transloading and warehousing facility. The First Amendment would extend the expiration date of the Revocable Permit from October 7, 2021 to January 31, 2022.

On September 13, 2021, the Harbor Department released a Request for Proposals for a successor permit for these premises. Responses were due October 1, 2021. Toll expressed interest in continuing its tenancy while staff completes the solicitation process. The Harbor Department recommends a short-term extension to the Revocable Permit to address supply chain congestion until a new tenant is selected. In light of the aforementioned congestion, Council should act to waive its review of the anticipated Board of Harbor Commissioners action on this matter to avoid exacerbating the issue. Further, Council should act immediately on the matter to avoid any potential interruptions to business.

I THEREFORE MOVE that the Council determine, as provided in Government Code Section 54954.2(b)(2), and pursuant to Rule 23 of the Rules of the City Council, that there is a need to take immediate action on this matter AND that the need for action came to the attention of the City Council subsequent to the posting of the agenda for today's Council meeting.

I FURTHER MOVE that, pursuant to Charter Section 245 (b), the Council hereby RESOLVE to waive review of the anticipated October 7, 2021 action of the Board of Harbor Commissioners to approve the First Amendment to Revocable Permit No. 19-10 between the Harbor Department and Toll Global Forwarding SCS, Inc. for premises located at 2401 E. Pacific Coast Highway in Wilmington.

On June 8th, 2021, Council adopted CF# 21-0464 which authorized the Board of Public Works to amend the contract with BMC Landscaping to make improvements to the Huntington Drive Median in El Sereno. Since that time, the contractor has identified additional work that is required to repair the medians including the need for additional soil and irrigation repair. Additionally, the contractor will be providing lighting installation for the city on city trees and other infrastructure.

MOTION

The Public Works Bureau of Sanitation (LASAN) provides services to ensure the health and safety of our residents, communities, and the environment. Critical services include the collection and recycling of solid resources materials for residential customers and City departments, as well as the collection, treatment and recycling of wastewater.

Based on an analysis of current payroll records associated with the performance of the above services, LASAN has determined that the current amounts for the As-Needed and Overtime Salaries Accounts are insufficient for the remainder of the fiscal year. Staff shortages and additional workloads have necessitated increased use of overtime and as needed salaries. While a transfer of funds to meet this need is anticipated in the City Administrative Officer's First Financial Status Report, a transfer is necessary before then to meet LASAN's immediate payroll obligations. Savings within LASAN's Salaries General Account and Expense and Equipment Account have been identified to fully cover this transfer.

I THEREFORE MOVE that the City Council, subject to the approval of the Mayor, authorize the Controller to transfer funds as follows:

WHEREAS, the below listed locations are experiencing a need for enforcement against the above listed prohibitions; and

WHEREAS, the Council hereby finds that the public health, safety, or welfare is served by the prohibition, and further finds that sleeping or lodging within the stated proximity to the designated area(s) is unhealthy, unsafe, or incompatible with safe passage; and

WHEREAS, the Office of Council District 5 has submitted / posted to the File relevant documentation, as further detailed in the Code, that the circumstances at these locations pose a particular and ongoing threat to public health or safety:

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, pursuant to §41.18 (c) of the Los Angeles Municipal Code that the Council hereby designates the following locations for enforcement against sitting, lying, sleeping, or storing, using, maintaining, or placing personal property, or otherwise obstructing the public right-of-way, up to the maximum distance and effective for the maximum period of time prescribed, and as further detailed in the Code:

- 1. Westwood Park, 10999 Rochester Avenue Public Park
- 2. Military Avenue and the 10 Freeway Underpass

3. 8580 Burton Way (Burton Way median from S. Clark Drive to S. San Vicente Boulevard) – Public Right-of-Way

- 4. Holt Avenue from Burton Way to 3rd Street Public Right-of-Way
- 5. 8216 Beverly Blvd (Southeast corner of Beverly and Harper, adjacent to LADWP Facility) Sidewalk

6. 2247 Pontius (between Tennessee Avenue and Olympic Boulevard) - Sidewalk

Bicycle theft is a continuing problem across the City, with large numbers of bicycles being reported stolen each year, and even more being stolen but not reported to the authorities. Unfortunately, the majority of stolen bicycles are not recovered, due in large part to thieves quickly disassembling them and selling them. Bicycle "chop shops," spaces where individuals take apart stolen bicycles, sell parts and reassembled bicycles, operate across the City, often right in the public right-of-way. Thieves have little or no fear of repercussions, as this activity is not expressly illegal and police do not have the resources to check every bicycle being disassembled in the street against lists of those that have been reported stolen.

The City of Long Beach had similar issues, and in 2018, adopted an ordinance prohibiting the operation of bicycle "chop shops" on public property or within the public right-of-way, with specified exceptions for licensed businesses and for individuals making repairs or present while repairs are being made to their own bicycles.

I THEREFORE MOVE that the City Attorney be requested to prepare and present a draft ordinance to prohibit the assembly, disassembly, sale, offer of sale, distribution of bicycles and bicycle parts on public property or within the public right-of-way, modeled after a similar ordinance in the City of Long Beach.

El Pueblo is the historic center of the City, and one of its most important cultural monuments. El Pueblo serves as a celebration of the Native American, African, American, Spanish, Anglo, Mexican, Chinese, Italian, and French cultures that contributed to the early history of Los Angeles. Olvera Street is a Mexican marketplace with street vendors, cafes, restaurants, and gift shops, that rely on foot traffic for business. As a result, the COVID-19 pandemic has been especially difficult for El Pueblo merchants, including the restaurants, who could not easily convert to a takeout model.

The City Council has previously acted to provide relief to the merchants of El Pueblo. It is important that the Council continue to act to preserve these businesses, many of which are familyowned legacy businesses with decades old contracts with the City. These merchants drive people to El Pueblo and provide a space to appreciate the El Pueblo's cultural and historical significance to Los Angeles.

I THEREFORE MOVE that the City Council:

- 1. Instruct the Economic Workforce Development Department to include the El Pueblo de Los Angeles Historical Monument merchants in their outreach plan for small business assistance grant programs.
- 2. Authorize the Department of El Pueblo de Los Angeles (Department) to temporarily reduce the rent rates for its merchant tenants by 60 percent for the period July 1, 2021 through December 31, 2021 ("Temporary Reduced Rent"), which equates to a Department revenue loss of approximately \$412,000, and additionally have any rent received from merchant tenants between July 1, 2021 through December 31, 2021, which is greater than the Temporary Reduced Rent amount, credited towards future tenant rent payable with all other terms and conditions of the Concession Agreements remaining in full force and effect.
- 3. Instruct the General Manager of the El Pueblo de Los Angeles, with the assistance of the City Attorney, to take the necessary steps to effectuate the intent of this Motion.
- 4. Instruct the Office of the City Administrative Officer to report on the fiscal impact of the Temporary Reduced Rent to the Department's budget, and identify a funding source to offset the aforementioned impact in the next Financial Status Report.

It is unfortunate that Facebook continues to refuse to deal with the harmful failures of their platforms. Media reports have revealed that Facebook, Inc., executives know that their popular Instagram photo-sharing program is toxic for young women and girls. They know that 32 percent of teen girls said that, when they felt bad about their bodies, Instagram has made them feel even worse. Instagram makes body image issues worse for one in three girls; teens blame Instagram for increases in the rate of anxiety and depression. These assertions have been proven by Facebook's in-house analysts.

Media reports further show that Facebook has actual knowledge that they are collecting personal information online from children under 13 years of age. This information and more disturbing practices are being revealed to Congress by a well-informed whistleblower from within Facebook. This organization 's lack of governance and profit motivated vision has caused the company's leadership to ignore everything they know about the real world.

Facebook's internal research revealed a strong correlation between use of their platforms and some forms of deteriorating mental health in kids and teens. Between 2009 and 2019, the percentage of high school students who experienced ``persistent feelings of sadness or hopelessness'' increased by more than 10 percent. The percentage of high school students who seriously considered attempting suicide increased by 5 percent. Numbers regarding suicide plans and suicide attempts also trended in the wrong direction. And even less severe mental health crises can lead to risky sexual behavior, drug use, truancy, delinquency.

Given this disturbing track record and the dangers it poses to our children, it is appropriate for the City to consider divestment form any investments in Facebook and its affiliated organizations.

I THEREFORE MOVE that the City's three pension fund systems and any other City investment entity, in coordination with the City Administrative Officer and the Office of Finance, be directed to begin the process of divestment of any of the City's funds which may be currently invested in Facebook and its affiliated companies.

The United States experienced its largest year-over-year increase on record in homicides in 2020, according to new figures released by the F.B.I., with many cities hitting record highs. There were an additional 4,901 homicides in 2020 compared with the year before – the largest increase since national tracking started in 1960 – roughly coinciding with the 18 months of the Covid-19 pandemic. And about 77 percent of reported homicides were committed with a firearm, the highest share ever reported, and up from 67 percent a decade ago.

The City of Los Angeles is no exception to this trend. There were 351 homicides last year in Los Angeles compared to 258 in 2019, and according to LAPD data, the 285 homicides that have occurred in the first nine months of 2021 represent a 36 percent increase over the 182 that took place over the same timeframe in 2020. These numbers are a more than 30 percent jump from 199 homicides that took place in the first nine months of 2019. Of the homicides this year, 73.2 percent involved the use of a firearm, and young Black and Latino men are dying at disproportionate levels. Nearly 55 percent of victims have been Latino, 33 percent have been Black, and 63 percent of those who died were between the ages 18-39.

Although there is no simple explanation for the steep rise in gun related deaths, the pandemic has certainly played a role, causing economic and psychological stress, forcing people together for longer periods of time and creating a climate of uncertainty and unease. Millions of Americans lost their jobs, businesses and, in some cases, their housing, and the widespread sense of desperation helped fuel social tension and crime. These factors coupled with a sharp increase in firearm purchases in the last 18 months created a perfect storm for the gun violence we see on our streets every day.

While the number of homicides in the city is well below that of the 1990s – Los Angeles and New York accounted for 13.8 percent of the country's homicides in 1990, compared with 3.8 percent in 2020 – even one life lost to gun violence is too many. In response to the surge seen in the 1990s, the City launched a variety of social, youth and community sustainability programs intended to curb gun violence, such as LAPD's Jeopardy Program, the increased use of gang intervention workers, the Mayor's Office of Gang Reduction and Youth Development, and gun buy-back programs, among others.

In light of the recent uptick in gun violence in Los Angeles, it is necessary to understand the effectiveness of the gun violence prevention efforts the City has undertaken in order to ascertain best practices and better direct resources going forward.

I THEREFORE MOVE that Council REQUEST the City Controller, with the assistance of LAPD and the City Attorney as needed, to undertake an audit of all previous and ongoing gun violence prevention programs and policies implemented in the City of Los Angeles to determine the efficacy of those programs and make recommendations related to the allocation of funding and resources to ensure the City's gun violence prevention efforts are as effective and extensive as possible.

Ocean Front Walk is a treasured public resource that attracts visitors from all over the region and the world. It is also a busy and congested place with residents, businesses, and visitors all coexisting in a narrow strip of coastal land. For this reason, Ocean Front Walk has many special rules designed to protect public safety and maintain the boardwalk's unique character.

Ocean Front Walk is reserved for the exclusive use of pedestrians; bicycles and other motorized devices are banned. Nevertheless, bicycle rentals have long been a popular attraction for visitors to enjoy on the Marvin Braude Beach Bike Path located near Ocean Front Walk. In recent years, vendors have begun offering rentals of other devices, such as electric scooters and Class 3 e-bikes, which are not legal to ride on the beach bike path or Ocean Front Walk. Use of electric scooters, Class 3 e-bikes and other motorized devices creates a public safety hazard for pedestrians on Ocean Front Walk and other users on the Bike Path. The City has, with considerable effort, successfully geofenced shared mobility devices permitted under LADOT's dockless mobility program from riding in restricted areas. However, these private rentals of similar devices are unregulated and lack GPS capability for geofencing.

More needs to be done to ensure that tourists and other visitors are aware of rules prohibiting certain devices from being ridden on Ocean Front Walk and the beach bike path. The greatest responsibility should fall on the businesses that rent such devices on or near Ocean Front Walk to notify their customers at the time of rental decision. Additionally, the City should prohibit certain business practices that imply the banned devices are legal to ride on the beach.

I THEREFORE MOVE that the City Council request the City Attorney to prepare and present an ordinance to require businesses located in the Venice neighborhood that rent motorized scooters, electric personal assistive mobility devices, e-bikes, or similar devices that are prohibited from either Ocean Front Walk and/or the Marvin Braude Beach Bike Path to comply with the following requirements:

- Require businesses to notify customers prior to rental, both verbally and via prominently displayed in-store signage, of the legal limitations on the use of the device being rented on either Ocean Front Walk and/or the beach bike path.
- Require businesses to include notice in the rental agreement, and require specific customer acknowledgement by separate signature or initial, of all limitations on the use of the device.

The following additional restrictions shall apply to businesses located within 500 feet of Ocean Front Walk:

- Ban the business from displaying outside of the premises any device that cannot be ridden legally on Ocean Front Walk or the beach bike path unless the device has a notice alerting potential renters of the restrictions on the use of the device.
- Require an employee of the business to transfer custody of the restricted device to a customer at least 100 yards from Ocean Front Walk or the beach bike path.

RESOLUTION

RULES, ELECTIONS & INTERGOVERNMENTAL RELATIONS

WHEREAS, any official position of the City of Los Angeles with respect to legislation, rules, regulations, or policies proposed to or pending before a local, state, or federal governmental body or agency must have first been adopted in the form of a Resolution by the City Council with the concurrence of the Mayor; and

WHEREAS, an oil spill reported Saturday off the coast of Huntington Beach originated from a broken pipeline that runs from the Port of Long Beach to a platform called Elly, located in the Beta Field, nine miles from the coast; and

WHEREAS, the spill caused at least 126,000 gallons of crude oil to spill into coastal waters creating a 8,320 acre oil slick; and

WHEREAS, oil from the spill is causing vast ecological damage, infiltrating Talbert Marsh, a 25-acre ecological reserve in Huntington Beach home to dozens of species of bird, including gulls, willets, elegant terns and reddish egrets; and

WHEREAS, drilling in the Beta Field, discovered by a consortium led by Shell Oil Co. in 1976, began in 1980 and oil production started in January 1981; with the field in waters overseen by the U.S. Department of the Interior; and

WHEREAS, Elly is one of 23 oil and gas platforms installed in federal waters off of the Southern California coast, with 20 others that produce oil and gas, and two are being decommissioned, and Elly is one of three platforms run by the Beta Operating Company, which also operates platforms Ellen and Eureka nearby; and

WHEREAS, no new offshore oil drilling has been approved in federal waters off the state coastline since 1984; and

WHEREAS, Senator Dianne Feinstein (D-CA) proposed a bill in January that would permanently ban the Department of the Interior from allowing new leases to allow for the exploration, development or production of oil or natural gas off the coast of California, Oregon and Washington state; and

WHEREAS, President Biden issued an executive order creating a temporary moratorium on new federal oil and gas drilling leases, including federal waters off the West Coast; and

WHEREAS, existing oil and gas drilling off of the California coast continues to pose a risk to wildlife, public health, and tourism;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, with the concurrence of the Mayor, that by the adoption of this Resolution, the City of Los Angeles hereby includes in its 2021-2022 State Legislative Program SUPPORT for any federal administrative or Congressional action that would permanently bar new leases for the exploration, development, or production of oil or natural gas in coastal waters of the United States; and, which would decommission existing oil and gas pipelines and platforms in any coastal waters in the United States.

WHEREAS, Southern California has already irreversibly warmed 3 degrees Fahrenheit in the last century; and

WHEREAS, In the absence of urgent action to reduce greenhouse gas emissions, the Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change (IPCC)'s 2021 Sixth Assessment Report indicates that global warming is likely to accelerate in the coming century, reaching up to 10.3 degrees Fahrenheit above pre-Industrial levels by 2100; and

WHEREAS, Due primarily to its reliance on fossil fueled propulsion, the international shipping industry is one of the world's largest climate polluters, emitting 1 billion metric tons of carbon dioxide a year, more than all coal plants in the U.S. combined; and

WHEREAS, The international shipping industry's pollution is on the rise and is expected to comprise 17% of global carbon dioxide emissions by the 2050's without urgent action; and

WHEREAS, Most cargo ships burn heavy fuel oil, a tar-like waste that remains after all the transparent road fuels like gasoline and diesel are taken out of crude oil; and

WHEREAS, Los Angeles is home to the largest port complex in the nation, the San Pedro Port Complex, with 40% of containerized cargo imports to the United States coming through the Ports of Los Angeles and Long Beach; and

WHEREAS, For decades, fossil fueled ships have brought enormous amounts of pollutants into disproportionately low-income communities of color living in and near ports, including the Ports of Los Angeles and Long Beach; and

WHEREAS, Ship pollution contributes to at least 1,300 premature deaths each year in Los Angeles and Long Beach and an estimated 260,000 premature deaths each year globally, in addition to exacerbating structural health inequities and contributing to higher rates of childhood asthma, cancer, and other ailments in American port communities; and

WHEREAS, Los Angeles and Long Beach port-adjacent communities, including San Pedro, Wilmington, and West Long Beach, experience up to 8 years lower life expectancy than the Los Angeles County average and the highest risk of cancer regionally; and

WHEREAS, By 2023, marine vessels are expected to account for the majority of smog-forming nitrous oxide (NOx) pollution in the South Coast South Coast Air Quality Management District's regulated air basin, surpassing heavy duty trucks; and

WHEREAS, Fossil-fueled ocean shipping harms oceanic wildlife, contributing to the death of coral reefs globally and causing marine animals to have lower sensory ranges; and

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WHEREAS, According to a 2021 study by environmental organizations Pacific Environment and Stand.earth, the top 15 maritime import polluters to the United States in 2019 by pollution volumes were Walmart, Ashley Furniture, Target, Dole, Home Depot, Chiquita, IKEA, Amazon, Samsung, Nike, LG, Redbull, Family Dollar, Williams-Sonoma, and Lowes; and

WHEREAS, According to the same study, in 2019, these top 15 maritime import polluters produced as much sulfur oxide pollution as 2 billion trucks and cars; and

WHEREAS, A substantial majority of American shoppers (84%) believe that the shipping industry should do more to reduce the environmental impacts of global shipping goods according to a 2020 Yale University, George Mason University, and Climate Nexus poll; and

WHEREAS, The Los Angeles Green New Deal aims to achieve an 80% reduction in port greenhouse gas pollution by 2050; and

WHEREAS, The Los Angeles 100% Renewable Energy Study calls for 100% renewable energy practices citywide by 2045, in order to promote a breathable environment for all Angelenos; and

WHEREAS, Zero-emission shipping is expected to become available by 2024, creating a tremendous economic opportunity and source of quality jobs, including 316,700 jobs nationally over 10 years according to a 2021 UC Berkeley Goldman School of Public Policy report; and

WHEREAS, The IPCC maintains that we have until 2030 to transform our economy and the way we live to avoid the most catastrophic and irreversible effects of the climate crisis;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, with the concurrence of the Mayor, that by the adoption of this Resolution, the City of Los Angeles hereby includes in its 2021-2022 State Legislative Program support for legislation or administrative action to rapidly decarbonize the maritime shipping industry and to create zero-emission shipping corridors along the California coast, the West Coast of the United States, and across the trans-Pacific trade route; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the City of Los Angeles calls on top maritime importers to Los Angeles—including Walmart, Ashley Furniture, Target, Dole, Home Depot, Chiquita, IKEA, Amazon, Samsung, Nike, LG, Redbull, Family Dollar, Williams-Sonoma, and Lowes—to: (1) immediately adopt existing emissions-reducing technologies, including wind-assisted propulsion

and slow-steaming, and (2) commit to making all port calls to the San Pedro Port Complex on 100% zero-emissions ships by 2030.
