COMMUNICATION FROM THE LOS ANGELES HOUSING DEPARTMENT (LAHD) and RESOLUTION relative to the State of California Department of Housing and Community Development Homekey Program and recommendations to secure funding.

Recommendations for Council action, SUBJECT TO THE APPROVAL OF THE MAYOR:

1. APPROVE the following funding sources and amounts, upon receipt and availability, for Homekey local match requirements for property

acquisitions, closing cost, due diligence, and property management costs incurred for successful Homekey Program applications:

- a. \$59 million of Proposition HHH funding.
- b. \$10 million of Community Development Block Grant CARES (CDBG-CV) Act Program.
- c. \$60 million of Home Investment Partnerships Program (HOME)– American Rescue Plan (ARP).
- d. \$16.2 million of CDBG reprogrammed funds as described in Recommendation No. 5 below.
- 2. AUTHORIZE the General Manager, LAHD, or designee, to enter into a Professional Services Agreement, Attachment A of the subject LAHD report, dated October 25, 2021, attached to the Council file, which is to be reviewed and approved by the City Attorney as to form and legality, with the Housing Authority of the City of Los Angeles (HACLA); outlining the roles and responsibilities as co-applicants per the State of California Homekey Program Notice of Funding Availability.
- 3. AUTHORIZE the General Manager, LAHD, or designee, to apply on behalf of the City to the State of California Homekey Program Notice of Funding Availability, with the HACLA serving as the co-applicant, for a maximum amount of up to \$252.03 million. This amount includes \$206.25 million for capital expenditures, \$30.78 million in capitalized operating subsidies, and \$15 million in bonus funds for capital and operating. The City will prioritize the purchase of properties that can be quickly placed in service as supportive housing.
- 4. AUTHORIZE the General Manager, LAHD, or designee, to issue loans to HACLA for a total amount not to exceed \$15 million to be used as Homekey local match requirements for HACLA property acquisitions Homekey applications.
- 5. INSTRUCT the Community Investment for Families Department to return with a recommendation to allocate up to \$16.2 million of CDBG-reprogramming funds to be used for Homekey local match requirements.
- AUTHORIZE the General Manager, LAHD, or designee, to release a Request for Proposals (RFP, Attachment B of the subject LAHD report), to select qualified owner and operators for awarded Homekey projects.

- 7. REQUEST the City Attorney to work with LAHD to develop a purchase and sale agreement, deed of trust, promissory note, regulatory agreement, and any other necessary legal documents to transfer ownership of approved Homekey Program properties to the selected operators with financing to ensure the City's interests and the sites' use meet the goals and requirements of the City and the Homekey Program.
- 8. REQUEST the City Attorney to work with LAHD to develop a promissory note deed of trust, regulatory agreement, and any other necessary legal documents to execute loan agreements with HACLA to purchase Homekey properties, ensuring the City's interests and the sites' use meet the goals of the City and the Homekey Program.
- ADOPT the accompanying RESOLUTION (see Attachment C of the subject LAHD report), as required by the State of California Department of Housing and Community Development, in order to submit the Homekey program application.
- 10. INSTRUCT LAHD to report back on specific properties and to request approval of the individual authorizing resolutions for each successful project, prior to executing the Standard Agreement with the State of California.
- 11. AUTHORIZE the LAHD to prepare Controller instructions and make necessary technical adjustments, including to the names of the Special Fund accounts recommended for the subject LAHD report, consistent with the Mayor and Council action in this matter, subject to the approval of the City Administrative Officer (CAO), and request the Controller to implement these instructions.
- 12. INSTRUCT the CAO to identify available funding for a total amount not to exceed \$86,116,000 to be used for local match requirements, due diligence, rehabilitation, and operating reserves to bring the total number of Project Homekey Round 2 units from 450 to 750.

There are three employees on the DPT pay level, and two employees have continuously been compensated on the CO salary through the Clerical Unit Article 33 Temporary Assignment upgrade provision to perform essential printing duties. The approval of this provides for a permanent solution to eliminate the continuous need to upgrade employees on the temporary assignment provision of the MOU. Since the two employees have been previously compensated at the CO salary, there is no fiscal impact. The fiscal impact for the salary adjustments

for the DPT is \$179.22 per month, with an annual fiscal impact for three (3) employees at \$6,451.92.

# HOUSING

#### MOTION

The property located at 600 North Broadway, Los Angeles, CA 90012, commonly known as Cathay Manor, is a 16-story high-rise apartment building occupied by senior citizens, some of whom are disabled. The two elevators serving Cathay Manor are currently inoperative, creating unsafe and hazardous conditions that make daily life extremely difficult for approximately 250 vulnerable senior citizen residents.

Under the Urgent Repair Program, the Los Angeles Housing Department (LAHD) issued an order to the property owner to have the elevators operational by October 21, 2021. Since then, the LAHD, Council Office, and other city agencies have attempted to work with the owner to make the elevators operational as soon as possible. However, unprecedented conditions such as the disruption in the global supply chain and the gridlock at the ports of Los Angeles and Long Beach, have led to further delay, prolonging the unsafe/hazardous conditions for the senior residents at Cathay Manor.

Under the Urgent Repair Program, if conditions are not abated in a timely manner, the LAHD has the authority to designate a contractor preselected by LAHD to make the repairs using the funds from the Urgent Repair Program. All costs incurred pursuant to the Urgent Repair Program are charged to the owner of the property, recoverable by the City in an action before any court of competent jurisdiction. In addition, the City may collect any judgment, fee, cost, or charge, including any permit fees, fines, late charges, or interest, incurred under the Urgent Repair Program as provided in Los Angeles Administrative Code Sections 7.35.1 through 7.35.8.

LAHD has successfully secured several bids to repair/modernize the elevators. However, there are not enough available funds in the Urgent Repair Program fund account to move forward.

I THEREFORE MOVE that the Los Angeles Housing Department be authorized to transfer / appropriate Foreclosure Registry Penalty Fees- within the Foreclosure Registry Fund (F56V/43), Appropriation Account 43V559 - Urgent Repair Program, amounting to \$1Million, to contract on an emergency basis with a qualified elevator repair company to (1) immediately restore elevator service on a temporary basis with the approval and cooperation of LADBS, and (2) to the extent feasible repair the elevator(s).

I FURTHER MOVE that such costs will be reimbursed to the Foreclosure Registry Fund upon repayment (1) by the owner of direct costs, permit fees, interest, and related costs, plus 40 percent of the cost to perform the actual work to cover the City's costs for administering any contract and supervising the work required, as provided in Administrative Code Section 7.35.3.(c) and under Los Angeles Municipal Code Section 50.00.C.5, and/or (2) through execution of a lien on the property as provided in Administrative Code Section 7.35.3. et seq.

I FURTHER MOVE that the Los Angeles Housing Department Director of Accounting be authorized to make any technical corrections or clarifications as necessary to the above instructions to effectuate the intent of this Motion.

#### RESOLUTION

# RULES, ELECTIONS & INTERGOVERNMENTAL RELATION

WHEREAS, any official position of the City of Los Angeles with respect to legislation, rules, regulations, or policies proposed to or pending before a local, state, or federal governmental body or agency must have first been adopted in the form of a Resolution by the City Council with the concurrence of the Mayor; and

WHEREAS, on March 4, 2020, Governor Newsom declared a State of Emergency related to the novel coronavirus (COVID-19) pandemic; and

WHEREAS, emergency executive orders required Californians to shelter in place except to meet essential needs thereby impacting local, state, and national business activity; and

WHEREAS, social distancing and shelter in place requirements required the closure of nonessential businesses including bars, dine-in restaurants, and shops, and subsequent employee layoffs have impacted the ability of customers to stay current on utility payments, while at the same time shelter in place orders have caused increased usage of utility services: and

WHEREAS, publicly owned utilities and water agencies across California suspended utility shut-offs in response to the COVID-19 pandemic; and

WHEREAS, on May 10, 2021, Governor Newsom announced his California Comeback Plan, which contained significant funding from the federal American Rescue Plan, and was subsequently approved with several new programs providing billions of dollars in financial assistance that specifically address utility bill debt that has accrued during the pandemic; and

WHEREAS, in July 2021, the State Water Board received \$985 million for a California Water and Wastewater Arrearage Payment Program (CWWAPP) and the Department of Community Services and Development received approximately \$993 million for the California Arrearage Payment Program (CAPP) to address electricity and natural gas debt; and

WHEREAS, the Department of Community Services and Development conducted a survey of publicly owned utilities to obtain data on the total number of residential and commercial customer accounts in arrears statewide and issued the results of the survey on October 28, 2021; and

WHEREAS, among public utility and electric cooperatives, the Department of Water & Power (DWP) maintains 68 percent of the total arrearages among applicants, amounting to approximately \$311.7 million; and

WHEREAS, the CAPP program notice indicates that DWP will receive an allocation of approximately \$202.7 million to address DWP customer accounts, leaving a significant customer arrearage shortfall;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, with the concurrence of the Mayor, that by adoption of this Resolution, the City of Los Angeles includes in its 2021-2022 State Legislative Program SUPPORT for legislation or administrative action to fully address any remaining financial gap in customer arrears held by publicly owned utilities under the California Arrearage Payment Program.
