Recommendations for Council action:

1. 4. ACKNOWLEDGE that the County will act as the lead agency for the City and County on the West Los Angeles Civic Center Redevelopment Project under the California Environmental Quality Act.
5. AUTHORIZE the CAO to make technical corrections to effectuate the Mayor and Council's intent.

IMMIGRANT AFFAIRS, CIVIL RIGHTS, AND EQUITY and BUDGET AND FINANCE COMMITTEE REPORTS relative to an amendment to the agreement with the California Community Foundation (CCF) for continued implementation of the Los Angeles Justice Fund (LAJF).

A. IMMIGRANT AFFAIRS, CIVIL RIGHTS, AND EQUITY (IACRE) COMMITTEE

Recommendations for Council action, SUBJECT TO THE APPROVAL OF THE MAYOR:

1. ADOPT the proposed Immigrant Legal Services framework, in partnership with Los Angeles County (County), the California Community Foundation, and the Weingart Foundation, and instruct the City Administrative Officer (CAO) and the Chief Legislative Analyst (CLA) to report on the transfer of existing LAJF cases to the new program.
2. INSTRUCT the CAO and CLA to report with options to unilaterally implement a City immigrant services framework including other critical wrap-around services based on Councils priorities such as housing for unaccompanied minors, access to healthcare services, and job preparedness programs, release a separate procurement process and complete the disposition of existing LAJF cases.
3. AUTHORIZE City funds allocated in the Fiscal Year 2021-22 Adopted Budget to be used for financing existing LAJF cases and new cases under the new Immigrant Legal Services framework.
4. ADOPT a merit-blind approach where criminal history is not considered as eligibility criteria for participating in the new program.
5. AUTHORIZE the CAO, with the assistance of the CLA, to work with the County Office of Immigrant Affairs and philanthropic partners to develop and implement a competitive bid process, or sole source contract, if necessary, for the selection of: a) a lead organization(s) to serve as program operator; b) an organization to manage data collection, evaluation, and performance metrics

that take into account the various interactions during the life of a case; and c) sub-grantees; and, report to Council with selections for a, b, and c for approval.

6. INSTRUCT the program lead organization(s) and the program evaluator, once selected, to monitor eligibility requirements and program access, and report periodically to Council with recommendations to improve and/or remove and barriers to entry into the new program, including a status report on the transfer of existing LAJF cases once the new program has been implemented.
7. INSTRUCT the lead organization, once selected, to report on the selection of the Community Advisory Group for Council approval.
8. INSTRUCT the CAO to report with a revised budget that contemplates the new implementation timeline, including the funding resources identified in this report from philanthropy and the County of Los Angeles, and report on the use of the City's \$2 million allocation in the Fiscal Year 2021-22 Adopted Budget, a payment methodology, and options to set aside funds to cover the cost of background checks and expenses associated with referrals to public agencies providing wraparound services.
9.  - iii. 8 USC Section 1227(a)(2)(E) (final conviction of crimes of domestic violence, stalking, or violation of protection order, and crimes against children).
 - iv. 8 USC Section 1227(a)(2)(F) (final conviction of crime of trafficking).

Fiscal Impact Statement: The CLA reports that the Fiscal Year 2021-22 Adopted Budget provides \$2 million for immigrant legal services. Should the Council adopt Options 1A and 2B, a multi-year legal services program may result in a potential estimated General Fund obligation of

I **MOVE** that the matter of the IMMIGRANT AFFAIRS, CIVIL RIGHTS, AND EQUITY and BUDGET AND FINANCE COMMITTEE REPORTS relative to an amendment to the agreement with the California Community Foundation (CCF) for continued implementation of the Los Angeles Justice Fund (LAJF), Item No. 18 on today's Council Agenda (CF 17-0046-S2) BE AMENDED to adopt the following recommendations in lieu of the recommendations contained in the Committee Reports in order to consolidate, clarify and restate the recommendations in those Reports, as follows:

1. **ADOPT** the proposed Immigrant Legal Services framework, in partnership with Los Angeles County (County), the CCF, and the Weingart Foundation; and **INSTRUCT** the City Administrative Officer (CAO) and the Chief Legislative Analyst (CLA) to report on the transfer of existing Los Angeles Justice Fund (LAJF) cases to the new program.
2. **INSTRUCT** the CAO and the CLA to report with options to unilaterally implement a City immigrant legal services framework including other critical wrap-around services based on the Council's priorities such as housing for unaccompanied minors, access to healthcare services, and job preparedness programs, release a separate procurement process and complete the disposition of existing LAJF cases.
3. **CONCLUDE** the provision of immigrant legal services and instruct the CAO, with the assistance of the CLA, to report on the disposition of existing LAJF cases.
4. **INSTRUCT** the CAO and the CLA, and request the County Office of Immigrant Affairs, to include in the Memorandum of Understanding the allocation of the City's funding contribution of \$2 million to the following framework pillars only:
 - a. Investing in Impacted Immigrant Communities (Education and Outreach), and
 - b. Earned Immigration Affirmative Benefits.
5. **INSTRUCT** the CAO and CLA, and request the County Office of Immigrant Affairs, to include in the Memorandum of Understanding, a provision to allocate \$250,000 to provide support for veterans of the U.S. Armed Forces, and stipulate that the funds should be expended within eight-months of the contract execution date between the City and County.
6. **INSTRUCT** the CAO and CLA to identify non-general fund dollars and seek additional federal and state funding sources.
7. **AUTHORIZE** the CAO, with the assistance of the CLA, to work with the County Office of Immigrant Affairs and philanthropic partners to develop and implement a competitive bid process, or sole source contract, if necessary, for the selection of: a) a lead organization(s) to serve as program operator; b) an organization to manage data

collection, evaluation, and performance metrics that take into account the various interactions during the life of a case; and c) sub-grantees; and, report to Council with selections a, b, and c for approval.

8. INSTRUCT the program lead organization(s) and the program evaluator, once selected, to monitor eligibility requirements and program access, and report periodically to Council with recommendations to improve and/or remove any barriers to entry into the new program including a status report on the transfer of existing LAJF cases once the new program has been implemented.
9. INSTRUCT the lead organization, once selected, to report on the selection of the Community Advisory Group for Council approval.
10. INSTRUCT the CAO to report with a revised budget that contemplates the new implementation timeline, including the funding resources identified in the CLA report, dated October 21, 2021, from philanthropy and the County of Los Angeles, and report on the use of the City's \$2 million allocation in the Fiscal Year 2021-22 Adopted Budget, a payment methodology, and options to set aside funds to cover the expenses associated with referrals to public agencies providing wraparound services.
11. INSTRUCT the CAO and CLA, and request the County Office of Immigrant Affairs, to include in the Memorandum of Understanding (MOU), a provision to enhance outreach efforts encouraging participation by Black and Indigenous immigrants, and other vulnerable populations, in the proposed Immigrant Legal Services program, and report on how individuals can access the variety of legal services offered by the program.
12. INSTRUCT the CLA to continue to monitor federal legislation and other administrative actions that provide resources for legal representation services for individuals at risk of deportation and report to Council with periodic updates.

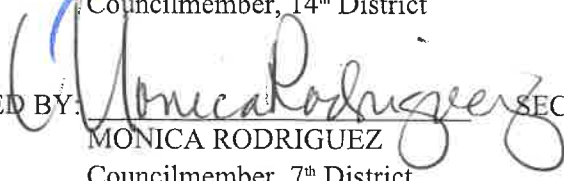

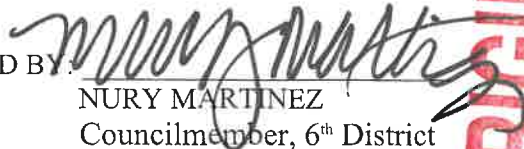

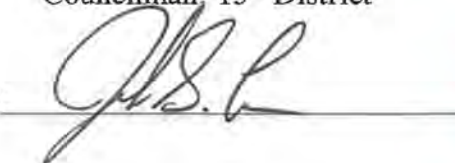

The City of Los Angeles, including the Fourth Council District, has been plagued by an increase in speeding and street racing. In 2021, 294 people were killed and 1,465 more were seriously injured in traffic collisions in the City, a disproportionate share of whom were killed or injured while walking or bicycling. Many of these deaths and injuries were caused by speeding and street racing.

Speeding and street racing deters people from walking and bicycling in their neighborhoods and creates noise and quality of life issues for residents across the Fourth District. Although the City has recently taken advantage of changes in State law to reduce posted speed limits on some streets, the Valley in particular—which now constitutes most of the Fourth District—has many wide streets that were engineered to be conducive to excessive speeds. In addition, streets like Mulholland Drive and other hillside scenic routes attract street racing and nuisance behavior due to their views and cultural significance. Our streets require engineering treatments to control speeding and improve safety.

The Department of Transportation has the ability to implement low-cost, readily-installed traffic safety measures on many streets to reduce speeding, improve safety, and enhance mobility for those who walk, ride, or roll. There is a great need for additional services from the Department of Transportation within Council District Four. Sufficient funds are available in the Council District Four portion of the Neighborhood Service Enhancement line item in the GCP portion of the 2021-2022 City budget for this purpose.

I THEREFORE MOVE that \$90,000 be transferred/appropriated from the Council District 4 portion of the “Neighborhood Service Enhancements” line item General City Purposes Fund No. 100-56 to a new Account in the Transportation Trust Fund 840-94, entitled “CD4 Speed Reduction”, to fund traffic safety measures in Council District 4.

ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT & JOBS

On September 17, 2018, former Governor Jerry Brown signed Senate Bill 946, which ended the criminalization of sidewalk vending in California and allows local authorities to adopt non-criminal laws to protect public health, safety and welfare. On January 1, 2020, the City established the Sidewalk and Parks Vending Program, which permits the sale of food and merchandise, subject to the rules and regulations established by the Department of Public Works, Bureau of Street Services and the Department of Recreation and Parks.

In order for food vendors to obtain a permit, the City requires business owners to first secure a health permit from the Los Angeles County Department of Public Health. Requiring a health permit minimizes the risk of contamination by ensuring that all food service establishments are subject to period inspections and meet minimum health and sanitation standards. In the Program Year 47 (2021-22) Consolidated Plan, the City allocated \$500,000 to support street vendors in purchasing compliant food carts to assist in securing a health permit.

Sidewalk food vending provides individuals the ability to start a small business and to earn income for themselves and their families. As the lead department for this program, the Economic and Workforce Development Department should initiate the Request for Proposals process to implement the Sidewalk Vending Cart program and report to Council with the proposed contractor to lead the effort.

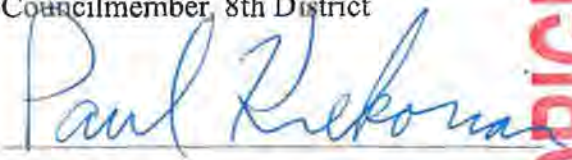

WHEREAS, there is evidence that links onychectomy (declawing) and flexor tendonectomy to a high risk of painful, adverse, and long-lasting effects on animals and that complications can include damage to nerves, lameness, and chronic pain; and

WHEREAS, declawing unnecessarily increases public health and safety risks as declawed animals become more prone to biting as a form of defense, leading to increased infection; and

WHEREAS, there are many alternatives that involve no physical harm to the animal; and

WHEREAS, the City has adopted an ordinance prohibiting the declawing of domestic cats which has been effective both in preserving the health of cats and contributing to the reduction of cat euthanasia in the City's animal shelters; and

WHEREAS, the State of California currently has a statute prohibiting additional local jurisdictions from adopting such ordinances, to the detriment of cats throughout the state; and

WHEREAS, AB 2606 (Carrillo) would in effect repeal that statute and establish a statewide prohibition on declawing except for therapeutic reasons;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, with the concurrence of the Mayor, that by the adoption of this Resolution, the City of Los Angeles hereby includes in its 2021-2022 State Legislative Program SUPPORT for AB 2606 to prohibit an individual from declawing a cat for any reason other than a therapeutic purpose.

WHEREAS, many persons living in their vehicles run the risk of incurring violations for doing so and California traffic fines and fees are the highest in the country; and

WHEREAS, the consequences of not paying a parking ticket in a timely manner can quickly result in excessive fines, vehicle impoundment, driver's license suspension, and court appearances; and


WHEREAS, AB 1685 (Bryan) was introduced to require all local jurisdictions in California to create a parking ticket relief program for homeless persons; and

WHEREAS, the author's office states that parking fines significantly burden homeless individuals, threaten the loss of their vehicle, and make it harder to exit homelessness, all-the-while providing very little revenue to the government as it is common for service providers, funded with government monies, to pay the fines on behalf of their homeless clients; and

WHEREAS, the City should support this bill to ensure homeless people are not pushed further into poverty through the punitive and counterproductive confiscation of their vehicles;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED with the concurrence of the Mayor, that by the adoption of this Resolution the City of Los Angeles includes in its 2021 - 2022 State Legislative Program support for AB 1685 (Bryan) which would require all local jurisdictions in California to create a parking ticket relief program for homeless persons.

WHEREAS, many of these individuals with severe mental illness who may also have substance abuse issues lack decision making capacity and are tragically languishing unaided; and

WHEREAS, to address the urgent need to assist those with mental illness and substance use disorder AB 2830 (Bloom) and SB 1338 (Eggman / Umberg) have been introduced to create the Community Assistance, Recovery, and Empowerment (CARE) Court Program which was proposed by Governor Newsom; and

WHEREAS, the legislation advises that with advancements in behavioral health treatments, many people with untreated schizophrenia spectrum and psychotic disorders can stabilize, heal and thrive in community-based settings with the support of behavioral health services, stabilizing medications, and housing, but far too often this comprehensive care is only provided after arrest, conservatorship, or institutionalization; and

WHEREAS, CARE Courts would provide a court-ordered CARE plan to persons with severe mental illness (or other specified criteria), and the plan would include behavioral health treatment services, a housing plan, and a trained navigator/ supporter to assist clients throughout the process; and

WHEREAS, the City should support this legislation as the CARE Court is an innovative and much-needed model to assist vulnerable persons who are struggling with untreated, severe mental health disorders which are often compounded by substance use;

MOTION

The Rose Avenue Pathway Project will construct a new walkway and protected bike lane along Rose Avenue (from Frederick Street to Glenavon Avenue) in Venice. The project is one of dozens of signal, bicycle, pedestrian, and first/last mile projects funded by the Westside Fast Forward initiative.

The project anticipates that the Department of General Services (GSD) will use their general contractor on-call list to obtain bids for design engineering/consultant services. A transfer of funds to GSD is necessary to initiate procurement for these services. Sufficient funding was previously allocated to this project in the Coastal Transportation Corridor Trust Fund, which receives funds that are designated specifically for transportation projects on the Westside.

I THEREFORE MOVE that the Council:

1. Transfer/appropriate \$250,000 from the Coastal Transportation Corridor Trust Fund No. 447-94, Westside Fast Forward StreetsLA Sidewalks Projects-Coastal Account No. 9426NT, to the Department of General Services Fund No. 100-40, for on-call contractor services to undertake the Rose Avenue Pathway Project, as follows:
 - a. Hiring Hall Construction, Appropriation Unit 001101 – \$48,750
 - b. Benefits Hiring Hall Construction, Appropriation Unit 001121 – \$26,250
 - c. Construction Materials, Appropriation Unit 003180 – \$175,000
2. Authorize the Department of Transportation to make any technical corrections or clarifications to the above fund transfer instructions in order to effectuate the intent of this Motion, including any corrections and changes to fund or account numbers.
