Fiscal Impact Statement: The LADOT reports that to implement Slow Streets Phase 2 treatments, it has used approximately \$595,000 in City Measure M Open Streets funding and has been reporting such expenditures for COVID-relief tracking purposes. Of the original \$800,000 identified for this program in Fiscal Year 2020-21, the LADOT included \$100,000 in Metro Open Streets Cycle 3 grant funds. To complete the remaining 12 Slow Streets areas, the LADOT estimates it will need to identify \$420,000 for materials and \$300,000 for labor. To support future installations, the LADOT will need to secure additional project construction funding through the annual budget or through grant programs to support advance planning and long-term, permanent implementation of neighborhood networks. The estimated cost for the four new positions outlined in the LADOT report may have an impact on the General Fund. Through the budget process, the LADOT will define staff positions and salaries that would impact the General Fund.

Venice was once one of the most racially, ethnically, and culturally diverse communities on the Westside. That diversity was key to the identity of Venice. It built the neighborhoods, shaped Venice's growth and character, and was the foundation of Venice's international recognition and cultural acclaim.

With gentrification, displacement and income inequality, much of that diversity has vanished, and so has much of our history. While the common story of the founding of Venice centers around Abbot Kinney, the stories and contributions of the people who lived and worked in the community are being lost. Efforts are being made to preserve and celebrate this history, and the City of Los Angeles should support it.

History is often celebrated through the designation of physical structures and landmarks for their architectural or historical significance, however due to detrimental policies that drove socioeconomic disparities and displacement, this rich history of Venice is under threat of erasure. As such, "interpretive history" is a powerful placemaking tool that communities can use to preserve the stories and contributions of their ancestors and provide a deeper understanding of the history of a space and its significance. Interpretive history is also a tool to capture and preserve narratives that may only exist through anecdotal evidence such as stories and collective memory. The Oakwood Preservation Coalition (OPC) seeks to use interpretative history to remember and celebrate the Black, Latino, and Indigienous communities that called the 1-square mile neighborhood of Oakwood in Venice home.

The OPC's proposed Venice "Walk of Fame" medallion sidewalk project will pay tribute to the local community by honoring the people who made outstanding contributions to its development in the areas such as community service, education, business development, or cultural significance. The Walk of Fame will be a source of community pride as honorees will represent the diverse demographics of Venice and uplift the unsung stories of local heroes. As envisioned by OPC, the Walk of Fame is meant to be an ongoing and living project as the commemorated individuals will be recognized along the perimeter of Oakwood Recreation Center. The project will be managed and maintained by OPC, a non-profit organization dedicated to the preservation of community culture and history.

The Walk of Fame will provide an opportunity for local Venetians and visitors alike to share in the collective history of Venice and intellectually, emotionally, and spiritually connect with the community on a deeper level. The project will promote unity through diversity and inclusiveness by celebrating the contributions of locals and uplifting stories for the community to experience together.

Over the past several years, the City of Los Angeles has repeatedly recognized that many neighborhoods suffer from inequitable public investment, with a noticeable difference between affluent and lower-income neighborhoods in infrastructure improvements and neighborhood beautification projects.

In District 11, one neighborhood that needs significant investment to address historical inequity is the area near the intersection of Culver Boulevard and Slauson Avenue in Del Rey. The median of Slauson Avenue is particularly ripe for improvement and beautification, and could be transformed into a tremendous asset for the community, on a major street with hundreds of apartments, Culver-Slauson Park, and the Mar Vista Family Center. There is also a need for improvements along the stretch of the Ballona Creek that borders the neighborhood.

Currently, two simultaneous efforts are underway to scope potential improvements to the area. Through a grant from the Baldwin Hills Conservancy, Kounkuey Design Initiative (KDI) is developing a plan for potential greening projects in the area. The Del Rey Neighborhood Council is also engaged in a visioning effort for the area. Once completed, implementation of projects will need funding, and sufficient funds are available in the Council District 11 Street Furniture account to provide seed money for those efforts.

Major transit construction projects like the Purple Line Extension, LAX Automated People Mover, and the Sepulveda Transit Corridor have achieved critical milestones toward connecting the Westside with the rest of the Los Angeles region. The opening of the Crenshaw/LAX Line has brought brand new rail service to Westchester residents along its eventual path to the airport. Several Westside Fast Forward projects require more funding to achieve construction or project development milestones. There is sufficient funding available in special accounts that are designated specifically for transportation projects on the Westside, from special fees collected on developments on the Westside.

On November 6, 2018, the Deputy Advisory Agency approved Vesting Tentative Tract Map (VTTM) No. 74200 located at 129-135 West College Street and 924 North Spring Street on a 4.9 acres site (Project Site) for street vacation purposes. On January 18, 2019, the City Planning Commission sustained the determination. The owner has secured city entitlement approvals to construct a mixed-use development including 725 residential units and approximately 51,600 square feet of commercial uses including a grocery store and restaurants (Project).

The VTTM was approved with conditions, including the merger of a public street with the remainder of the tract map to the satisfaction of the Bureau of Engineering. Accordingly the VTTM and forthcoming recordation of the Final Map will vacate a portion of Rondout Street and merge it into the Project Site. The owner is ready for grading, shoring and vertical construction. However, a portion of construction shall encroach within the vacated portion of Rondout Street prior to recordation of the Final Map.

The approval and recordation process is currently under way for the Final Map. In order to commence construction with vertical improvements occupying the public right-of-way prior to recordation of the Final Map and finalization of the merger, the owner must obtain a Revocable Permit from the Bureau of Engineering and pay a full cash bond.



APPROVING THE ISSUANCE OF REVENUE BONDS OR OTHER OBLIGATIONS BY THE CALIFORNIA ENTERPRISE DEVELOPMENT AUTHORITY IN AN AGGREGATE PRINCIPAL AMOUNT NOT TO EXCEED \$5,000,000 FOR THE PURPOSE OF FINANCING, REFINANCING AND/OR REIMBURSING THE COST OF ACQUISITION AND IMPROVEMENT OF FACILITIES FOR THE BENEFIT OF HOPE OF THE VALLEY RESCUE MISSION AND OTHER MATTERS RELATING THERETO HEREIN SPECIFIED

WHEREAS, Hope of the Valley Rescue Mission, a nonprofit public benefit corporation, daly organized and existing under the laws of the State of California (the "Borrower"), has submitted and the California Enterprise Development Authority (the "Authority") has scoopied, an application requesting the Authority to issue, from time to time, pursuant to a place of finance, its tax-exempt revenue bonds or other obligations in an aggregate principal amount not to exceed \$5,000,000 (the "Obligations") for the benefit of the Borrower pursuant to Chapter 5 of Division 7 of Title 1 of the Government Code of the State (commencing with Section 6500) (the "Act"); and

WHEREAS, the proceeds of the Obligations will be used for the purpose of (a) financing, refinancing and/or reimbursing the Borrower for the cost of the acquisition and improvement of the real property located at 9700 Topange Canyon Boulevard. Challenoide, California 91311 (the "Facilities"), consisting of an approximately 15,860 square foot warmouse and distribution famility on approximately 33,800 square foot of lead and (b) funding one or more debt service reserve funds, paying a portion of the interest to accrue on the Obligations, and paying centain costs of issuance of the Obligations; and

WHEREAS, the issuance of the Obligations must be approved by the governmental unit on behalf of which the Obligations are issued and a governmental unit baring jurisdiction over the territorial limits in which the Facilities located pursuant to the public approval requirement of Section 147(f) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986, as amended (the "Code"); and

WHEREAS, the Facilities are located within the territorial limits of City of Los Angeles (the "City") and the City Council of the City (the "City Council") is the elected legislative body of the City; and

WHEREAS, the Authority and the Berrower have requested that the City Council approve the issuance of the Obligations by the Authority and the financing, refinancing or reimbersing of the Berrower for the cost of the Familities with the proceeds of the Obligations pursuant to Section 147(f) of the Code; and

WHEREAS, the Pacifities provide significant benefits to the City's residents through the Barrower's mission to reduce and eliminate poverty, honger and homoleseness, and

WHEREAS, the Authority's income of the Obligations will result in a more communical and efficient insurest passess because of the Authority's expertise in the insurance of conduct revenue obligations; and

WHEREAS, it is intended that this Resolution shall comply with the public approval requirements of Section 147(f) of the Code; provided however, that this Resolution is neither intended to nor shall it constitute an approval by the City Coencil of the Facilities for any other purpose;

WBEREAS, pursuant to Section 147(f) of the Code, the City Council of the City, following notice duty given, held a public hearing regarding the insurance of the Obligations and now desires to approve the issuance of the Obligations by the Authority; and

WHEREAS, in recognition of the City's objective of addressing the needs of residents with disabilities, the Borrower has agreed that (a) any Facilities to be constructed with the proceeds of the Obligations will comply with the Americans with Disabilities Act, 42 U.S.C. Section 12101 or seq. and the 2010 ADA Standards, Chapter 11 of Title 24 of the California Code of Regulations, (b) the Borrower will not discriminate in its programs, services to activities on the basis of disability and (c) the Borrower will provide reasonable accommodation upon request to ensure aqual access and effective communication to its programs, services and activities.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, DETERMINED AND ORDERED by the City Council of the City as follows:

Section I. The City Council hereby finds and determines that all of the recitals are true and correct. The City Council finds that the Facilities will provide the significant benefits set furth in the recitals above. The City Council hereby approves the issuance of the Obligations by the Authority, which Obligations may be tax-exampt and/or texable as approved by the Authority in its resolution, in an amount not to exceed \$5,000,000 to finance, refinance and/or relimburse the Borrower for the post of the Facilities and to fund one or more dobt service reserve funds, pay a portion of the interest to accrue on the Obligations, and pay certain costs of issuance of the Obligations. This resolution shall constitute approval of the issuance of the Obligations within the meaning of Section 147(f) of the Gode and shall constitute the approval of the issuance of the Obligations within the recentling of the Act; provided, however, that this Resolution shall not constitute an approval by the City Council of the Facilities for any other purpose. The City shall not bear any responsibility for the tax-except status of the Obligations, the repayment of the Obligations or any other matter related to the Obligations.

Section 2. All artisms becaming takes by the officers, employees and agains of the City with respect to the approval of the Obligations are hereby approved, confirmed and ratified, and tim afficers and employees of the City and their authorized deputies and agents are hereby authorized and directed, jointly and severally, to do any and all things and to excess and deliver any and all certificates and decuments which they or special counsel may deem necessary or advisable in order to empany to the Obligations and otherwise to effective the purposes of this Resolution.

Section 3. This Resolution shall take effect from and after its adoption.

On November 21, 2021, Matthew Price was walking home when a suspect fired a bullet that struck him in the leg. Although the Fire Department rendered medical aid, Mr. Price failed to respond to life saving medical treatment and was pronounced deceased. Detectives have been unable to identify the person responsible for this murder.

The person or persons responsible for this crime represent an ongoing threat to the safety of the people of Los Angeles; therefore, it is appropriate for the City of Los Angeles to offer a reward for information leading to the identification, apprehension and conviction of the person or persons responsible for the death of Matthew Price.

I THEREFORE MOVE that by adoption of this Motion, the City Council provide an offer of reward for information leading to the identification, apprehension, and conviction of the person or persons responsible for the death of Matthew Price on November 21, 2021, and in support thereof, make the following findings pursuant to Division 19, Chapter 12, Article 1 of the Los Angeles Administrative Code:

- 1. That the death of Mr. Price was caused by the willful misconduct of one or more persons.
- 2. That this offer of reward is consistent with and taken for the immediate protection of the public peace, health and safety of local residents, as well as visitors to the City, and is consistent with the need to arrest and convict the person who, because of not being apprehended, could by their actions further terrorize and present a continuing and immediate menace to the rights of persons in the City.
- 3. That what happened to the victim is an especially disturbing crime and therefore, as a matter of public policy, the City hereby offers a reward as an added inducement for persons to come forward with information leading to the identification, apprehension and conviction of the person or persons responsible for the death of Matthew Price.
- 4. That the sum of \$50,000 shall be the aggregate maximum sum of any payment or payments of a City reward in this instance.
- 5. That the offer of reward shall be in effect for six months from the date of the advertisement of the reward by the City Clerk





Barnsdall Park, located at the crest of Olive Hill, is a 11.5-acre Historic park, that serves the 13th Council District in the Los Angeles area, and on a larger scale not only the City but worldwide travelers visiting the City of Angels. The park includes the Hollyhock House, inscribed by UNESCO to the World Heritage List as a component of the serial designs - The 20th-Century Architecture of Frank Lloyd Wright. MOTIONREGULAR COUNCIL AGENDA TO BE POSTED

Consistent with goals outlined in the 2007 Los Angeles River Revitalization Master Plan (LARRMP) and the 2016 LA River Ecosystem Restoration Project to restore aquatic habitat in and along the L.A. River, the Bureau of Engineering (BOE) has supported concept development and technical exploration for a project in the L.A. River near Downtown L.A. to re-establish aquatic habitat. The L.A. River Fish Habitat Pilot Project (Project) has been gradually developed by a variety of agencies and organizations over several years including the U.S. Bureau of Reclamation, the California Wildlife Conservation Board, and the Council for Watershed Health (CWH).

On March 19, 2019, the City Council adopted a motion instructing BOE to partner with the CWH to seek and complete work under a Wildlife Conservation Board Proposition 68 Grant to develop approaches to increase habitat function in the low-flow channel of the L.A. River, and to begin the design and modeling of potential restoration options along 4.5 miles of the Los Angeles River from the Arroyo Seco to Washington Street (C.F. 19-0111). This grant was awarded to the CWH that then coordinated with City staff to develop: a Conceptual Ecological Model and Limiting Factors Analysis for Steelhead in the Los Angeles River Watershed; a 30 percent level Basis of Design Report; a Reach 8A Design Development Technical Memorandum; a 60 percent level Basis of Design report and engineering plan set; an environmental review and strategy including permitting applications; and a draft California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA) approach for the project.

To advance the project to implementation, BOE and the CWH mutually recommend that BOE assume leadership of the project and apply for grants from the Wildlife Conservation Board and Santa Monica Mountains Conservancy to fund the Project that is estimated to cost approximately \$7.7 million. If awarded, the grant funding will be used to complete design, secure permits, complete an environmental clearance document, and construct a ¹/₄-mile feature in the bed of the L.A. River, just downstream from the Main Street Bridge. This Project, in addition to its independent value and utility, is intended to inform further implementation of similar features along the many miles of the L.A. River and its tributaries that are concrete-lined and have low-flow channels.

I THEREFORE MOVE, that the City Council authorize the City Engineer to apply for grants from the California Wildlife Conservation Board and the Santa Monica Mountains Conservancy to complete design, construction, and monitoring of the L.A. River Fish Habitat Pilot Project (Project) that is estimated to cost \$7.7 million and, if awarded, to report to Council for approval of the grant agreements.

I FURTHER MOVE, that the City Council instruct the City Engineer, with the assistance of the City Attorney and any other City departments as necessary, to develop a partnership agreement with the Council for Watershed Health to transfer prior work completed on the Project and to establish a role for the Council for Watershed Health in the Project's future science and education mission and to report to Council with the terms of this partnership agreement prior to execution.

The George Wolfberg Park at Potrero Canyon in the Pacific Palisades neighborhood has been the vision of the community and City since the 1960s. The park began construction in 2019 and when completed at the end of 2022, it will be a 46-acre passive recreation park that will eventually connect the Palisades Recreation Center with Will Rogers State Beach.

Los Angeles Municipal Code (LAMC) section 63.44 B.14(a) states that all parks shall have operating hours of 5:00 a.m. to 10:30 p.m. with the exception of the parks listed in LAMC section 63.44 B.14(c) which shall open at sunrise and close at sunset.

George Wolfberg Park at Potrero Canyon is intended to be a passive recreation park for walkers, hikers, and bicycle riders. The park's Environmental Impact Report (EIR), approved by the Recreation and Parks Board of Commissioners in January 2021, states that "Use of the area will be restricted to daylight hours and increased noise levels would not be significant since only passive recreational activities would be allowed in the park." With the imminent opening of the park, it is now necessary to implement these hours of operation via changes to the LAMC.

I THEREFORE MOVE that the City Council request the Department of Recreation and Parks to set the operating hours for the George Wolfberg Park at Potrero Canyon in Council District 11 to open at sunrise and close at sunset.

I FURTHER MOVE that the Department of Recreation and Parks be requested to prominently post the hours of operation at all entrances of the George Wolfberg Park at Potrero Canyon.

The Earth is already too hot for safety. Humanity can no longer safely emit greenhouse gasses if it wishes to avoid reaching irreversible climate tipping points. Only one degree Celsius of global warming is already causing excessive and unnecessary damage worldwide, including the climate-exacerbated drought destruction of both of America's most important rivers: the Mississippi and the Colorado.

Extreme storm damage to refineries in Florida, Texas and along the Gulf Coast have caused past price spikes in gasoline prices across the country, including in Los Angeles. The volatility of fossil fuel prices will continue in a climate-disrupted future and will particularly impact low income residents.

Additionally, emissions from vehicles powered by fossil fuels and from production and refinement of fossil fuels contribute substantially to health problems for frontline communities living near freeways, oil drill sites and refineries. Disproportionately, the burden of dirty fuel energy is borne by low-income communities of color, while reductions in fossil fuel burning would have a measurable positive impact on the nearly 47,000 asthma-induced emergency room visits across Los Angeles County every year.

Yet, COP27 in Egypt, as has been the case for the other 26 Conferences of Parties on climate, failed to materialize an effective, binding implementation plan to end fossil fuel infrastructure, end fossil fuel industry subsidies, and appropriately hold accountable the companies who have created the most damage, including Chevron, Exxon-Mobil, Sempra Energy, and others.

Lacking global cooperation, in order to drastically reduce greenhouse gas emissions themselves, countries such as Great Britain, India, China and Germany have already set an end date on the sales of gasoline and diesel powered passenger vehicles (ICE). California Governor Gavin Newsom has similarly set an end date of 2035, which, while prominent, does not even begin to address the true emissions reductions necessary to keep the planet below the upper survivability limit of 1.5 degrees Celsius.

According to the 11th annual *California Green Innovation Index*, despite nation-leading efforts to reduce greenhouse gas (GHG) emissions in its energy sector, at 2017's GHG reduction rate, the year with available data, California would reach its 2030 goal in 2061 and its 2050 goal of emitting 80% below 1990 levels in 2157, "a 31-year and a 107-year delay." Transportation electrification must be accelerated because over half the state's GHGs have come from the transportation sector in recent years.

Towards that end, automobile manufacturers such as Audi and Volvo are moving toward all-electric vehicle (EV) sales and General Motors, Ford, Land Rover and BMW are introducing new lines as well. A healthy secondary electric vehicle market is already making EVs more affordable than ever. Price parity between ICE and EV vehicles is predicted by the automotive industry within the next few years.

The City is pursuing the development of an Electric Vehicle Master Plan (CF: 21-0890) in order to better facilitate the sale and spread of EVs citywide as well as the necessary transformation of the electricity grid.



If the City is to continue to thrive and play a role as an international leader in climate action, all efforts must be made to reduce greenhouse gas emissions in every sector, including transportation, as soon as possible. In order to protect and promote the health of its residents, the City should make all efforts to reduce exposure to toxic emissions from freeways, oil drill sites and refineries by ending the sale of all new fossil fuel powered vehicles as soon as possible. Due to the shorter-term climate emission dangers posed by methane leaks associated with natural gas extraction, the sale of natural gas powered vehicles should be included in any phase out.

I THEREFORE MOVE that the City Council request the City Attorney, in consultation with the Department of City Planning, the Department of Transportations, the Office of Petroleum and Natural Gas Administration and Safety (Petroleum Administrator), the Los Angeles Department of Water and Power, and the General Services Department, be instructed to report to the Council in 90 days with an ordinance terminating the sale of new gasoline, diesel and natural gas passenger vehicles in Los Angeles by 2030 via a staged phase out such as cars over \$28K by 2028, cars over \$22K by 2029, and all cars by 2030, so as to actively create a used electric vehicle market for lower income customers.

I FURTHER MOVE that future reports related to CF: 21-0890 (EV Master Plan) and CF: 22-0532 (ending fossil fuel procurement) include components of this policy as it relates to procurement and maintenance of fleet needs

I FURTHER MOVE that the Director of the Office Climate Emergency Mobilization, in consultation with the Economic and Workforce Development Department, be directed to report to Council in 90 days on any "just transition" elements related to the above action, including the impact upon and opportunities for auto mechanics.

The Sepulveda Basin, located in the heart of the San Fernando Valley, is an all-too-rare region of open space remaining in our urban concretized city. The 2,000-acre Recreation Area is a flood control basin managed by the Los Angeles City Department of Recreation and Parks, and includes two parks, an 80-acre sports field, an archery range, three 18-hole golf courses, Balboa Lake with boat rentals and fishing, the Balboa Park and Sports Center, playgrounds, a velodrome, bike paths, hiking trails, tennis courts, a Japanese garden, an off-leash dog park, a premiere wildlife preserve, and the only currently unpaved stretch of the Los Angeles River.

It has been reported that there have been discussions with the Los Angeles Rams and the LA28 Olympic Committee for possible use of the Sepulveda Basin. As with other major protected open spaces, like Griffith Park, the Sepulveda Basin is a citywide multi-use facility whose future should be very carefully considered.

With public distrust of the City Government at a high point, it is essential to daylight backroom deals that may adversely affect any public property, particularly affecting wildlife preserves or other similarly designated areas, and to provide a venue for a public hearing with public comment and full disclosure of any such plans far in advance of making any corporate deals.

I THEREFORE MOVE that the City Council direct/request the Department of Recreation and Parks, the City Attorney, and all other relevant departments, bureaus or agencies with pertinent information, to report back in 30 days on any and all pending deals with the Los Angeles Rams or any other corporate or other entities for the future use of any portion of the Sepulveda Basin Recreation Area and any possible negative environmental impacts associated with those plans.

The City of Los Angeles recently approved the Sidewalk and Transit Amenities Program (STAP) to provide and maintain street furniture, including transit shelters that provide riders with protection from increasingly extreme weather conditions. Under Los Angeles Administrative Code section 5.121.7, the "Street Furniture Revenue Fund", (adopted under the previous street furniture contract, the Coordinated Street Furniture Program (CSFP)), half of revenues generated by outdoor advertising on program furniture are allocated to the City of Los Angeles General Fund, with the remaining half allocated to the Street Furniture Revenue Fund (Fund number 43D) and from there, those 43D funds are divided equally among the 15 Council Districts for their own discretionary uses.

Under STAP, the City will receive a higher share of advertising revenue (up to 60.5%) than under CFSP, but the City will now be responsible for the program capital costs. The amount of revenue the City will receive is largely dependent on the City's own capital investment in ad-supported transit shelters and other amenities. Because the City must make the investment, the City should rethink how STAP revenues are allocated to successfully implement the program and best serve the City's needs. The STAP contract also includes a Minimum Annual Guarantee (MAG), expected to net \$6 million in revenue in Year 1, followed by \$10 million in each of the subsequent nine years, with two five-year contract extensions options. Projections for total annual revenue (including the MAG) range from approximately \$15 million to \$40 million (compared to a maximum revenue of approximately \$6 million in the CSFP), but even the MAG of \$10 million would represent a substantial increase in revenues available to the City through its street furniture contract.

Departments need predictable funding sources to implement street improvement projects over a longer planning horizon and to support interdepartmental infrastructure project delivery. With the initiation of the Interdepartmental MOU governing interagency coordination for projects in the public right-of-way, we have an opportunity to leverage new funding for more holistic projects like planting shade trees and improving bus stops along bike and bus lane corridors. STAP revenues offer LA an opportunity to achieve these goals.

I THEREFORE MOVE that the City Council instruct the Chief Legislative Analyst, with the assistance of the City Administrative Officer and the Bureau of Street Services, to report within 60 days on the creation of a new citywide Reinvestment in Accessibility, Infrastructure and Streetscape Enhancements for Los Angeles (RAISE LA) fund and program that would be used to fund staff to administer the STAP contract and program, capital expenditures and debt service for STAP program elements, and staff salaries and overtime, as needed, to support the planning, design, implementation, and any operation and maintenance of the following capital improvement categories for transit-focused and first/last mile locations:

- Transit Access Bus boarding islands, bus bulbs/curb extensions, curb ramps and other civil improvements to ensure ADA accessibility and optimal transit operations;
- Pedestrian Access & Safety New sidewalk construction for gaps of less than a block face
 in length, traffic calming and physical protection for pedestrians on roadways that lack
 grade-separated pedestrian facilities, pedestrian lighting at bus stops and intersections;
- Street Trees New street trees, replacements for dead/dying trees, and establishment and watering support for new and existing trees; and



• Street Furniture – Water stations, shade structures, bike parking structures including lockers or hubs, parklets and associated physical protection elements, and bollards to protect pedestrianized areas and paths of travel.

The report should also include proposals for the responsible party for administering the fund, what the funding schedule and priorities will be, and what the public reporting requirements for the program will be, including how they will meet existing City of Los Angeles open data standards. Special attention should be paid to including Geographic Information Systems (GIS) data so that expenditures can be visualized spatially.

I FURTHER MOVE that the City Council instruct the Bureau of Street Services, in coordination with the Los Angeles Department of Transportation (LADOT), the Department of Public Works, the Bureau of Engineering, the Bureau of Street Lighting, and any other relevant departments, to report back before the end of Year 1 of the new STAP contract with a recommended multi-year expenditure plan for RAISE LA funds to equitably address deficiencies in transit and first-last mile mobility safety, security, and accessibility. This plan should include investments in both STAP and non-STAP elements to prioritize improvements based on ridership, urban heat, socioeconomic and demographic data, and any other relevant metrics to ensure equitable citywide investment.

I FURTHER MOVE that the City Council instruct the City Attorney, with the assistance of the Chief Legislative Analyst, the City Administrative Officer, and the Bureau of Street Services, to prepare and present a draft ordinance within 60 days amending Los Angeles Administrative Code section 5.121.7 regarding allocation of all Street and Transit Amenities Program (STAP) Revenues, including the Minimum Annual Guarantee (MAG), to provide that all revenues be dedicated to the following two funds:

- Maintenance of "Street Furniture Revenue Fund" 43D Fund revenue levels for each Council District at a level commensurate with a 15-way split of the highest revenue year under the Consolidated Street Furniture Program, which was approximately \$3,000,000 total, split 15 ways. Therefore, the 43D Fund would be funded at a total amount of \$3,000,000 for Year 1, with annual adjustments for inflation. This fund should be renamed the "Council Discretionary Street Furniture Fund"; and
- The remainder of all MAG and advertising revenues derived from STAP would go to the citywide RAISE LA fund for capital expenditures, debt service, and staffing for public space improvements and maintenance as outlined in this motion.

The California Department of Healthcare Services (DHCS) developed a Medi-Cal Home and Community-Based Services (HCBS) Spending Plan detailing a series of initiatives that will enhance, expand and strengthen HCBS in California. The Housing and Homelessness Incentive Program (HHIP) is one of the HCBS Transitions initiatives, which aim to expand and enhance programs that facilitate individuals transitioning to community-based, independent living arrangements.

HHIP provides incentive funds to Medi-Cal Managed Care Plans to address homelessness and housing insecurity as social determinants of health. \$1.288 billion of one-time funding will be available through March 31, 2024. It is anticipated L.A. Care and Health Net, two Medi-Cal Managed Care Plans within Los Angeles County will receive approximately \$405M to develop the capacity and partnerships to connect Medi-Cal members to needed housing services and to reduce and prevent homelessness.

HHIP seeks to improve access to coordinated housing, health and other social services by providing rapid rehousing for Medi-Cal families and youth, interim housing for aging and disabled populations, and providing funding for housing navigation, housing deposits, housing tenancy and sustaining services, recuperative care, short-term post-hospitalization housing, and day habilitation programs. HHIP will also provide funding to expand street medicine programs.

The City of Los Angeles has built thousands of interim, transition, and permanent supportive housing and funds supportive services and time-limited subsidies to support individuals and families experiencing homelessness. Funding for more housing navigation and housing sustaining services is a critical component of managing these housing resources to ensure successful throughput into permanent housing. Housing navigation provided by the Los Angeles Homeless Services Authority (LAHSA) is limited to a set number of interventions and HHIP funding can increase the capacity for more housing navigation and sustaining services, enabling more funding to be directed towards building housing and rental subsidy programs.

In alignment with HHIP, the City of Los Angeles is expanding street medicine programs and recuperative care and short-term post-hospitalization housing and will need to closely work with County Departments and service providers to coordinate patient care. Equally important, as HHIP recognizes, is the need to strengthen data sharing between HMIS and other data systems to improve the health of people experiencing homelessness.

Managed Care Plans have engaged core stakeholder groups including: the four Continuums of Care in Los Angeles County - Los Angeles Homeless Service Authority, Glendale, Long Beach and Pasadena, the Los Angeles County CEO - Homeless Initiatives, the Department of Health Services, Department of Mental Health, and Department of Public Health. The City of Los Angeles should be engaged in the planning and implementation of the Housing and Homelessness Incentive Program to ensure the most effective use of this one-time funding and to avoid duplication of efforts.

I THEREFORE MOVE to instruct the Chief Legislative Analyst (CLA) and City Administrative Officer (CAO) to report on the Local Homelessness Plan and Investment Plan of Los Angeles County submitted to DHCS, and how the City can be an active partner in meeting the priorities set by HHIP.

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I FURTHER MOVE to instruct the CAO and the CLA to report on future funding needs to continue and expand street medicine and mobile health/mental health van programs in the City, utilizing HHIP and other funding sources.

I FURTHER MOVE to instruct the CAO and CLA, with the assistance from LAHSA to report on how much funding can be supplanted from current expenditures on housing navigation and other housing sustaining services with HHIP funding.

I FURTHER MOVE to request the Los Angeles Homeless Services Authority to report on HHIP priorities shared with the Managed Care Plans for the Los Angeles Continuum of Care, along with budget for housing navigation and housing sustaining services for this current and next fiscal year.

I FURTHER MOVE to request the City Health Commission to report on the health, mental health and behavioral health needs of people experiencing homelessness in the City and how best to align the delivery of these services with the priorities set by HHIP.

Through Los Angeles Municipal Code (LAMC) 12.37 and the Highway Dedication process, the City of Los Angeles mandates street widening via dedications and required improvements for new multifamily and commercial developments. Although there is relief available through a waiver of dedication and/or improvement (WDI), City standards for street widths based on street classification frequently result in widenings even when a WDI would have been desirable. These spot widenings often create incoherent streets that degrade neighborhood character, undermine active transportation, reduce tree canopy, and expand impermeable surface area—all contrary to the City's mobility and sustainability goals.

New State laws to advance the production of housing will compound these issues. As the City meets our housing goals through small lot subdivisions, fourplexes, and other types of by-right multifamily development in established neighborhoods; the City's current regulations will increase the number of inconsistent spot widenings that provide minimal public benefit and make our neighborhood streets more dangerous and inhospitable. Without process changes, these undesirable dedications and improvements will happen automatically on a parcel-by-parcel basis, and will not consider the neighborhood context.

Mobility Plan 2035 identified the City's street dedication process as an obstacle to creating world-class, multimodal streets. While the WDI and appeals process, which was introduced in 2017, has provided some flexibility, recent cases of inappropriate dedications illustrate the need for further reform. By its nature, the waiver process assumes that widening is appropriate unless an exception is warranted. Given the potential harms of roadway widening and the limited benefits, the onus of this process should be reversed, with no roadway widening unless under exceptional circumstances. In some cases it may be appropriate to accept a dedication of right-of-way for future flexibility without requiring it be built out to its full width. The Bureau of Engineering should adopt new procedures that do not mandate street dedication in most cases, with limited exceptions, while still requiring appropriate public improvements to promote multimodal accessibility, good street design, and sustainable infrastructure.

I THEREFORE MOVE that the City Council instruct the Bureau of Engineering, in consultation with the Department of City Planning (DCP), the Department of Transportation (DOT), DCP's Urban Design Studio, and any other relevant departments, to report back within 60 days with:



- Recommendations to reform the waiver of dedication and/or improvement (WDI) process as well as the initial requirement process to achieve the following objectives:
 - o Preserve consistent roadway widths and curb lines on each block (eliminate spot road widenings);
 - Prioritize consistent pedestrian experience with no or minimal sidewalk meandering, context-appropriate sidewalk and parkway width, and consistent interfaces with street-facing building entrances on each block face;
 - Prioritize pedestrian safety and visibility by minimizing crossing distance at intersections and other crosswalks; ensuring alignment between pedestrian paths of travel, crosswalks, and curb ramps; minimizing curb radii to the greatest extent feasible (including retaining historic curb radii); and promoting curb extensions where feasible and appropriate;
 - Protect existing trees and parkways and create opportunities for planting new and larger shade trees;
 - o Incorporate green infrastructure elements where feasible and appropriate; and
 - Ensure accessibility for people with disabilities;
- A checklist of public benefit findings that must be made through an administrative process prior to requiring a street dedication and/or improvement that results in a roadway widening, including:
 - Specific and articulable traffic safety or mobility benefits, such as closing a bike lane gap or eliminating a pinch point, at the request of LADOT; and
 - o Specific and articulable pedestrian realm or urban design benefits, at the request of City Planning;
- Any revisions to street design standards needed to accomplish the above objectives and allow context-sensitive application of street standards;
- Any revisions needed to LAMC 12.37 and/or other policies and regulations to accomplish this direction;
 and
- Any other recommendations to implement street design best practices in the development process.

On February 25, 2022, the Council and Mayor approved funding for the development of Alvarado Kent Apartments (Project) located at 707-711 N. Alvarado Street (C.F. #22-0167). The Project will be developed by the Alvarado Kent Apartments, L.P. with SRO Commercial LLC as the General Partner (Developer) and be comprised of 80 supportive housing studio units and 1 one-bedroom manager's unit.

On June 15, 2022, the Project was awarded an allocation of federal low-income housing tax credits valued at \$24,859,000 with a deadline for closing construction financing by December 23, 2022. Interest rates and insurance costs have risen dramatically since then, increasing construction costs and reducing the Project's permanent loan amount to create a Project shortfall. In the current post-COVID environment, tax credit investors are taking risk mitigation measures including increasing operating reserve and construction contingency requirements. To help minimize these impacts the Developer has deferred most of its developer fee and extended the term of the loan out to 35 years. Investors have also agreed to waive fees, reduce returns, and increase the price paid for the tax credits.

Additional steps are required, however, to close the Project shortfall. To do so, LAHD seeks authority to use additional Housing Opportunities for People With AIDS (HOPWA) funding given that this Project is located in the Los Angeles County Department of Public Health's SPA 4 region, where 35 percent of the population, or 18,317 people, are HIV positive. This is the highest need area in Los Angeles County. LAHD seeks authority to increase its existing \$1,000,000 commitment of HOPWA funds by \$2,041,645. With these additional HOPWA funds, the Project would serve a total of 20 HIV positive individuals. The total HOPWA commitment of \$3,041,645 and the existing \$7,400,000 HOME commitment would bring the City's contribution to a cumulative \$10,441,645 or \$130,520 per unit.

I THEREFORE MOVE that the City Council, subject to approval of the Mayor, authorize the General Manager of the Los Angeles Housing Department (LAHD), or designee, to:

1. Increase funding by \$2,041,645 in Housing Opportunities for People With AIDS (HOPWA) funds to Alvarado Kent Apartments, L.P. for the Alvarado Kent Apartments located at 707-711 N. Alvarado Street (Project), as noted below, and cause these funds to be transferred to the appropriate accounts to effectuate an increase in funding for the Project:

MOTION

Since 2018, the Council and Mayor have taken several actions to dispose of City-owned property and approve funding for the development of Casa de Rosas Apartments (Project) located at 2600 S. Hoover Street. The Project, to be rehabilitated by the Casa de Rosas Campus, L.P (Developer) will be comprised of 37 supportive housing units and one manager's unit. The Project has completed construction, but has encountered challenges related to the payment of prevailing wages. At this time, the contractor is seeking its final payment but the Los Angeles Housing Department (LAHD) is unable to disburse Proposition HHH funds as there is a case open with the State's Department of Industrial Relations (DIR) related to the payment of wages. LAHD seeks authority to provide a short-term bridge loan as a protective advance to protect its security for repayment of the Project's senior construction loan.

To support this Project, the City disposed of the site, authorized a related acquisition loan for \$2,562,674, awarded a Proposition HHH loan in the amount of \$7,920,000, and issued tax exempt bonds in the amount of \$10,771,000. LAHD now seeks authority to make a short-term bridge loan to the Developer of up to \$2,672,588 as a Protective Advance. LAHD describes a Protective Advance as a loan made to protect the Project collateral and thus the City's investment of Proposition HHH dollars. Presently, the Project's construction loan will become due and payable in full on December 1, 2022. If a Protective Advance is not made at this time, the Project's construction lender, which has the Deed of Trust senior to the City's Proposition HHH and acquisition loans, may foreclose on the Project and potentially risk a full or partial loss of the City's existing funding, as well as the elimination of associated affordability restrictions for the Project.

It is expected that the Developer will pursue utilizing a Payment and Performance Bond ("PPB") to pay outstanding wages due to subcontractors. The Protective Advance funds will be used to avoid foreclosure and pay outstanding wages until such time as the PPB can be accessed. In addition, the DIR has imposed fees related to Labor Code violations. The Developer is hopeful that they may persuade the DIR to waive the fees. If unsuccessful, the Developer may pursue payment by the General Contractor for these fees.

LAHD has informed that once the wage issues are resolved, the Project can repay the construction loan and Protective Advance with permanent financing including the still-unspent Proposition HHH monies. However, it remains unclear if the available permanent sources will be sufficient to fully repay the Protective Advance at time of conversion. An extension of the Protective Advance may be warranted at that time.

I THEREFORE MOVE that the City Council, subject to approval of the Mayor, authorize the General Manager of the Los Angeles Housing Department, or designee, to:

1. Effectuate a bridge loan of up to \$2,672,588 from the Low and Moderate Income Housing Fund (LMIHF) to Casa de Rosas Campus, L.P. for the Casa de Rosas Project located at 2600 S. Hoover Street subject the terms noted below, and cause these funds to be transferred to the appropriate accounts for the Project:

- 2. Draft, negotiate, and execute loan documents to provide a bridge loan of up to \$2,672,588, subject to the approval of the City Attorney as to form;
- 3. Prepare Controller Instructions, subject to the approval of the Chief Legislative Analyst;
- 4. Disburse LMIHF funds from the bridge loan upon review by LAHD and the City Attorney and a determination by LAHD, in its sole discretion, that disbursed funds will not be used to subsidize other project cost overruns and shall only be used to pay either (i) wages due to contractors or subcontractors who are not subject to fines or penalties imposed by DIR, or (ii) other appropriate costs that must be paid in order for the project to convert to permanent financing and fully repay the senior construction loan; and
- 5. Report within 60 days on the status of the protective advance repayment and resolution of the pending prevailing wage matters.

PUBLIC SAFETY

MOTION

A crucial element in the protection of public safety during an emergency incident is the timely release of accurate information and clear instructions to every affected community. Petroleum refineries can be susceptible to incidents that can have severe short- and long-term consequences for surrounding communities. This may include large explosions and fires that result in the release of highly hazardous chemicals. Currently, three petroleum refineries operate in the City of Los Angeles and are concentrated in the Wilmington community. The City must have the ability to reliably provide local residents with information that could save lives.

The risk is recognized by the State which, pursuant to California Health and Safety Code §25536.6, requires that a local implementing agency develop an integrated alerting and notification system, in coordination with local agencies, to be used to notify the communities surrounding a petroleum refinery in the event of an incident. The costs to develop and maintain the system are to be collected by governmental agencies from petroleum refineries operating within their jurisdictions and passed along to the Local Implementing Agency.

The Fire Department is the City's Unified Program Agency and is prepared to assume the role of Local Implementing Agency for the development and maintenance of an integrated community alerting and notification system for petroleum refinery incidents but must be designated as such by the City Council prior to commencing the development of a petroleum refinery incident notification system.

I THEREFORE MOVE that the City Council designate the Fire Department (LAFD) as the Local Implementing Agency for the City of Los Angeles as it pertains to the development and maintenance of an integrated community alerting and notification system for petroleum refinery incidents in accordance with California Health and Safety Code §25532 (d).

I FURTHER MOVE that the LAFD, with assistance from the City Administrative Officer, be instructed to report within 180 days on a fee schedule to recover the costs of developing and maintaining a petroleum refinery incident notification system from petroleum refineries that operate within the City in accordance with California Health and Safety Code §25536.6.

In 2021, Council FIle 21-1039 was introduced and adopted, directing the creation of an organized city process for the conversion of all city buildings and sites to be fully decarbonized. This initiative will see to it that 600+ facilities, and over 440+ park sites are eventually fully electric, with photovoltaic and battery resiliency components. These actions are all part of the LA100 plan which will see the full conversion of Los Angeles power to 100% carbon free, renewable energy.

The 2022 State of California Building Energy Efficiency Standard was recently released, requiring most future buildings to have energy generation and storage on-site starting January 2023. The size of the Solar is dependent on certain calculations, but does not require maximizing rooftops or trying to reach zero-energy buildings. The City Council's goal of a fully decarbonized city run with carbon free renewable energy (CF: 21-0352) is within reach by 2035, carried out by initiatives such as CF: 21-1039 and others. New direction is needed to require all new-construction for municipal buildings/facilities and sites in order to reach net-zero energy, maximizing rooftop and ground-mount solar, to go above and beyond State section 140.10 within the 2022 Building Energy Efficiency Standard code.

I THEREFORE MOVE that the Bureau of Engineering, and the Los Angeles Department of Water and Power report to Council on the necessary steps to implement the elements found within the 2022 California Building Energy Efficiency Standards update, and then make further recommendations to ensure that all future city owned sites, facilities or park-sites are built to be net-zero projects that maximize solar energy generation and storage on-site.

I FURTHER MOVE that the Bureau of Engineering further incorporates the components in the above instructions related to maximization of ground-mount and roof-top solar within CF: 21-1039 (Decarbonization WorkBook) for all future related projects.

The Bureau of Street Lighting (BSL) runs the City's most used public electric vehicle program that is located on city rights-of-ways. Starting in 2016, BSL began installing hundreds of chargers across the City, focusing especially on disadvantaged communities. By the end of the 2022-2023 fiscal year, it is projected that BSL will have approximately 800+ chargers installed citywide. However, several needs are required for BSL to grow the program quickly, while ensuring proper coverage citywide.

Council's recently adopted EV Master Plan (CF: 21-0890) has already directed all city agencies, including proprietaries, to ensure a full transition to Electric Vehicles for all city agencies, including first responders and departments with heavy duty vehicles, more action is needed to ensure that the CF 21-0890 includes overlap with the BSL EV program, including LADOT for needed changes to parking policy.

The City has over 223,000 light poles which could provide easy EV access to businesses, residents and government agencies. However, there are many limiting factors that Council must consider if it is to ensure that BSL and other agencies have the proper funds and direction to continue. For example, the Bureau has approximately 13,000 "service points" throughout the city, which are needed to power exactly one light pole for EV usage. These service points needed to be expanded through collaboration with LADWP, LADOT, and other agencies if the City is to have a truly robust citywide EV charging program on the rights-of-way. Further, as we expand EV usage that will overlap with LADOT parking infrastructure, Council must get reports from both departments, including LADWP, to maximize incentives for residents, while ensuring revenue.

Staffing and infrastructure needs should be reported on, including funding needs to ensure that thousands of EV charging opportunities are presented to Angelenos as soon as possible.

I THEREFORE MOVE that the Bureau of Street Lighting, and the Department of Transportation, with the assistance of the Department of Water and Power, and the City Administrative Officer, issue a report to Council to greatly expand EV charging on the public right of way, including staffing and infrastructure needs, and the inclusion of level 3 charging options, with a visualization of the infrastructure needs citywide.

I FURTHER MOVE that the Department of Transportation, and the Bureau of Street Services, include in this report important and needed parking / revenue components that are needed to effectuate the intent of this policy, including ordinance updates.

The Inflation Reduction Act (2022) was recently adopted by the US Congress, and signed into law by President Biden. Cities, Counties, and States will benefit greatly from this and other major laws such as the 2021 Bi-Partisan Infrastructure bill, and transition to a 100% carbon free future. On October 4th 2022, CF- 22-0947 was adopted by Council Directing a full report on the maximization of this exciting new law, that provides major funding initiatives, but allows for new financing components for localities. While that report from the office of the Chief Legislative Analyst is pending, recent IRS determinations regarding tax definitions per IRA conditions relating to municipal owned projects have been released, potentially impacting all LADWP projects that require transmission infrastructure for power conveyance.

Per the White House, by 2030 the United States will have close to 1-billion solar panels, and 120,000 additional wind turbines. Together with existing infrastructure and trends in construction, results in a 1 gigaton / 1 billion metric ton emission reduction within the United States. A Los Angeles Department of Water and Power Report to Committee is needed to understand impacts to utility owned or utility built projects, including projects with tribal nations on sovereign tribal lands.

I THEREFORE MOVE that the Los Angeles Department of Water and Power report to Council on the Inflation Reduction Act (2022) regarding financing options for municipalities, including an evaluation of all options related to utility built, or utility owned photovoltaic, battery resilient, or electric vehicle / energy renewable projects in order to maximize current transmission infrastructure, including projects done in partnership with sovereign tribal governments.

Motion

The City of Los Angeles will be the first major city in the United States, and by extension the world, to fully be off fossil fuel energy by 2035. LA100 and subsequent policies are in place to ensure that the city of tomorrow is being built today. While several motions and directions have been adopted, one particular initiative requires an additional direction for an accompanying ordinance to ensure that the policy is executed firmly.

On July 15th 2022, Council adopted a direction to the CAO (CF: 22-0532) and all departments requiring that they eliminate the purchase or procurement of fossil fuel based vehicles and equipment. That direction will result in a plan that must be overseen by the CAO, but will require each department to ensure a full grasp of equipment and inventory needs. This initiative builds upon other related files, such as the LA City decarbonization workbook (CF: 21-1039), the LA City EV Master Plan (CF: 21-0890) and others, such as the newly introduced motion to create a climate focus within the office of the CAO and city budgets (CF: 22-1402).

The City of Los Angeles leads the nation in climate resilience work, including the most aggressive plans to eliminate carbon emissions and ensure clean renewable energy. While reports are pending, the Council should require that CF: 22-0532 includes a request to the City Attorney for a new ordinance that will ensure City compliance with the policy to eliminate fossil fuel procurement across all equipment and vehicles.

The ordinance should require a reporting timeframe for the CAO and all departments listed within CF: 22-0532 adopted by Council, and will require full elimination of fossil fuel purchases, with limited exemptions, by 2025.

I THEREFORE MOVE that the City Attorney be requested to draft an ordinance which will require that the City eliminate the ability to purchase fossil fuel equipment no later than January 1, 2025, except under limited exemptions to be detailed by the CAO, city agencies and departments.

I FURTHER MOVE that the City Attorney include within this draft ordinance, components that will require that the City Administrative Officer, and all departments, to issue their methodology and plan to Council in order to begin effectuating elements found within CF: 22-0532 no later than October 31, 2023, and to include an update to that plan every 6 months to Council until fully implemented.

MOTION

The City of Los Angeles maintains peak-hour traffic lanes on many streets across the City. These lanes are intended to benefit Angelenos by reducing congestion and traffic delays. However, peak-hour lanes also have potential drawbacks. Prohibiting parking along major commercial corridors could impact local businesses in areas without easily accessible off-street parking. Peak-hour lanes can prevent installation of curb extensions, bicycle lanes, or other safety measures. During off-peak hours, some motorists weave in and out of these lanes to drive at unsafe speeds.

Most peak hour lanes were installed many years ago, in an era when vehicle throughput was the primary (or only) consideration for street design, and the need for or desirability of these lanes has not been evaluated since their installation. More recently, the City has given increased attention to traffic safety and promoting alternative modes of transportation such as walking and bicycling. E-bikes, electric scooters and motorized skateboards have created new demands for dedicated space on our streets. The COVID-19 pandemic and the increase in remote work has changed traffic patterns.

The Department of Transportation (LADOT) and Metro have evaluated and are evaluating several peak-hour general travel lanes to determine whether they can be better utilized to improve transit service reliability by being converted to peak-hour bus-only lanes, including Alvarado Street, Vermont Boulevard, La Brea Avenue and Roscoe Avenue (CF# 19-0885).

However, there has not been a comprehensive review of the advantages and disadvantages of other peak-hour lanes on non-transit-priority streets, taking into account traffic congestion, traffic speed and safety, benefits and burdens to local business, and opportunities to expand the active transportation network.

I THEREFORE MOVE that the Department of Transportation be instructed to report within 90 days on a proposed work plan to evaluate all existing peak-hour travel lanes to determine whether they are still needed (and if so, the days of the week and hours when they are needed), whether the street is wide enough to accommodate bike/scooter lanes, and options for repurposing underutilized peak-hour lanes (including for transit), with priority given to streets that are on the High-Injury Network and/or have the highest posted speed limits.

The City's Mobility Plan 2035 contemplates a Neighborhood Enhanced Network (NEN) of low-traffic (or traffic-calmed) local streets that are comfortable for walking, bicycling or other low-speed modes of travel. In the Third Council District, many streets have a high potential to be part of the NEN because, although the streets themselves do not cross rivers and waterways, they have pedestrian bridges that allow passage by people using alternative modes of travel. Similarly, many pedestrian bridges and tunnels over and under the 101 Freeway in the Third District have the potential to form part of the NEN.

Some of these pedestrian bridges and tunnels are not ADA-accessible or usable by bicycles, scooters or skateboards because they have steps or are obstructed by posts or other barriers; some are not optimally useful because they are not connected to sidewalks or do not have convenient curb cuts. Lack of lighting and security concerns sometimes present issues, especially for tunnels. In the Third District, both the Los Angeles River, Aliso Creek and Browns Canyon Wash have existing or planned bicycle or multi-use paths that are part of the low-stress active transportation network. Freeway bridges and tunnels provide alternatives to congested and dangerous entrances and exits and, where the 101 closely parallels Ventura Boulevard, provide access to shopping, services, schools and jobs.

Ensuring that the pedestrian bridges and tunnels and the streets leading to them are ADA-accessible, accommodate bicycles and other low-speed wheeled devices, and are safe is a low-cost way of promoting active transportation and achieving our environmental and public health goals.

In the Third Council District, these bridges over waterways include the following:

- Los Angeles River: Variel, Vanalden, Amigo, Etiwanda
- Arroyo Calabasas: Kittridge
- Browns Canyon Wash: Valerio, Arminta
- Aliso Creek: Hart, Valerio, Arminta
- Cabaliero Creek: Doman

In the Third Council District, pedestrian bridges and tunnels over and under the 101 Freeway include the west end of Del Valle, Sale, Oakdale, Shirley, Vanalden, and Etiwanda.

1 THEREFORE MOVE that the Bureau of Engineering, in cooperation with the Department of Transportation, other relevant departments and Caltrans, to be instructed to report within 90 days with:

- A list of pedestrian bridges and tunnels in the Third Council District
- The entity that owns or has primary responsibility for maintaining the bridge or tunnel
- Resources necessary to assess each bridge and tunnel for ADA compliance, lighting and safety issues, curb cuts and other deficiencies that must be corrected to make them safe, inviting and usable by the public;
- Resources necessary to implement these improvements; and
- Potential sources for funding improvements.

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MOTION TRADE, TRAVEL AND TOURISM

On October 23rd, 2015, the most environmentally-damaging, climate-damaging and largest methane leak in United States history occurred at the Aliso Canyon gas storage facility operated by the Southern California Gas Company (SoCalGas), leaking 100,000 metric tons of methane gas into the atmosphere, forcing thousands of residents to evacuate, businesses and schools to close, and negatively impacting businesses and property values far beyond the 112-day leak duration.

The Playa del Rey gas storage facility, which was a government pilot project for the use of gas storage in California, whose operations are directly under homes in Westchester, Playa del Rey, Venice and Marina del Rey, and beneath the publically-owned Ballona Ecological Reserve, is set within an older operational infrastructure than that used at Aliso Canyon, and is situated less than five miles from Los Angeles International Airport (LAX), the second-busiest airport in the United States, and among the world's busiest cargo airports. LAX is a major economic and employment engine for the City and State.

The Playa del Rey gas storage facility is also situated in a vitally important area of Silicon Beach, where tech giants like Google, Verizon, and YouTube Space LA share the Playa Vista campus with the LA Clippers, Chargers and Rams. Above them, on the bluffs, sits Loyola Marymount University, home to nearly 10,000 students. All of these are also major economic and employment engines for the City.

Also, the Hyperion Water Reclamation Plant, the City's oldest and largest wastewater treatment facility, is situated uncomfortably close to the gas storage facility. The recent leak at Hyperion emphasized how irreplaceable the reclamation plant is to the successful maintenance of the City's operations.

A report of the California Council on Science and Technology (CCST) published in 2018 and titled, "The Long-Term Viability of Underground Gas Storage in California" warns that the Playa del Rey gas storage facility, also operated by SoCalGas, poses one of the greatest risks of all gas storage sites in the state. Factors that could contribute to a loss-of-containment include aging infrastructure, scores of poorly-abandoned non-SoCalGas wells within the operational area, subsidence, sea level rise and earthquakes.

A catastrophic blowout similar to the one that occurred at Aliso Canyon would potentially deal a devastating financial and operational blow for months if not years to LAX, to Silicon Beach, to LMU and to the people and business communities of nearby Westchester and Marina Del Rey.

I THEREFORE MOVE that the City Council request that Los Angeles World Airports (LAWA) work with the Federal Aviation Administration (FAA), the California Geologic Energy Management Division (CalGEM), the Office of Petroleum and Natural Gas Administration and Safety (OPNGAS), the Los Angeles Emergency Management Department (EMD), the Bureau of Sanitation, and the City Administrative Office (CAO), to report back on the potential physical and fiscal impacts to LAX, its flight patterns, businesses and passengers, to the Hyperion Reclamation Plant, to Silicon Beach, to Loyola Marymount University, and to the surrounding communities, should the Playa del Rey Gas Storage facility erupt in any manner like the similarly-equipped Aliso Canyon Gas Storage facility in 2015.

I FURTHER MOVE that the report should include a review of the current safety plans that outlines the industry standard of a proposed estimated evacuation radius to mitigate effusive fallout from a possible disaster.

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In 2019, and after 50 years of operations, the Navajo Generating Station (NGS) closed down and so did operations of the Kayenta coal mine associated with it. Once the shutdown was completed the multi-partied ownership agreement required the immediate cleanup and remediation of the Kayenta mine and the NGS in a process called 'reclamation' that includes among other activities the backfilling of pits, replacing topsoil, and removing the unused and outdated infrastructure and other measures to restore environmental integrity to the area.

That reclamation, while it has begun, has not been sufficient, and fears are, like with the Mojave Generating Station (MGS) and the Black Mesa coal mine, whose operations used some 45 billion gallons of groundwater to transport "slurry" and thereby shrank and polluted the local aquifer, that not enough will be done. A current temporary cessation of the reclamation activities at Kayenta Mine is cause for concern.

The City of Los Angeles through the Department of Water and Power (DWP) held an ownership stake in NGS along with the United States Department of Interior and several other entities. The impacts from decades of mining have had major impacts on the air and water quality and dried up watering holes and wells relied upon by families and livestock in the area, and some responsibility for these is borne by the ownership of NGS.

I THEREFORE MOVE that the Department of Water and Power (DWP) be requested to report to the Council in 30 days on the efforts to engage Peabody Energy, the U.S. Department of Interior and others in the funding, cleanup and complete remediation of both the Black Mesa and Kayenta Coal mines, as well as the Mojave Generating Station and the Navajo Generating Station, and related areas, including buildings, roads and rail lines.

I FURTHER MOVE that the DWP be requested to include the Navajo Nation and Hopi tribal members in these efforts of engagement and, with them, to explore the cleanup efforts and the options to reinvest in green renewable energy production within these areas as a way to help improve their local economies in only ways desired by them.

According to a study by Transport & Environment, while the aviation sector is already considered to be one of the world's top greenhouse gas (GHG) emitters, accounting for about three to four percent of total U.S. GHGs, private jets are estimated to cause five to fourteen times as much pollution as commercial planes per passenger, and 50 times as much as trains.

The 2022 United Nations Climate Change Conference of the Parties (COP 27) has ended without any binding global agreement to reduce greenhouse emissions and end the use of fossil fuels.

Cities, particularly Los Angeles, must continue to lead on emissions reductions if there is any possibility to keep global warming beneath the already-dangerous 1.5 degrees Celsius ceiling.

Hoping to influence the climate accords, NASA Jet Propulsion Laboratory climate scientist Peter Kalmus and 81 other scientists at 13 other airports in 12 different countries chained themselves to the doors of airports servicing private jets to highlight how the "jet-setting lifestyles of multi-millionaires" are aiding the destruction of the planet while governments are subsidizing the use of private jets by not requiring any taxation.

The protestors called the private jet sector "the pinnacle of climate injustice and emissions inequality."

Locally, private jets fly out of the Van Nuys Airport, LAX, Hollywood Burbank Airport, Santa Monica Municipal Airport and Long Beach Airport private plane flight is convenient, growing and subsidized through local governance, land-use policies and infrastructure investments.

The City's focus on climate justice demands a response. It is prudent and fair for wealthy polluters to pay a climate tax to help provide climate resilience assistance to the most vulnerable communities. A tax on private jet use to mitigate climate pollution also can incent cleaner technology that is in development.

I THEREFORE MOVE that the City Council direct that the City Administrative Officer (CAO), in consultation with the City Attorney, the Climate Emergency Mobilization Office (CEMO), and Los Angeles World Airports, report back on the creation of a "greenhouse gas pollution fee" for private jets flying into and out of Los Angeles airports, with the goal of funding climate mitigation for the Indigenous, frontline, low income, and labor communities represented by CEMO. The report should also consider the use of a surcharge on jet fuel used for private jet travel to encourage fuel efficiency and clean fuels and to invest in infrastructure that supports zero emission transportation alternatives.

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The City has prioritized the protection of biodiversity for most of the last decade through the recruitment of a Biodiversity Expert Panel, made up of scientists, researchers, professors and practitioners from the various world-class universities and organizations around Los Angeles.

The Bureau of Sanitation has led the Expert Panel in the creation of an LA City Biodiversity Index to count and account for the plants, animals and insects that inhabit the region, and to better prioritize their protection, especially from City-related activities.

Yet, the Los Angeles region faces a biodiversity crisis wherein over 90% of local butterflies, songbirds, and other pollinators have disappeared in the last century, driven by the heretofore unconscious replacement of local native flora with non-native plant and tree species.

The City is aware that addressing our local biodiversity crisis is necessary as part of any larger effort to address climate change risks to human health and the long term habitability of our city.

Now through the work of the Biodiversity Experts, the City more fully understands the impacts of its choices, particularly landscaping choices, on the region's future biological health.

As many Angelenos experienced during the COVID lockdown, such nature-based activities as seeing butterflies and hearing songbirds have been linked to human health benefits such as lower blood pressure and an increased sense of well-being and overall happiness.

California native landscaping plants and trees can thrive in our urban environment and furnish all the benefits non-native plants and trees can offer in terms of canopy shade to offset the heat island effect, beauty, and shade comfort for humans, while being low in maintenance costs, yet native plant and tree species provide the only true path to regional climate resilience for biodiversity, water and energy savings, and the elimination of soil amendment runoff pollution.

There are abundant and sufficient California native plant and tree options for every ornamental landscaping application in Los Angeles, including more than 30 California native tree species already on the City of Los Angeles Approved Street Tree List and over 500 California native drought tolerant plants that have been adopted into horticulture trade to fill every landscaping niche for size, shape, color, fragrance, bloom season, and beauty.

California native plant and tree species present an underutilized opportunity to foster local identity, embrace the Indigenous, geographical and cultural heritage of Los Angeles, and continue the City's trajectory of biodiversity leadership in a time of mass extinctions..



I THEREFORE MOVE that the City Council direct all relevant municipal government agencies who install landscaping, including Urban Forestry in the Bureau of Street Services, the Recreation and Parks Department, the Bureau of Engineering, the General Services Department, as well as the proprietaries, Los Angeles World Airports, the Department of Water and Power and the Port of Los Angeles, to discontinue the practice of planting non-native landscaping plants and trees and, using the ecotope map created in the LA City Index as a guide, plant only appropriate native plants and trees, except in situations where plants and trees are designed to produce food for human consumption or provide a designated recreational playing field.

I FURTHER MOVE that the City Attorney, in partnership with the Department of City Planning, be requested to draft in 120 days a land use and permitting ordinance requiring that citywide only 100% California native plants and trees be planted for all uses, governmental, commercial and residential.

I FURTHER MOVE that the Bureau of Sanitation and Environment work with the Biodiversity Expert Council on a pollinator-friendly landscaping plan that prioritizes planting the appropriate milkweed to promote the continued recovery of our beloved Monarch butterfly population.

I FURTHER MOVE that the City Council request the City Attorney draft an ordinance banning citywide by 2025 the sale of non-native plants and trees in stores, nurseries, wholesalers, and from other entities that sell landscaping plants.
