- APPROVE and AUTHORIZE the General Manager, GSD, to execute the proposed Third Amendment with Dedicated Building Services for custodial, COVID 19 disinfection, and pressure

washing services, which amends the term of contract, effective July 1, 2022 and extends the term from December 31, 2022 to December 31, 2024 including an initial one-year extension and two six-months options to extend, and increases the contract ceiling by \$8.5 million from \$20.38 million to a total of \$28.88 million, subject to the review and approval of the City Attorney.

4. INSTRUCT the GSD and other City departments that utilize this contract to ensure the availability of funding prior to contracting custodial services through this agreement.

<u>Fiscal Impact Statement:</u> The CAO reports that the cumulative contract ceiling for all three custodial contractors is \$17.15 million for the initial one-year extension. Partial funding in the amount of \$12.09 million is available in GSD's Contractual Services Account for standard and emergency custodial, COVID-19 disinfection, and pressure washing services at City facilities. The GSD and other City departments that utilize this contract must ensure funding availability prior to contracting custodial services through these amendments.

<u>Financial Policies Statement:</u> The CAO reports that the above recommendations comply with the City's Financial Policies in that the City's financial obligation is limited to funds budgeted for services rendered according to the City's Standard Provisions.

#### MOTION

At its meeting on December 6, 2022 (Letter of Determination date: December 21, 2022), the South Los Angeles Area Planning Commission denied an appeal relative to a Conditional Use Permit and a Site Plan Review, for the construction of a new seven-story, 75 feet height, 168-room hotel building, totaling 101,928 square-feet, including 3,896 square-feet of ground floor retail, 1,500 square-feet dedicated to Community Child Education Services, and 5,032 square-feet of open space, with an additional 1,284 square-feet of open space intended for the Community Education facility, within 500 feet of a residential zone, for the property located at 3685 Vermont Avenue, Los Angeles, CA 90007 (Case No. ZA-2020-55-CU-SPR-1A).

The South Los Angeles Area Planning Commission action sustained the March 25, 2022 Zoning Administrator determination which denied the Conditional Use Permit and Site Plan Review.

Action is needed to assert jurisdiction over the above-described South Los Angeles Area Planning Commission action, to conduct further review, inasmuch as the proposed project will propel further economic development by redeveloping an approximately 34,000 square foot, City-owned parcel that has been vacant since 2010.

In addition, the Appellant who is the project applicant, was selected pursuant to a highly competitive Request for Proposal process initiated by the City in 2019 to develop the property with a hotel use. The proposed project is anticipated to generate local jobs, and the hotel will generate significant tax revenue for the City; along with a community benefits package.

The Council must assert jurisdiction over this matter to ensure that further community input is obtained, and concerns are thoroughly addressed, given the significant economic development impact of the proposed project, and the potential redevelopment of an underutilized empty lot.

I THEREFORE MOVE that pursuant to Section 245 of the Los Angeles City Charter, the City Council assert jurisdiction over the December 6, 2022 (Letter of Determination date: December 21, 2022) South Los Angeles Area Planning Commission action to deny the appeal and sustain the Zoning Administrator's determination which denied the Conditional Use Permit and Site Plan Review, for the proposed construction of a 168-room hotel building; a community education facility; and open space; for the property located at 3685 Vermont Avenue, Los Angeles, CA 90007 (Case No. ZA-2020-55- CU-SPR-1A).

I FURTHER MOVE that upon assertion of jurisdiction, this matter be referred to Committee for further review.

Villa Vanowen, L.P. (Sponsor), a California limited partnership, has requested that the City of Los Angeles (City) through the Los Angeles Housing Department (LAHD) issue Multifamily Housing Revenue Bonds, in an amount not to exceed \$25,953,000 to finance the acquisition and construction of the 64-unit multifamily housing project known as Confianza (Project) located at 14142-14154 West Vanowen Street, Los Angeles, CA 91405 in Council District 2. The Project will provide 63 units of affordable housing, and one manager unit.

In accordance with the Tax Equity and Fiscal Responsibility Act of 1982 (TEFRA) and as part of the bond issuance process, LAHD conducted the required public hearing on September 29, 2022. Notice of the public hearing was published on September 22, 2022. LAHD is required to provide proof to the California Debt Limit Allocation Committee (CDLAC) that a TEFRA hearing has been conducted as part of the application process. The Sponsor has pledged to comply with all City and LAHD bond policies related to the work described in this motion, including but not limited to payment of prevailing wages for labor and project monitoring with the LAHD.

The City is a conduit issuer and is required by federal law to review and approve all projects within its jurisdiction and conduct a public hearing. The bond debt is payable solely from revenues or other funds provided by the Sponsor. The City does not incur liability for repayment of the bonds. To allow the bonds to be issued in accordance with CDLAC requirements, the Council should approve the minutes of the hearing and adopt the required Resolution (attached).

I THEREFORE MOVE that the City Council consider the attached results of the TEFRA public hearing held on September 29, 2022 for Confianza and adopt the attached TEFRA Resolution approving the issuance of bonds in an amount not to exceed \$25,953,000 for the acquisition and new construction of a 64-unit multifamily housing project located at 14142-14154 West Vanowen Street, Los Angeles, CA 91405 in Council District 2.

#### RESOLUTION

A RESOLUTION APPROVING FOR PURPOSES OF SECTION 147(f) OF THE INTERNAL REVENUE CODE OF 1986 THE ISSUANCE OF BONDS OR NOTES BY THE CITY OF LOS ANGELES TO FINANCE THE ACQUISITION, REHABILITATION, CONSTRUCTION AND EQUIPPING OF A MULTIFAMILY RESIDENTIAL RENTAL PROJECT LOCATED WITHIN THE CITY OF LOS ANGELES.

WHEREAS, the City of Los Angeles (the "City") is authorized, pursuant to Section 248, as amended, of the City Charter of the City and Article 6.3 of Chapter 1 of Division 11 of the Los Angeles Administrative Code, as amended (collectively, the "Law"), and in accordance with Chapter 7 of Part 5 of Division 31 (commencing with Section 52075) of the Health and Safety Code of the State of California (the "Act"), to issue its revenue bonds or notes for the purpose of providing financing for the acquisition, construction, rehabilitation and equipping of multifamily rental housing for persons and families of low or moderate income; and

WHEREAS, the City intends to issue for federal income tax purposes certain bonds or notes (the "Bonds") the proceeds of which will be used to finance the acquisition, construction, rehabilitation and equipping of a multifarmily rental housing project described in paragraph 6 hereof (the "Project"); and

WHEREAS, the Project is located wholly within the City; and

WHEREAS, it is in the public interest and for the public benefit that the City authorize the financing of the Project, and it is within the powers of the City to provide for such financing and the issuance of the Bonds; and

WHEREAS, the interest on the Bonds may qualify for a federal tax exemption under Section 142(a)(7) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986 (the "Code"), only if the Bonds are approved in accordance with Section 147(f) of the Code; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to the Code, Bonds are required to be approved, following a public hearing, by an elected representative of the issuer of the Bonds (or of the governmental unit on behalf of which the Bonds are issued) and an elected representative of the governmental unit having jurisdiction over the area in which the Project is located; and

WHEREAS, this City Council is the elected legislative body of the City and is the applicable elected representative required to approve the issuance of the Bonds within the meaning of Section 147(f) of the Code; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to Section 147(f) of the Code, the City caused a notice to appear in the Los Angeles Times, which is a newspaper of general circulation in the City, on September 22, 2022 to the effect that a public hearing would be held with respect to the Project on September 29, 2022 regarding the issuance of the Bonds; and

WHEREAS, the Los Angeles Housing Department held said public hearing on such date, at which time an opportunity was provided to present arguments both for and against the issuance of the Bonds; and

WHEREAS, the minutes of said hearing have been presented to this City Council;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the City Council of the City of Los Angeles, as follows:

- 1. The recitals hereinabove set forth are true and correct, and this City Council so finds. This Resolution is being adopted pursuant to the Law and the Act.
- 2. Pursuant to and solely for purposes of Section 147(f) of the Code, the City Council hereby approves the issuance of the Bonds by the City in one or more series up to the maximum amount below and a like amount of refunding bonds, pursuant to a plan of financing, to finance or refinance the Project. It is intended that this Resolution constitute approval of the Bonds: (a) by the applicable elected representative of the issuer of the Bonds; and (b) by the applicable elected representative of the governmental unit having jurisdiction over the area in which the Project is located, in accordance with said Section 147(f).
- 3. Pursuant to the Law and in accordance with the Act, the City hereby authorizes the Los Angeles Housing Department to proceed with a mortgage revenue bond program designed to provide housing within the City of Los Angeles for low and moderateincome persons through the issuance of the Bonds for the Project, in one or more series and in an amount not to exceed that specified in paragraph 6 hereof.
- 4. Notwithstanding anything to the contrary hereof, the City shall be under no obligation to issue any portion of the Bonds described in paragraph 6 hereof to be issued by the City for the Project prior to review and approval by the City and the City Attorney of the documents, terms and conditions relating to such Bonds.

On October 11, 2022 the City Council instructed the City Administrative Officer to report with recommendations to create an Office of Unarmed Response and Safety CF 22-0978. While recommendations are forthcoming, the immediate establishment of this Office is critical and will require at the minimum three staff members to solely focus on the expansion of the CIRCLE teams and the unarmed crisis response teams as a result of the Request for Proposals initiated under CF 20-0769 and effectuate the instructions in CF 22-0978.

The Office of Unarmed Response and Safety will require a Principle Project Coordinator or equivalent to oversee the work of two Senior Project Coordinators or Management Analysts, with one position focused on data collection and analysis. The establishment of this Office is necessary to coordinate with Los Angeles County in order to expand the 9-8-8 suicide and crisis hotline to include unarmed crisis response.

WE THEREFORE MOVE to appropriate and transfer \$1,000,000 from the Unappropriated Balance Fund No. 100/50, Community Initiatives Account No. 580335, to a newly created account, to immediate create the Office of Unarmed Response and Safety

WE FURTHER MOVE to instruct the City Administrative Officer, with assistance from the Chief Legislative Analyst to report back within 15 days with a status update on CF 22-0978 related to recommendations to establish the Office of Unarmed Response and Safety and when the three staff dedicated to this Office will be operational.

A 2022 study conducted by the American Psychological Association found that nearly 20 percent of all calls to law enforcement nationwide involved someone with a mental health crisis. In the City of Los Angeles, 11 of the 31 Officer-Involved-Shootings (OIS) in 2022 (35 percent) included individuals perceived to have a mental illness. The OIS that occurred just two weeks into 2023 underscores the demand for the expansion of these resources and for comprehensive evaluation of the deployment and procedures that need to be systematically addressed.

As captured by motion CF 22-0978, the City of Los Angeles continues to expand deployments of unarmed response models that can better handle mental health and domestic dispute emergencies; however these alternatives are not managed deployment by the Los Angeles Police Department (LAPD) nor are they measured for efficacy and impact.

The LAPD has been increasingly training its officers to handle these unique situations by using important social services models such as the Mental Evaluation Unit (MEU) and the Domestic Abuse Response Team (DART).

The MEU was created to assist patrol officers who are dealing with mental health-related calls. Through the MEU, individuals from a wide range of disciplinary backgrounds—including trained dispatchers, mental health professionals, and follow-up case managers—work together to determine the appropriate response to the emergency at hand.

The MEU has several subunits, including:

- The Systemwide Mental Assessment Response Teams (SMART);
- The Case Assessment Management Program (CAMP);
- The Triage Desk; and
- The MEU Training Unit.

The DART is a crisis response team that pairs domestic violence victim advocates with LAPD officers who have received special training to respond to the scene of domestic violence incidents once the scene has been rendered safe by the primary patrol unit.

However, it is important to note that a mental health or domestic violence incident is not guaranteed to receive a response from these specialized units; responses are dependent on resource availability. The LAPD reports that, at present, only one-third of mental health calls receive MEU deployment. It is of critical importance to the safety of Angelenos that we make additional investments to match the need for the aforementioned resources.

I THEREFORE MOVE that the City Administrative Office (CAO) and the Chief Legislative Analyst (CLA), with input from LAPD and all necessary departments, report back

within 30 days on the volume of mental health and domestic violence calls and incidents that occur annually within the city, as well as the capacity and response times that the current Mental Evaluation Unit (MEU) and Domestic Abuse Response Team (DART) resources can deploy. The report should include the history of growth since its origination and outline any shortfall in resources that prevents the department's ability to deploy MEU and DART teams to all qualifying incidents.

I FURTHER MOVE that the City Administrative Office (CAO) and the Chief Legislative Analyst (CLA), with assistance from LAPD and all necessary departments, report back with a budget proposal for expansion of the MEU and DART, which should include the personnel, financial resources, and deployment procedures needed to make the programs more widely available in response to mental health emergencies.
