- f. Recommendation for Council action:

ADOPT the accompanying RESOLUTION to:

- Resolve that a local emergency regarding homelessness existed in the City of Los Angeles (City) within the meaning of LAAC Section 8.21, et seq., at the time of the Mayor's December 12, 2022 Declaration of Local Emergency, which the City Council hereby ratifies.
- 2. Resolve that because the local emergency continues to exist within the City, within the meaning of LAAC Section 8.21, et seq., there is a need to continue the declared state of local emergency, which the City Council hereby ratifies and continues through 30 days from the adoption of this Resolution.

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- 3. Resolve that the declaration of the state of local emergency, pursuant to its terms, shall terminate on June 12, 2023, unless the City Council directs otherwise.
- 4. Approve and resolve that the competitive bidding restrictions enumerated in Charter Section 371(e)(6) and LAAC Sections 10.15 and 10.17 be suspended for contracts entered into by City departments, in response to the local emergency and mitigation efforts related to the homelessness emergency, with this suspension remaining in effect until September 1, 2023 or the termination of the proclaimed emergency, whichever comes first.
- 5. Insofar as the public interest and necessity demand the immediate expenditure of public funds to safeguard life, health or property, authorize the City Administrative Officer and City departments, upon direction of the Mayor, to order any action relative to the procurement of construction contracts, service provider contracts, supplies, and equipment for homelessness facilities to safeguard life, health or property caused by the proclaimed local emergency.
- 6. Resolve that the City Administrative Officer shall report every two weeks to the City Council on the reasons justifying why such aforesaid action was necessary to respond to the emergency, including why the emergency did not permit a delay resulting from a competitive solicitation for bids or proposals and why competitive proposals or bidding was not reasonably practicable or compatible with the City's interests.
- 7. In accordance with LAAC Section 8.21 et seq., instruct and request all appropriate City departments, agencies, and personnel to continue to perform all duties and responsibilities to represent the City in this matter to prevent and abate the emergency and receive, process, and coordinate all inquiries and requirements necessary to obtain whatever State and Federal assistance that may become available to the City and/or to the citizens of the City who may be affected by the emergency.
- 8. Instruct the General Manager, Emergency Management Department, to advise the Mayor and City Council on the need to extend the state of local emergency.

- 6. Request the LADWP to report to the City Council every two weeks on the reasons justifying why such aforesaid action was necessary to respond to the emergency, including why the emergency did not permit a delay resulting from a competitive solicitation for bids or proposals, and why competitive proposals or bidding was not reasonably practicable or compatible with the City's interests.
- 7. Instruct the City Clerk to forward copies of this Resolution to

the Governor of the State of California, the Director of the Office of Emergency Services of the State of California, the Los Angeles County Office of Emergency Management, and the Los Angeles County Board of Supervisors.

Fire Station 13, located at 1206 S. Vermont Ave in CD1 had historically served the Central region of Los Angeles. This 1 story, approximately 9,000 sq.ft concrete and brick structure, was constructed and opened in 1950. It was later decommissioned in 2008, upon the completion of the new Fire Station 13 at 2401 W. Pico Blvd in CD1 to meet the community's needs. Although it is not on the national or local registry of historical resources, it does meet the criteria to be classified as a Historical building. Structural, disabled access, health and safety concerns drove the need to decommission the building.

Council District 1 has identified the site for adaptive re-use, to accommodate a new Alternative Crisis Response team, City staff or a Non-Profit that will serve the area. The Council Office has requested the Bureau of Engineering (BOE) and Department of General Services- Construction Forces Division (GSD-CFD) to collaborate and develop a building assessment and subsequent feasibility study on possible uses.

The BOE and GSD-CFD have provided a cost to complete the requested studies, and request funding be routed to the accounts noted below.

On November 3, 2003, the City of Los Angeles held a Zoning Hearing for a Public Storage at 3801 Eagle Rock Blvd in Glassell Park. The development proposed an expansion that raised several concerns from the Council Office, the Glassell Park Improvement Association, and community residents. Prior to the hearing, community meetings occurred to improve the project design and elements that concluded with a commitment from Public Storage to include a community center in their expansion.

On November 19, 2003, the Zoning Administrator approved Case No: ZA 2003-4277 (CU)(ZV) as a conditional use to permit an expansion of an existing household storage use, stipulating that the new space include a 7,396 sq ft community center with 40 parking spaces. Further, it was clarified that the center function as a senior and community center, allowing the Glassell Park Improvement Association and Council Office each to have their own office space.

On June 24, 2005, Public Storage executed a 30 yr lease agreement (CF: 04-0995) with the City of Los Angeles, stating that rent for the community center not exceed \$1 per year. This lease currently specifies occupancy of only a Council Office at the center.

Over the years, organizations have moved into the center occupying single and communal rooms and parking spaces to provide services to the community, without any formal agreements. One of the groups that informally occupies the space is the Department of Recreation and Parks. To ensure that the City of Los Angeles fulfills the spirit of this community benefit born from the commitment between Public Storage and the Glassell Park community, a dedicated caretaker is necessary to manage the center and execute agreements with all current organizations. A dedicated caretaker would also ensure an equitable allocation of rooms and parking based on services to the community.

The council office. Department of Recreation and Parks, as well as the organizations who have occupied the space have been in close communication discussing the issues and are ready to formalize agreements to ensure the spirit or the project is fully realized.

I THEREFORE MOVE that City Council instruct the General Services Department to negotiate and execute a lease with the Department of Recreation and Parks to be the caretaker and manager of the site. The lease conditions must include the following:

 Policies and procedures unique to this site that ensure no costs for maintenance are passed on to other lease-holders, and ensure the center is accessible at reasonable day and evening hours;

- Clarity on which space(s) within the center are available to the Department of Recreation and Parks;
- Maintenance of a master calendar and space reservation system; and,
- Formation and management of a committee consisting of one (1) person from each occupying organization to meet monthly.

I FURTHER MOVE that City Council instruct the General Services Department to negotiate and execute a lease for 1 office with each of the following organizations:

- Glassell Park Improvement Association (non profit);
- Department of Neighborhood Empowerment- Glassell Park Neighborhood Council; and,
- Mexican American Opportunity Foundation (non-profit).

Each lease must clearly identify the specific office space for the leasee, the parking spots available to them, the storage space they are entitled to, as well as the communal spaces accessible for the organizations to utilize and reserve through the master calendar maintained by the Department of Recreation and Parks.

I FURTHER MOVE that City Council instruct the General Services Department to negotiate and execute a lease for up to 20 parking spaces for use by Shower of Hope, an organization that operates a Safe Parking Program for the Council Office under contract with the Los Angeles Homeless Services Authority.

The City of Los Angeles adopted a "Vacant Building Ordinance," effective September 30, 1999, declaring both vacant and unsecured or boarded buildings public nuisances. Additionally, the ordinance creates consequences if no action is taken by a property owner to eliminate the boarded building status and there are additional state and local laws that empower the City and its departments to abate nuisances on real property located within the City including vacant structures.

The Vacant Building Ordinance, together with other local and state laws, implement a number of strategies to abate long-standing nuisances on private property. One key avenue to reaching this goal is to abate nuisances by bringing civil and, in some cases, criminal actions. The City Attorney and her office frequently work with other departments to abate nuisances and file civil or criminal actions against property owners and tenants who fail to comply with orders issued by regulatory inspectors.

Recently, there have been an alarming number of vacant and unsecured or boarded properties in Council District 15 that have led to public safety issues, and ultimately, deterrents to the surrounding quality of life. It is important to evaluate the role of the City in working to bring forward prosecutions or other tools to mitigate this persistent problem for local residents.

I THEREFORE MOVE that the City Council direct the Los Angeles Police Department, Los Angeles Fire Department, Department of Building and Safety, Housing Department, Board of Public Works, Department of Water and Power, and Department of City Planning, to transmit to the City Attorney within thirty (30) days a report on the volume of calls, the number of boarded up, abandoned or vacant properties and the average length of time from the initial complaint through the resolution of a nuisance at a property, received by each department since January 1, 2022.

I FURTHER MOVE that the City Council request the City Attorney to submit to Council a report on the number of civil or criminal actions brought by the City Attorney's Office pursuant to the Vacant Building Ordinance or other nuisance abatement laws against property owners or tenants, and the resolution or status of such actions related to vacant and unsecured or boarded properties in Council District 15.

The Los Angeles Zoo and Botanical Gardens (LA Zoo) and the Autry Museum of the American West (Autry Museum), both located within Griffith Park, are serviced by LACMTA (Metro) Route 96, which provides service along Western Heritage Way.

While the northbound transit stop is located adjacent to the crosswalk across Western Heritage Way connecting the Zoo and the Museum, the southbound stop is located over 700 feet away, south of the Zoo entrance. The Department of Recreation and Parks (RAP) has reported that this created significant confusion among riders of the Parkline shuttle, which uses the Route 96 stops.

In order to reduce rider confusion and improve transit operations, the LA Zoo's long-range Vision Plan (C.F. 21-0828), currently in the recirculated Final EIR phase, calls for the consolidation of these stops by moving the southbound stop so that it is adjacent to the crosswalk and in line with the existing northbound stop.

I THEREFORE MOVE that the City Council instruct the Bureau of Engineering (BOE), with the assistance of the Bureau of Street Services, LADOT, RAP, the Zoo, and any other relevant departments and agencies, to develop a project delivery plan for building a transit stop for southbound Western Heritage Way on the west side of Western Heritage Way near the crosswalk to the Autry Museum and in line with the existing northbound transit stop. The transit stop should be able to accommodate Metro 40' buses, be ADA accessible, and include a shelter with seating, bus stop lighting, and a trash receptacle.

MOTION

Los Angeles is one of the most park deficient cities in the country, with many Angelenos lacking not only access to recreational facilities but to natural open spaces in their own neighborhoods. In order to address these disparities, equitable transit access to regional open spaces like Griffith Park is critical. This area of transit planning is called Transit-to-Parks and is prioritized for funding by LA Metro (LACMTA), among other transit agencies.

Every year, Griffith Park welcomes millions of visitors to experience its natural beauty, open spaces, trails, vistas, the Griffith Observatory, Greek Theatre, Travel Town, picnic areas, ballfields, tennis courts, and golf courses, among many other amenities. At the northeastern edge of Griffith Park, the Autry Museum of the American West (Autry Museum) and the Los Angeles Zoo and Botanical Gardens (LA Zoo) are some of the region's most significant and cherished attractions, serving over one million visitors each year.

The Los Angeles Department of Recreation and Parks' long-range Griffith Park Vision Plan, A Vision for Griffith Park: Urban Wilderness Identity, calls for creating more transit opportunities in and to Griffith to achieve equitable and environmental outcomes. Mitigation measures included in the LA Zoo's long-range Vision Plan (C.F. 21-0828) Recirculated Final EIR support the same goals. Both strategic plans include key targets of reducing the amount of private vehicle trips and the amount of vehicle miles traveled (VMT) to the Park and the Zoo. The Zoo's Vision Plan EIR calls for a Transportation Demand Management (TDM) plan to achieve these goals.

In 2017, the Department of Recreation and Parks (RAP), in partnership with the Los Angeles Department of Transportation (LADOT), launched a daily bus service, DASH Observatory, to the Griffith Observatory from the Metro B Line (Red) subway Vermont/Sunset Station. Clearly identified and branded bus stop markings, station ads, and a healthy advertising campaign have made this one of the most successful DASH routes in the City.

In December 2019, RAP launched the Parkline shuttle; however, the service was halted after a few weeks due to the COVID-19 pandemic. The Parkline included five buses that circulated through the northern end of Griffith Park and traveled along Los Feliz Boulevard to the south in order to access the Greek Theatre, the Griffith Observatory, and hiking trails. The Parkline demonstrated that travel conditions and needs on the northern and southern ends of the Park are quite different. A streamlined circular northern route connecting the Park (including the Zoo, Autry, and Travel Town) to other Metro B Line (Red) stations is promising for its potential to connect the entire San Fernando Valley to Griffith Park and the Zoo. The City must recognize the regional importance of increasing transit and non-private vehicle service to Griffith Park and the Zoo and should program resources and seek funding opportunities to service that goal.

I THEREFORE MOVE that the City Council instruct LADOT, with assistance from RAP, to report back within 90 days with recommendations for the redeployment of LADOT buses as a pilot Transit-to-Parks service connecting the existing Metro B Line (Red) to the Park's northern amenities, including the Zoo. The report should include suggestions for routes, termini, and stops, and should evaluate creating an interior park circulator and a Zoo-specific service, as either separate services or combined as one service. The report should also include funding and staffing needs and an analysis of the resources required to ensure service headways of 15 minutes or better.

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I FURTHER MOVE that the City Council instruct LADOT, with assistance from the City Administrative Officer, RAP, the Zoo, and any other relevant departments and agencies, to report back, within 90 days, with recommendations for the development of a comprehensive Transit-to-Parks plan for Griffith Park and the LA Zoo. These recommendations should include necessary LADOT staffing to plan and administer the LA Zoo Transportation Demand Management Plan (TDM) and coordinate Transit-to-Parks planning and implementation for Griffith Park.

I FURTHER MOVE that the City Council instruct LADOT, with assistance from the Zoo and RAP, to report back within 90 days with a proposal to implement a BlueLA car-sharing station at the LA Zoo.
