CONSIDERATION OF MOTION (YAROSLAVSKY – KREKORIAN – McOSKER) relative to requesting the Los Angeles Department of Water and Power (LADWP) to report on the status of the power pole inspection program and related matters.

Recommendations for Council action:

- 1. INSTRUCT the LADWP to report to the Council as soon as the possible on the following:
 - a. The status of "priority one" pole repairs, including how many were classified as priority one at the highest point of the backlog, the number of poles still requiring urgent repairs, the average time to repair new priority poles, and the plan and timeline for completing these urgent repairs.
 - b. The steps the department has taken to address inspections

- and ensure that (i) the data collected by internal crews and contractors are reconciled accurately and publicly reported where legally permissible, and (ii) that work is dispatched in a timely manner and properly prioritized.
- c. The status and location of "priority two", or less urgent, pole repairs, and how the Council and residents can be assured that the department is prioritizing potential hazards within that universe of power poles.
- d. A detailed explanation of how a backlog of priority repairs was allowed to develop and the changes to LADWP policies and processes to ensure that no threat to public health or safety goes unaddressed.
- e. What investments the department has made in improving the power distribution infrastructure over the past 10 years and how these critical pole repairs were not made in the context of Power System Reliability Program and other initiatives to improve reliability and resiliency.
- f. What resources will be necessary to ensure the timely completion of the pole repair program.
- g. Specific recommendations to ensure that the now deficient inspection repair program is meeting the safety needs of the public.
- h. Planned ongoing investments to improve reliability and resiliency of the power system.

2. INSTRUCT the LADWP to:

a. Provide quarterly written reports to Council on the implementation of its Power System Reliability Programs, including the pole inspection program, status of pole repairs, a map with the location of the top priority and secondary priority poles, and compliance with state regulations. b. Continue to do so until all of the currently identified second tier priority repairs are fully completed.

TO CITY CLERK FOR PLACEMENT ON NEXT MOTION BULLAR COUNCIL AGENDATO BE POSTED

The existing pedestrian crosswalk at Ventura Boulevard and Ventura Canyon Avenue is controlled by an overhead yellow flashing beacon. A recent traffic engineering study conducted by the Los Angeles Department of Transportation (LADOT) indicates that this location is suitable for Pedestrian Hybrid Beacons. These traffic control devices are designed to help pedestrians safely cross higher-speed roadways at midblock crossings and uncontrolled intersections. The devices are activated when a pedestrian desiring to cross the street pushes the call button which then initiates a yellow to red lighting sequence that directs motorists to slow and come to a stop, and provides the right-of-way for the pedestrians to safely cross the roadway.

On May 4, 2023, the Plan Review Board of the Ventura/Cahuenga Boulevard Corridor Specific Plan voted to support making the improvements noted in the LADOT report. In order to include the project in LADOT's work plan for design and construction, funding must be identified.

I THEREFORE MOVE that the Council, subject to approval of the Mayor, establish a new capital project entitled "Ventura Boulevard/Ventura Canyon Avenue Pedestrian Hybrid Beacons" and appropriate/transfer \$175,000 from Ventura/Cahuenga Boulevard Corridor Specific Plan Fund No. 523, Available Cash Balance, to Capital Improvement Expenditure Program Fund No. 100-54, new account "Ventura Boulevard/Ventura Canyon Avenue Pedestrian Hybrid Beacons" for the design and construction of pedestrian hybrid beacons at this location.

Vista Del Mar is a significant north-south traffic route that is used by vehicles on a daily basis and is even more heavily used during the summer beach season. MOTION

Los Angeles Fire Department (LAFD) Station 76 sits on North Cahuenga Boulevard in the Cahuenga Pass. Built in 1951, this small, yet critically important station, the Guardians of the Pass, contend with areas of extreme wildfire risk in a Very High Fire Severity Zone along a busy arterial street with fast speeds and frequent traffic collisions on the roadway.

In fact, a vehicle strike occurred at the station on March 9, 2021, damaging a property perimeter masonry wall. In order to reduce the risk to firefighters working out of Station 76 and to ensure the station can remain in full service, the City should install bollards or other improvements to protect the station from future potential vehicle strikes.

I THEREFORE MOVE that the Bureau of Engineering, with the assistance of the Department of General Services, the Los Angeles Fire Department (LAFD), and any other relevant departments, be instructed to report back within 90 days with a project development plan and potential funding sources to fortify LAFD Station 76 to protect the station from vehicle strikes, including recommendations for the placement of bollards or other protective installations.

RESOLUTION RULES, ELECTIONS, INTERGOVERNMENTAL RELATIONS

WHEREAS, the U.S. Constitution guarantees the right to a trial by a jury of peers, but currently most juries tend to be not reflective of our communities' economic or racial diversity; and

WHEREAS, if a juror's employer does not cover their salary, jurors earn nothing on their first day of service and only \$15 per day after that; and

WHEREAS, California has the fourth highest cost of living, followed by Massachusetts, Washington D.C. and Hawaii, all of which pay their jurors at least double than the rate paid in California; and

WHEREAS, since jury pay was enacted in California in the 1950s, the stipend has only been increased one time in 2000, over two decades ago; and

WHEREAS, because many low-income families cannot afford to forfeit days, weeks, or months of their salary, they file a claim of financial hardship and are excused from service; and

WHEREAS, a 2004 report presented to the Judicial Council from the Task Force on Jury System Improvements, the Commission called the rate paid to California jurors for daily service and mileage "insulting"; and

WHEREAS, consequently, jury pools tend to be composed of people who can afford to serve unpaid or whose employers will pay them while they're serving; and

WHEREAS, in 2021, Governor Newsom signed Assembly Bill (AB) 1452 (Ting), which created the "Be The Jury" pilot program at the San Francisco Superior Court, where jury pay for criminal cases was increased to \$100 for low to moderate income San Franciscans; and

WHEREAS, the "Be The Jury" pilot program in San Francisco had the following results: (1) the diversity of program participants matched San Francisco's at-large population, where 63 percent of participants identified as "people of color;" (2) the average household income for participants was under \$40,000, significantly below the \$97,000 area median household income in San Francisco; and (3) 81% of participants said they would not have been able to participate in jury duty without financial assistance from the pilot program; and

WHEREAS, the City of Los Angeles is one of the most racially diverse cities in the United States, and its leadership is committed to equity and inclusion for all Los Angeles residents, particularly those who are impacted by the criminal justice system; and

WHEREAS, AB 881, introduced by Assemblymember Ting in February 2023, would apply the "Be The Jury" program statewide by increasing jury pay for criminal cases to \$100 per day of jury service for low to moderate-income Californians; and

WHEREAS, AB 881 also makes \$15 the base rate of pay—rather than the cap, which it currently is—giving courts flexibility to increase pay for civil or criminal cases should they choose to in order to promote more economically and racially diverse jury panels across the State so that they accurately reflect community demographics; and

WHEREAS, to be eligible for the statewide program, an individual's income for the past 12 months would have to be less than 80% of the area median income and one of the following additional criteria would have to be met: (1) their employer does not compensate for jury service or for the estimated duration of jury service; (2) they are self-employed; or (3) they are unemployed; and

WHEREAS, AB 881 passed the California Assembly Public Safety Committee with bipartisan support, and is supported by both prosecutors and public defenders across the state;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, with the concurrence of the Mayor, that by adoption of this Resolution, the City of Los Angeles hereby includes in the 2023-2024 State Legislative Program SUPPORT for AB 881 (Ting) and urges the California State Legislature and California Governor to pass this bill in order to remove financial hardship barriers to increase the diversity of criminal juries in the City of Los Angeles and across the State of California.
