However, funds other than assessment revenue must be budgeted annually for the general benefit expense for the remaining years of the District's seven-year term.

The results of the most recent 2022 Point-In-Time Count from the Los Angeles Homeless Services Authority revealed that nearly 6,500 people are experiencing homelessness in 4,000 RVs across Los Angeles. This represents a 40% increase since 2018, comprising 22% of the City's total unsheltered homeless population.

This challenge is particularly felt in the 11th Council District, where RVs used for dwelling purposes have created significant environmental, health, and public safety risks. As recently as June 23, 2023, a mother and her children narrowly escaped an RV fire in Venice that resulted from an alleged domestic violence incident.

To address the dire circumstances on the ground, the council office of the 11th District has been working with the City Administrative Officer and local service providers to bring people living in RVs permanently indoors. This involves close coordinated outreach, identifying and securing interim and permanent housing and disposing relinquished RVs, in addition to immediate goals of identifying short-term storage lots, expanded safe parking programs, and offering financial incentives to move individuals living in RVs into interim or permanent housing. In spite of this progress, greater resources are needed to build on these existing efforts.

I THEREFORE MOVE that the Council instruct the City Administrative Officer to set-aside \$500,000 from the Fiscal Year 2023-24 Citywide Recreational Vehicle Program line item in the Unappropriated Balance for an RV Rehousing Pilot Program in the 11th District, in coordination with the local council office, that will provide motel vouchers, interim housing, housing navigation services, RV specific services, supportive services and permanent supportive housing.

The City of Los Angeles is experiencing an eviction crisis unlike any other; the COVID-19 eviction protections for non-payment of rent have expired. Since April 2023, renters must pay their full current monthly rent to avoid eviction for non-payment of rent. While some renters have been caught off guard, most tenants need more help navigating the legal process when targeted for eviction. Tenants who receive an eviction complaint called an Unlawful Detainer for unpaid rent, must file an answer with the court within five days or risk losing by default without ever getting a trial. Tenants need more time to secure that help.

All notices to terminate a tenancy for all rental units subject to City's Rent Stabilization Ordinance (RSO) and the Just Cause Ordinance (JCO) must be filed with the Los Angeles Housing Department (LAHD) within three (3) business days of service on the tenant per Los Angeles Municipal Code 151.09.C.9 & 165.05.B.5. Notifying City officials days after a notice to terminate tenancy has been delivered to the tenant hinders the ability of the tenant and the City to ensure a fair and legal process. City officials should be notified prior to a tenant being issued a termination of tenancy.

Questionable and illegal evictions only fuel the rise in homelessness and the unhoused, while disproportionately affecting people of color and lower/fixed income individuals and families. This is an extremely costly way for taxpayers and the City to provide services, when a right to legal counsel with adequate notice and education reduces those costs dramatically and allows the City to build parks, repair streets, and improve the quality-of-life. It is imperative that the City and the LAHD change the process of notification, in line with other Council actions and funding to help put in place model tenant protections.

WE THEREFORE MOVE that the City Council REQUEST the City Attorney's office, with the assistance of LAHD, to prepare and present a draft ordinance that would require all notices to terminate a tenancy for any rental unit subject to the RSO, JCO, or other applicable laws in the City of Los Angeles be filed with the LAHD, Mayor's Office, and Council District three business days prior to the service on the tenant. This draft ordinance shall include an urgency clause given the nature of the eviction crisis.

During the 2023-24 Budget deliberations, \$13.25M was allocated to Unarmed Crisis Response in the Unappropriated Balance. In addition, Council approved a recommendation that would allow the Crisis and Incident Response through Community Lead Engagement (CIRCLE) team expansion to be an eligible expense for the Unarmed Crisis Response line item in the Unappropriated Balance.

Expanding this unarmed approach would enhance the public safety response in all areas of the City. Currently, there is a great need for a CIRCLE Team in the Harbor Area in Council District 15. A new CIRCLE Team in this area would benefit both first responders and the community.

I THEREFORE MOVE that \$1.5M from the Unappropriated Balance – Unarmed Crisis Response line item be transferred to a new line item in the General City Purposes Fund 100/56, Account No. TBD, for a new CIRCLE Team in the Harbor Area in Council District 15.

I FURTHER MOVE that City Administrative Officer be authorized to prepare Controller instructions and that the Controller be authorized to implement these instructions and to make technical adjustments that may be required and are consistent with this action.

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Across the street from Los Angeles City Hall, at the corner of 1st Street and Broadway, is the site of a 1931 state office building red-tagged after the 1971 Sylmar earthquake, and partially demolished in 1976. In 2013 the lot was finally purchased by the City of Los Angeles from the State of California with the intention of turning it into a park to complement Grand Park next door. Following acquisition, the City held a design competition, solicited community feedback, and ultimately selected a design for a state-of-the-art park featuring a restaurant, arts plaza, and ample shade trees. As the project progressed it became clear that the cost to build the project as designed dramatically outpaced the funding available to construct it.

Over the decade of City ownership of First and Broadway, the number of Angelenos experiencing homelessness has increased exponentially. In Downtown Los Angeles alone, nearly 7,000 people – about one sixth of the City's unhoused population – are currently experiencing homelessness. Since October 2020, Council District 14 has added over 1,800 beds to the City's stock of temporary housing however more units are still urgently needed to bring people inside as soon as possible

While the City remains firmly committed to the goal of turning this parcel into a recreational space that can be enjoyed by all Angelenos, the homelessness crisis demands an "all hands on deck" approach. The City must use 217 West 1st Street, Assessor Parcel Number (APN) 5161005925 to provide additional temporary housing for people experiencing homelessness in Downtown Los Angeles.

I THEREFORE MOVE that the Bureau of Engineering (BOE) be instructed to develop a design for temporary homeless housing on the parcel located at 217 West 1st Street, APN 5161005925 (First and Broadway).

I FURTHER MOVE that BOE be instructed to include an analysis of the suitability – as measured by factors including but not limited to: resident safety and quality of life, staff safety, and access to on-site services – of various types of temporary housing in the design proposal.

I FURTHER MOVE that BOE be instructed to coordinate with the Department of Recreation and Parks on the placement of all utilities at First and Broadway to ensure optimal placement for future park usage.

I FURTHER MOVE that the City Administrative Officer be instructed to identify the necessary funding to construct temporary homeless housing on the aforementioned site.

I FURTHER MOVE that the Los Angeles Homeless Services Authority be requested to prioritize unhoused individuals in Downtown Los Angeles for placement in all temporary units at First and Broadway.

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RESOLUTION

WHEREAS, any official position of the City of Los Angeles with respect to legislation, rules, regulations or policies proposed to or pending before a local, state or federal governmental body or agency must first have been adopted in the form of a Resolution by the City Council with the concurrence of the Mayor; and

WHEREAS, The Control, Regulate and Tax Adult Use of Marijuana Act (AUMA), an initiative measure, authorizes a person who obtains a state license under AUMA to engage in commercial adult-use cannabis activity pursuant to that license and applicable local ordinances; and

WHEREAS, Existing law provides that taxes imposed under the Cannabis Tax Law are in addition to any other tax imposed by a city or county; and

WHEREAS, The Sales and Use Tax Law defines the term "gross receipts" for these purposes to mean the total amount of the sale or lease or rental price of the retail sales of retailers, valued in money, whether received in money or otherwise; and

WHEREAS, California Senate Bill SB 512, introduced by Senator Bradford, seeks to amend the state's tax code to establish a clarified definition of gross receipts tax on the sale of cannabis and cannabis products; and

WHEREAS, This bill recognizes the need to update the state's tax system to ensure that the cannabis industry is contributing its fair share to support vital public services, such as education and healthcare; and

WHEREAS, The clarification of gross receipts tax proposed in this bill would provide a stable source of revenue for the city, while also allowing the cannabis industry to continue to grow and thrive.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, with the concurrence of the Mayor, that by adoption of this Resolution, the City of Los Angeles hereby includes in the 2022-2023 State Legislative Program SUPPORT for SB512 (Bradford) which would exclude from the term terms "gross receipts" and "sales price" under the Sales and Use Tax Law the amount of the cannabis excise tax imposed under the Cannabis Tax Law and the amount of any tax imposed by a city or county on the privilege of engaging in commercial cannabis activity.

Los Angeles, like all corners of the United States, is in the midst of a deadly opioid crisis. One factor that differentiates the opioid crisis from other drug epidemics, however, is that we are fortunate to have a way to reverse opioid overdoses. Naloxone is a drug that blocks opiate receptors in the nervous system and is available to be administered through a nasal spray or injection. A simple nasal spray, when administered correctly, can be the difference between life and death for someone experiencing an opioid overdose.

The Los Angeles Unified School District (LAUSD) and the Los Angeles Public Library (LAPL), as well as many nonprofits and community-based organizations have instituted programs around Naloxone training and/or distribution already, saving countless lives from overdose-related deaths. The more that Naloxone and the proper training on its administration is distributed throughout our communities, the more lives can potentially be saved. While supplying our City workers and outward-facing Departments with Naloxone is an important piece of harm reduction efforts, getting it into the hands of community members is a crucial step towards combating opioid-related deaths.

I THEREFORE MOVE that the City Administrative Officer (CAO) be instructed to report within 30 days on City facilities, including but not limited to those operated or contracted for operation by the Department of Recreation and Parks (RAP), Community Investment for Families Department (CIFD), Los Angeles Fire Department (LAFD), Economic and Workforce Development Department (EWDD), Los Angeles Public Library (LAPL), and the Youth Development Department (YDD), that could stock Naloxone and distribute it to the public.

I FURTHER MOVE that the CAO be instructed to report within 30 days on City Departments that could contract with service providers to provide Naloxone trainings for the public as part of their programming.

I FURTHER MOVE that the CAO identify existing City monies as well as County, State, and Federal grant opportunities to fund the above-described programs.

RESOLUTION

WHEREAS, any official position of the City of Los Angeles with respect to legislation, rules, regulations or policies proposed to or pending before a local, state or federal governmental body or agency must first have been adopted in the form of a Resolution by the City Council; and

WHEREAS, in 2017, California was the seventh largest producer of crude oil (US EIA), and the US EPA estimates that in 2019, approximately 6.6 million metric tons equivalent of C02 were emitted nationally from idle wells in 2019; and

WHEREAS, there is a large number of nonproductive wells in the state, known as idle wells, which have not produced oil for at least two years and have not been plugged and decommissioned; and an additionally large number of marginally-producing wells; and

WHEREAS, there are about 107,000 active and idle oil wells in California. At some point all of these wells will end their productive life and the operator/owner of the well will be required to carefully plug the well with cement and decommission the production facilities, restoring the well site to its prior condition; and

WHEREAS, orphan wells that are not properly plugged and abandoned pose a threat to public health, safety, and environment, potentially leaking oil, injected fluids, or formation water into nearby underground sources of drinking water or surface waters and releasing methane, volatile organic compounds, hydrogen sulfide or other gases into groundwater or the atmosphere; and

WHEREAS, Assembly Bill 1167 (W. Carrillo) seeks to protect Californians by introducing the Orphan Well Prevention Act, which will require anyone acquiring the rights to operate a well or production facility to file a bond commensurate with the full costs of plugging, abandonment and site restoration of the well once operation ceases; and

WHEREAS, the California Geologic Energy Management Division (CalGEM) of the California Department of Conservation has estimated that there are already more than 5,300 idle wells across the state that are likely "orphaned" without a solvent operator to properly plug and abandon them, including approximately 1,400 across Los Angeles County; and

WHEREAS, there is an ongoing significant risk that more wells will become orphaned in the future if idle and marginal wells are transferred to less solvent operators who are unable to fulfill their obligations to properly plug and abandon them; and

WHEREAS, current levels of bond funding collected by the state are entirely inadequate to cover the costs of properly plugging, abandonment and site restoration of orphan wells, such that liability to conduct these activities will fall to the state and its taxpayers, which does not have the funds available to remediate as compared to the profits of the oil and gas production industry;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that by the adoption of this Resolution, the City of Los Angeles hereby includes in its 2023-2024 State Legislative Program SUPPORT for AB 1167 (W. Carrillo), the Orphan Well Prevention Act, which requires that buyers and operators of oil and gas wells post a bond sufficient to cover the full cost of plugging, abandonment and site restoration after production stops.

In accordance with the City of Los Angeles' Housing Code, the Los Angeles Housing Department (LAHD) must conduct regular periodic inspections of residential rental units on properties with two or more units. To do so, LAHD operates the Systematic Code Enforcement Program (SCEP). LAHD also conducts complaint based inspections at properties for which a complaint has been filed.

The purpose of SCEP and the complaint inspection program is to verify compliance with the standards set forth in the applicable building and housing codes. The SCEP and complaint inspection programs maintain the quality of life enjoyed by the residents of the City. To date, lead and mold inspections are not part of SCEP or the complaint inspection program. Any required or complaint driven inspections are referred to the Los Angeles County Department of Public Health. While LAHD provides a Lead Hazard Remediation Program, this grant program is available only after lead has been found in a residential unit or building.

Lead and mold testing are core services that should be part of the City's SCEP program. There are approximately 118,000 properties with 624,000 units that are covered under the Rent Stabilization Ordinance and at least another 100,000 non-RSO units covered by the SCEP program. Given the advances in technology and testing, the City of Los Angeles should incorporate lead and mold testing as part of SCEP.

WE THEREFORE MOVE that the City Council INSTRUCT the LAHD, with the assistance of the City Administrative Officer (CAO) and the Chief Legislative Analyst, to report back in 60 days with recommendations to require lead and mold inspections as part of SCEP beginning July 1, 2025. This shall include an analysis of any personnel or changes needed to LAHD's Regulatory and Code Compliance Bureau to implement the recommendations.

WE FURTHER MOVE that the Council INSTRUCT the CAO, with the assistance of LAHD, to report back with a fee study that would increase the RSO and/or SCEP fee to pay for mold and lead inspections on a regular basis.

WE FURTHER MOVE that the Council INSTRUCT the LAHD to report back on the feasibility of exempting small mom-and-pop landlords from a fee increase who have been good stewards of their property and have not been involved with the Rent Escrow Account Program.

WE FURTHER MOVE that the Council REQUEST the City Attorney's office, with the assistance of LAHD, to prepare and present a draft ordinance that would require lead and mold inspections as part of SCEP.
