

WHEREAS, homelessness is tragic, avoidable, unjust, and a public health hazard for all citizens, and thus, reducing and preventing homelessness should be a priority for all; and

WHEREAS, the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development requires Continuums of Care to conduct a Point-in-Time count of homeless individuals once every two years, which the Los Angeles Homeless Services Authority (LAHSA) conducts annually inasmuch as it has purpose and benefits that extend far beyond federal requirements; and

WHEREAS, in 2023 there were approximately 46,260 individuals experiencing homelessness in the City of Los Angeles, a 10% increase from the previous year, according to LAHSA; and

WHEREAS, the Homeless Count will take place on the evenings of January 23, 24, and 25, 2024; and

WHEREAS, the Homeless Count provides critical data for the strategizing, decision-making, and funding needed to reduce and prevent homelessness across the City of Los Angeles and provides a demographic and geographic snapshot of homelessness for nonprofit and community-based service providers, elected officials, and other stakeholders; and

WHEREAS, the Homeless Count provides an avenue for tracking changes in size and characteristic of the homeless population in the City of Los Angeles, thereby allowing officials to monitor progress towards reducing and preventing homelessness in their respective jurisdictions; and

WHEREAS, the City of Los Angeles should fully support this effort and encourage volunteer participation while increasing public awareness of homelessness to work towards the goal of reducing and preventing homelessness; and

WHEREAS, the Homeless Count cannot be successful without the assistance of thousands of volunteers who partner with LAHSA and provide their time to help enumerate individuals experiencing sheltered and unsheltered homelessness;

**NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED**, that the Council of the City of Los Angeles, by the adoption of this Resolution, hereby declares the week beginning January 22, 2024, as Homeless Count Week 2024 and directs all City Departments and agencies to support LAHSA in conducting the 2024 Greater Los Angeles Homeless Count by encouraging staff to volunteer and responding completely and in a timely manner to LAHSA's requests for assistance in this effort.

MOTION

To support the implementation of the Inside Safe Initiative, the City Council established the Homelessness Emergency Account and the Inside Safe Reserve Account to enable the Mayor to address the homelessness emergency with urgency and to enable the City Council to exercise oversight over the budget and to provide transparency into Inside Safe expenditures throughout the year. Since the adoption of the City's budget for Fiscal Year 2023-2024, 33 Inside Safe operations have occurred across the City, moving 2,008 individuals safely indoors in concert with Council Offices, City Departments, the County of Los Angeles, the Los Angeles Homeless Services Authority, and service providers. To ensure transparency and allow sufficient time for Council review of expenditures and anticipated encumbrances, clarification of the prior Budget instruction is needed.


I THEREFORE MOVE that the 2023-24 Budgetary Nondepartmental Footnote - No. 11 (Inside Safe Reserve) be amended to replace the current language with the following:


Authorize the Controller to transfer \$25 million from the Inside Safe Reserve Account to the Homelessness Emergency Account any time during the fiscal year that the Homelessness Emergency Account shows an uncommitted balance below \$25 million, until the full \$184,300,000 in the Inside Safe Reserve Account is allocated, unless further action is taken by Council to modify the transfer instructions.

Further, the City Administrative Officer (CAO) will provide written notification to the Mayor, Council and Controller any time the balance of the Homelessness Emergency Account is anticipated to be reduced to below \$25 million. The CAO will provide notice 14 days prior to the request to the Controller to effectuate the transfer. The Council may change this transfer instruction with a simple majority vote, subject to the Mayor's veto.

The Mayor will provide one report each month to the Council regarding the Inside Safe Program, to be submitted on a schedule that allows for these reports to be heard at a meeting of the Council's Housing and Homelessness Committee. The report shall cover the programmatic elements of the Inside Safe efforts and shall cover the financial aspects of the program, including actual and planned expenditures and all contracts executed. For unspent funds during the fiscal year, and actual and committed expenditures beyond Fiscal Year 2023-24, this report will be referred to the Housing and Homelessness and Budget, Finance and Innovation Committees.



MOTION

Nuisance Abatement as defined by state law and the municipal code is an area within policing and code enforcement that the City of Los Angeles and other jurisdictions use to ensure quality-of-life is maintained at a high standard, and rogue property owners and businesses are restricted or removed for non-compliance with life and health safety laws and regulations. The term refers to using building codes, fire codes, zoning, etc. in order to improve the quality of life and resolve these life and health safety issues within neighborhoods.

In the development of cannabis land use restrictions for onsite retail activity, one area that is missing is restricting proximity to, and utilization of, previous properties that have been nuisance abated and have had previous business operations or other issues closed down and cleaned up. These properties typically continue to be a nuisance to the City and the surrounding neighbors, and the property owners should not be rewarded with lucrative leases based on their previous record of bad behavior and non-compliance.

The City of Los Angeles and the Department of Cannabis Regulation (DCR) should move forward on restricting proximity to, and the use of, nuisance abatement properties for onsite commercial cannabis activity as quickly as possible and before permanent licenses are issued.

**WE THEREFORE MOVE** to INSTRUCT the City Planning Department (CPD), with the assistance of DCR, to initiate amendments for consideration by the Citywide Planning Commission that would amend Article V, Chapter X of the Los Angeles Municipal Code (LAMC) relative to regulating onsite retail commercial cannabis activity to add nuisance abatement properties, as adjudicated under Sections 12.27.1 and 91.9001 et. al. of the LAMC to the list of sensitive uses.

**WE FURTHER MOVE** to INSTRUCT the CPD, with the assistance of DCR, to initiate amendments for consideration by the Citywide Planning Commission that would amend Article V, Chapter X of the Los Angeles Municipal Code (LAMC) relative to regulating commercial cannabis activity to ban the use of nuisance abatement properties for onsite retail commercial cannabis activity.

**WE FURTHER MOVE** to INSTRUCT the CPD, with the assistance of the DCR, to report back to the PLUM Committee within 30 days with a list and map of nuisance abated properties in the City of Los Angeles that would be affected by this proposed ordinance.

On March 26, 2019, the Council approved the use of \$2,509,718 in taxable and tax-exempt CRA/LA Excess Non-Housing Bond Proceeds (EBP) available to Council District 3 (CD 3) from the Reseda/Canoga Park Redevelopment Project Area (Project Area) toward the Sherman Way Streetscape Phase II Project (Phase II Project) consisting of safety improvements to the public right-of-way (C.F. 14-1174-S24). Subsequently, on November 8, 2019, the City Council approved the use of the remaining taxable and tax-exempt interest derived from the Project Area be utilized for the Phase II Project (C.F. 14-1174-S90). The Board of Public Works, Bureau of Engineering, as the designated implementing department, reports that the Phase II Project has been completed and \$966,574 in earned interest (as of June 30, 2023), along with current and future earned interest, is available for reprogramming.


On March 26, 2019, the Council approved the use of \$350,000 in taxable EBP available to CD 3 from the Project Area toward the Victory/Vanalden Traffic Signal Project (Victory/Vanalden Project) consisting of a traffic signal and crosswalk installation (C.F. 14-1174-S47). The Department of Transportation, as the designated implementing department, reports that the project has been completed and \$128,391 in remnant funds is available for reprogramming.


Council action is needed to revert the remnant EBP funds identified above so that it may be reprogrammed toward other eligible uses.

I THEREFORE MOVE that the Council Action of November 8, 2019, relative to approving the use of all of the remaining taxable and tax-exempt interest earned in CRA/LA Excess Non-Housing Bond Proceeds (EBP) available to Council District 3 (CD 3) from the Reseda/Canoga Park Redevelopment Project Area (Project Area) toward the Sherman Way Streetscape Phase II Project (C.F. 14-1174-S90) BE AMENDED to limit the amount of interest approved to the Phase II Project to \$365,725 and revert \$966,574 in interest earned as of June 30, 2023, and all current and future earned interest, to its original source.

RESOLUTION

WHEREAS, California Vehicle Code Section 22507 authorizes cities to restrict the parking of vehicles, including but not limited to, vehicles that are six feet or more in height, on identified City streets during certain hours; and

WHEREAS, the Los Angeles Municipal Code Section 80.69.4 allows the Council to authorize by resolution, the streets upon which the parking of oversized vehicles shall be restricted between 2:00 a.m. and 6:00 a.m.; and

WHEREAS, there is an increased problem with oversized vehicles parking along a segment of Tampa Avenue where large vehicles are often parked overnight and constrict travel lanes, thereby creating dangerous situations;

NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, that the City Council, pursuant to the Municipal Code Section 80.69.4, and the California Vehicle Code Section 22507, hereby prohibits the parking of vehicles that are in excess of 22 feet in length or over 7 feet in height, during the hours of 2:00 a.m. and 6:00 a.m. along Tampa Avenue between the 101 Freeway and Topham Street.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that upon the adoption of the Resolution, the Department of Transportation be directed to post signs giving notice of a "tow away, no parking" restriction for oversized vehicles, with the specific hours detailed, at the above locations; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Department of Transportation be authorized to make technical corrections or clarifications to the above instructions in order to effectuate the intent of this Resolution.
