

The City of Los Angeles is currently facing an epidemic in the form of pedestrian collisions. In 2022, 312 pedestrians were killed in traffic collisions, the highest number of fatalities in over 20 years. In order to address the epidemic, CF 21-1134 called for the upgrading of all uncontrolled crosswalks in the city to add flashing beacons to alert drivers when pedestrians are crossing. Both the FY21-22 and FY22-23 budgets included funding for this program to upgrade all crosswalks over multiple fiscal years. Because the FY22-23 only included 25% of the funding requested by the department, implementation of these safety measures will take additional time and resources.

While the implementation will take some time through the city's budget, collisions are happening constantly and safety measures must be implemented faster. Just last year, a child lost their leg due to a hit and run by a speeding motorcycle at the intersection of Whittier Boulevard and Orme Street in Boyle Heights. The department installed temporary measures to improve safety, but a more robust traffic control device is needed at this intersection.

I THEREFORE MOVE that \$175,000 in the Council District 14 portion of the Street Furniture Revenue Fund No. 43D, Dept. 50 be transferred / appropriated to the Department of Transportation Trust Fund 840, Department 94, Account TBD to pay for a Pedestrian Hybrid Beacon at Whittier Boulevard and Orme Street.

There are some communities in the City that have longstanding issues associated with unabated nuisance properties, which create blight and crime and adversely affect the public's health, peace and safety of persons residing or working in the premises and surrounding area.

There is a property in Council District 8, *New Bay Motel*, located at 8301 S. Figueroa Street, Los Angeles, CA 90044, that has been a source of criminal and other nuisance activity as evidenced by arrests performed and other criminal activity observed by the Police Department.

On October 25, 2023, pursuant to Municipal Code Section 12.27.1 (Administrative Nuisance Abatement Proceedings), the Council declared the site to be a public nuisance and required the discontinuance of the motel use and any similar land uses at the property (Council File No. 23-0911).

Given that the New Bay Motel continues to operate notwithstanding the Council's action as to the discontinuance of the motel use, the Department of Building and Safety must ensure that the building is vacated and secured by barricade, padlock, fence or secure the property by whatever means the Department of Building and Safety determines as reasonable and necessary, as provided for in Municipal Code Section 91.9003.4. (*Enforcement – Noncompliance with Department Orders*).

As such, the Department of Building and Safety estimates that the total costs to board up and fence the New Bay Motel is \$37,941.30 (fencing: \$30,656; boarding 22 windows and doors: \$7,285.30).

In addition, Municipal Code Section 91.9003.4.2 (*Notification*), authorizes the Department of Building and Safety, to notify the property owner that a lien will be placed against the property to cover the cost of vacating and securing the property, and their right to a hearing.

I THEREFORE MOVE that the Council instruct the City Administrative Officer to identify funds to appropriate/transfer \$37,941.30 to the Department of Building and Safety, to pay for the costs to secure (fencing and boarding) the nuisance building known as the *New Bay Motel* located at 8301 S. Figueroa Street, Los Angeles, CA 90044, inasmuch as the property continues to operate notwithstanding the Council's action on October 25, 2023, pursuant to Municipal Code Section 12.27.1 (Administrative Nuisance Abatement Proceedings), which declared the site to be a public nuisance and required the discontinuance of the motel use and any similar land uses at the property (Council File No. 23-0911).

In December 2020, the City Los Angeles, acquired the site at 9120 Woodman Avenue, Los Angeles, CA 91334, in Council District 6, with its Coronavirus Relief Funds for \$20.5 million. This site is a former elderly care facility with 148 rooms. The site is one of the eight (8) sites that the City acquired without a State Homekey1 match. The site, known as Arleta, is expected to provide interim housing permanently to senior citizens, 55 years of age or older. The Council Office is currently discussing the level of services that will be provided with the owner/operator, the National Health Foundation, the City Administrative Officer (CAO) and the Los Angeles Homeless Services Authority (LAHSA).

The level of rehabilitation required by the site needs has been much more extensive than expected. At this point the site has a gap of \$1,546,004 to fully complete the rehabilitation by March 29, 2024. This gap is a result of building and fire inspector corrections which include replacing 417 sprinkler heads and related plumbing, installing smoke guards, adding exit signs and safety features to stair cases, etc.

I THEREFORE MOVE that the City Council, subject to approval of the Mayor:

- APPROVE \$ \$198,269 of Emergency Solutions Grant Covid-19 (ESG-CV) funds for the construction cost at the Project Homkey1 Woodman site in Council District 6 for costs through September 30, 2023;
- 2. APPROPRIATE \$198,269 from ESG-CV Fund No. 517/43, Account No. 43VC9V, COVID-19 Homeless Roadmap to ESG-CV Fund No. 517/43, Account No. 43TA43, Homekey Rehab;

The Primetime Emmy Awards celebrate excellence in national primetime programming awarding top honors at an annual televised awards ceremony. The event, presented by the Academy of Television Arts & Sciences (ATAS), was held on Monday, January 15, 2024. The 75th Primetime Emmy Awards consistently attracts fans and visitors, a worldwide television audience aired on FOX, and is attended by the most prominent celebrities, entertainers, and executives in the entertainment industry. The 75th Primetime Emmy Awards will take place at the Peacock Theater in Los Angeles, California.

As a special event, the Academy of Television Arts & Sciences is subject to the Special Events Ordinance enacted by Council in October 2009 which requires the recovery of costs for City resources. The Ordinance also provides for negotiations with the event sponsors in determining an appropriate payment for City services at major entertainment venues. Such negotiations take into consideration the economic benefit generated by the event. Given the high profile of the televised Primetime Emmy Awards, negotiating an appropriate payment for City services is an option that should be pursued. Moreover, doing so encourages the Academy of Television Arts & Sciences to maintain its long-standing relationship with the City to hold the Emmy Awards at a City venue. Providing support and service fee considerations encourages the Academy of Television Arts & Sciences as well as the FOX network to continue showcasing the City of Los Angeles as the entertainment capital of the world.

I THEREFORE MOVE that Council approve the negotiated payment of \$110,000 for City services from the Academy of Television Arts & Sciences associated with the holding of the 75th Primetime Emmy Awards at the Peacock Theater.

Rancho LPG operates a facility that stores butane and propane in an area near the Port of Los Angeles in San Pedro. The facility, which has two 12.5 million-gallon refrigerated tanks and five 60,000-gallon horizontal storage tanks, has operated since 1973. The two larger tanks store butane, which is a byproduct of the petroleum refineries nearby.

During the summer months, California Air Resources Board regulations prohibit blending butane into gasoline because of the occurrence of vapor pressure. This regulation results in the need to store the butane until it can be transported to refineries and blended into gasoline in the winter months. Much of the butane that is stored at this facility is transported by a 6" diameter bi-directional pipeline, owned by Valero and regulated by the California Fire Marshal, from local oil refineries.

When it is anticipated that the butane supplied by the refineries will not be sufficient to meet the refineries needs for mixing, additional butane is brought into the facility from other locations by rail. Historically, the butane was also transported from the facility to a berth at the Port of Los Angeles through an underground pipeline. However, the pipeline has been shut down and now all additional butane is transported from the facility via rail lines.

The facility is located on private property, not on land under the Port's jurisdiction. Several decades ago, the Port acquired an approximately 20 foot railroad spur that Rancho LPG uses to transport commodities to and from the facility to the Pacific Harbor Line. The smaller tanks store propane, which is brought in through rail and transported out by truck for commercial distribution.

For several years, community groups and the public have expressed concerns about the safety of the facility and the transportation of materials to and from the facility. Having a City entity provide inspections on the facility that transports these materials would provide a more transparent role in the City of Los Angeles's public safety oversight role for this site.

I THEREFORE MOVE that the City Council direct the Los Angeles Fire Department to report on the resources needed to engage in inspections of the rail lines that transport materials from Rancho LPG via rail lines. This should include an analysis of the current inspection-related positions, or unfilled positions, that could serve to inspect Rancho LPG, as well as if the Fire Department requires a specialized unit for this site in question. Additionally, the report should cite how other municipalities with facilities that either store or transport butane or propane engage their public safety departments (namely fire departments) for inspections.

Neighbors to the Rancho LPG site in San Pedro have long been alarmed by the existence of the facility, which sits close to homes, schools, and stores, and has been cited as handling the largest amount of butane of any facility in California. Community members have expressed significant public health and safety concerns about the operations onsite, including the transportation of the Rancho LPG products via rail and pipeline, on and adjacent to private property near the Port of Los Angeles that operates a liquefied petroleum gas storage facility.

Although the facility is on private property, Rancho LPG uses a railroad spur on property owned by the Port to transport its commodities. Butane and propane are hazardous materials that are also highly explosive. Community members are concerned about the potential threats to life, health, loss of business, private and public property and infrastructure posed to the entire City of Los Angeles from an explosion, fire or contamination stemming from the facility. These concerns have only grown stronger because of recent incidents throughout the country involving rail transportation of hazardous materials.

In 1974, the Port issued a revocable permit to Petrolane (the first occupant of the Rancho facility) to construct, operate, and maintain an industrial railroad spur track. The track was necessary to connect the Petrolane facility to the existing spur track that ran along Gaffey Street. This spur track pre-dated the facility. In 1994, through a joint purchase with the Port of Long Beach of rail track in connection with the Alameda Corridor project, the Port acquired an ownership interest in the railroad spur track that runs parallel to Gaffey Street up to the point covered by the revocable permit. After the Alameda Corridor transaction, the Port had an ownership interest in the entire railroad spur track that parallels Gaffey Street and which serves the Rancho LPG facility.

In 2011, the Port entered into revocable permit No. 10-05 (Rancho Permit) with Rancho LPG. This Permit is a successor to the revocable permit issued in 1974. Issues surrounding the Rancho Permit and Rancho LPG's use of the railroad spur track have been brought to the attention of the California State Lands Commission in the past. According to the Office of the City Attorney, the Port may terminate the Rancho Permit, but termination would not end rail service to and from the facility as the Pacific Harbor Line would continue to provide service under the San Pedro Bay Harbor Rail Operating Permit.

The Rancho Permit provides the Port with some limited protection from liability through insurance and indemnification requirements. Further investigation into the initial approval and use of the Rancho Permit versus its implementation and use today is important for analyzing the City's role in approval for the Permit as well as the community's direct engagement with the entities involved with the Permit.

I THEREFORE MOVE that the City Council direct the Port of Los Angeles, with assistance from the Bureau of Engineering and the Office of the City Attorney, to report on the application for the revocable permit No. 10-05 (Rancho Permit)'s initial use of what was approved for the permit, the approval process for the permit's renewal, and the City's ability to

In April 2022, the City of Los Angeles and the LA Alliance for Human Rights came to a settlement agreement, aiming to open enough beds by 2027 to accommodate 60% of the unsheltered population in each Council District or citywide. This commitment involves establishing and operating 12,915 new beds between June 14, 2022, and June 13, 2027. As of September 30, 2023, 8,455 beds are open or in progress, contributing to the City's adherence to the Alliance settlement. To meet this commitment, an additional 4,460 beds or units must be added by June 13, 2027.

The Court will maintain jurisdiction until 2027 to enforce the settlement agreement. The City is tasked with setting deadlines and targets for shelter and/or housing creation and encampment reduction, sharing these with the plaintiffs involved. Collaborative efforts will address concerns, with the possibility of seeking resolution through Court consultation if necessary.

The City must ensure that it is continuing to progress toward fulfilling the settlement.

I THEREFORE MOVE that the City Administrative Officer and the City Legislative Analyst, with assistance from the City Attorney, provide the entire City Council with quarterly written reports and updates on the ongoing status of the LA Alliance case.

BUDGET, FINANCE AND INNOVATION COMMITTEE REPORT relative to fiscal concerns and prioritization of critical hiring.

Recommendations for Council action:

 - c. Recommendations for implementing effective retention strategies throughout the City.
- 8. INSTRUCT the CAO, with the assistance of the CLA, to provide a written report on the duplication and possible consolidation of services within the City's Budget, including the Homeless Budget and the City's Alternative Response Services. The report should include:
 - a. A breakdown of the services that are duplicated across the City and the success metrics associated with each service.
 - b. An analysis of the potential benefits and challenges associated with consolidating duplicate services.
 - c. An analysis on how service consolidation may impact the quality of services provided by the City.
- 9. INSTRUCT the CLA, with the assistance of the CAO, to report back on sole source contracts related to homelessness initiatives and alternative response initiatives and the possibility of

replacing sole source contracted services with City workforce, therefore decreasing the number of vacancy eliminations.

- 10. INSTRUCT the CAO to report on the number of department and proprietary department staff that are on loan to other departments and offices.
- 11. INSTRUCT the CAO to add the Clean LA Program and the Workforce Equity Demonstration program to the list of "Categories of prioritized critical hiring requiring review process" (page 5 in the CAO report).

<u>Fiscal Impact Statement</u>: The CAO reports that adopting the recommendations stated will mitigate the City's current unresolved over expenditures totaling \$143 million, provide additional protection against a potential General Fund revenue shortfall currently estimated at \$158 million, support the City's efforts to maintain a Reserve Fund balance above the five percent policy minimum, and facilitate the development of a 2024-25 Budget that maintains critical service levels.

<u>Financial Policies Statement</u>: The CAO reports that the recommendations in stated are consistent with the City's Financial Policies insofar as they would help to ensure that current appropriations are limited to the sum of available cash and revenues to be received this fiscal year.

Community Impact Statement: None submitted

SUMMARY

At the meeting held on January 24, 2024, your Budget, Finance and Innovation Committee considered a CAO report relative to fiscal concerns and prioritization of critical hiring.

After an opportunity for public comment was held, the Committee recommended to move forward the recommendations contained in the CAO report, as detailed above, as amended, to expand on Recommendation No. 4 and to add Recommendation Nos. 7-12. This matter is now submitted to the Council for consideration.

In Fiscal Year 2023-2024 the City of Los Angeles budgeted for 9,493 sworn police officers. However, after months of recruitment and various incentive programs, the Department is unable to fill hundreds of vacant positions. The number of positions that are currently filled are 8,972 and there are no indications that our progress in filling additional positions is improving. During the duration of the BOUNCE program, we have only filled 14 positions of the 200 that we budgeted for. In the last 7 recruit classes, we have hired an average of fewer than 35 positions in each class when the target class size is 60.

These 521 vacant positions represent well over \$50 million dollars in unutilized general fund spending because the City has been unable to fill the open positions.

I THEREFORE MOVE to amend Item 10 on Today's agenda (CF 23-0600-S115) to add the following instruction: instruct the CAO to report back in one week to full Council on a the number of sworn police officers that the City is realistically projected to hire by end of the fiscal year, based on current hiring trends, and report on savings associated with eliminating positions unlikely to be filled.


