On May 1, 2024 at approximately 12:50am, 19 year old Gavin Unzueta and two friends were driving in the neighborhood near Sesnon Boulevard between Reseda Boulevard and Tampa Avenue when a white vehicle parked at a lookout point began to follow them. A vehicle chase ensued and the white vehicle eventually pulled along the passenger side of the victim's vehicle. The suspect produced a handgun and fired multiple shots into their vehicle, fatally striking Mr. Unzueta. The suspect vehicle fled south on Reseda Boulevard. Detectives are continuing to investigate this crime, but have not been able to identify the suspect(s). Detectives believe that a reward may compel members of the public to provide information on the identity of the person or persons responsible for this crime.

The person or persons responsible for this crime represent an ongoing threat to the safety of the people of Los Angeles; therefore, it is appropriate for the City of Los Angeles to offer a reward for information leading to the identification, apprehension and conviction of the person responsible for the shooting of Gavin Unzueta on May 1, 2024.

I THEREFORE MOVE that by adoption of this Motion, the City Council provide an offer of reward for information leading to the identification, apprehension, and conviction of the person(s) responsible for the shooting death of Gavin Unzueta on May 1, 2024, and in support thereof, make the following findings pursuant to Division 19, Chapter 12, Article 1 of the Los Angeles Administrative Code:

1. That the death of Mr. Unzueta was caused by the willful misconduct of one or more persons.

2. That this offer of reward is consistent with and taken for the immediate protection of the public peace, health and safety of local residents, as well as visitors to the City, and is consistent with the need to arrest and convict the person or persons who, because of not being apprehended, could by their actions further terrorize and present a continuing and immediate menace to the rights of persons in the City.

3. That what happened to the victim is an especially disturbing crime and therefore, as a matter of public policy, the City hereby offers a reward as an added inducement for persons to come forward with information leading to the identification, apprehension and conviction of the person(s) responsible for the shooting death of Gavin Unzueta.

4. That the sum of \$50,000 shall be the aggregate maximum sum of any payment or payments of a City reward in this instance.

5. That the offer of reward shall be in effect for six months from the date of the advertisement of the reward by the City Clerk.

In 2022 alone, LASAN crews cleaned up 3,303.46 tons of illegal dumping. In response, Council District 14 has regularly engaged community organizations to assist LASAN with illegal dumping removal, with five crews currently working throughout the district. Due to the sheer volume of trash, crews are still needed to address the inordinate amount of trash dumped illegally throughout the Council District 14. ENERGY & ENVIRONMENT

For much of California's history, fossil fuel companies have profited handsomely from drilling wells and tapping the state's deep oil and gas reserves. After nearly 160 years of drilling and extraction, the state is riddled with over 100,000 unplugged wells. About 60,000 of those are considered active wells, although they now only produce just four barrels of oil a day on average. Another 40,000 or so of these unplugged wells haven't produced oil or natural gas in years.

California is now set to receive more than \$35 million in federal funding to help address the crisis of abandoned oil wells, many of which are leaking dangerous chemicals and planet-warming methane in areas across the state, including in Los Angeles. As stated by the United States Secretary of the Interior Deb Haaland, the investment from the Biden-Harris administration is among the "largest ever in American history to address legacy pollution".

The federal funds will be used to end the hazards of orphaned oil and gas wells across California, but more specifically throughout the diverse neighborhoods of Los Angeles. Multiple areas in the region of Los Angeles from Echo Park to Wilmington are prone to leaking planet-warming methane and toxic air contaminants due to idle wells. Capping hazardous orphaned wells and addressing legacy pollution across our country will have a profound impact on our environment, our water quality, and the health and well-being of our communities.

The state will use the funding to plug and remediate 206 high-risk orphaned oil and gas wells and decommission 47 attendant production facilities with about 70,000 feet of associated pipelines. How this impacts Los Angeles and how our City is able to leverage this federal funding could better protect the quality of life for all Angelenos.

I THEREFORE MOVE that the City Council instruct the Office of Petroleum and Natural Gas Administration and the Department of City Planning, in consultation with all necessary City departments and regional entities, to report within thirty days on plans to proactively seek out the federal funding and ways that the City is addressing requirements or steps that need to be taken to receive the federal funding, as well as any infrastructure or personnel that is necessary to deploy the federal funding. This should include any plans that are already underway by the involved entities related to the citywide plan to phase out the production of oil and gas in the City as well as to engage in idle well closures.

Council Districts 6 and 7 are divided by the Interstate 5 Highway (I-5). However, the communities on either side of the highway are connected by two pedestrian tunnels that lie under the I-5: the tunnel at the intersection of Sharp Avenue and Pierce Street and the tunnel at the intersection of Sharp Avenue and Filmore Street.

Students and families access these pedestrian tunnels for commuting to and from school, work and the neighboring parks. However, as of late, the tunnel's failure to provide sufficient lighting has raised public safety concerns.

These underpass tunnels have experienced several instances of copper wiring theft, which have left them completely dark and vulnerable to vandalism and suspicious activity. Within the last year, over 20 spans of wire were stolen from the underpass. According to the Bureau of Street Lighting, they are still trying to find better mitigation strategies to ensure the wire isn't stolen again before applying new wiring.

Council District 6 staff has received numerous letters and communications from constituents requesting lighting in the tunnels due to their growing safety concerns. Those especially concerned with the lighting in the tunnel are families who attend the immediately adjacent Sharp Avenue Elementary School.

Copper wire theft is an ongoing issue that the City is continuously struggling to address. The constant reapplication of copper wiring and the subsequent theft of the copper wiring is not a productive use of lighting servicing funds. Nonetheless, until a better strategy is found, we must consider all the necessary tools to aid our constituents who frequently use these tunnels, as it predominantly includes young children and their parents.

I THEREFORE MOVE that the Bureau of Street Lighting, in coordination with the City Administrative Officer, be instructed to report with recommendations and funding to address lighting deficiencies for the two pedestrian tunnels at the intersections of Sharp Avenue and Pierce Street and Sharp Avenue and Filmore Street, including creative solutions to fortify the lighting at these underpasses.

I FURTHER MOVE that the Department of Cultural Affairs, in coordination with the City Administrative Officer and the Bureau of Engineering, be instructed to report with recommendations and funding for the implementation of public art along the pedestrian tunnels listed above to counter the existing vandalism.

RESOLUTION RULES, ELECTIONS, INTERGOVERNMENTAL RELATIONS

WHEREAS, any official position of the City of Los Angeles with respect to legislation, rules, regulations or policies proposed to or pending before a local, state or federal governmental body or agency must have first been adopted in the form of a Resolution by the City Council; and

WHEREAS, high-quality child care programs facilitate the healthy development of young children, reduce poverty by increasing workforce participation and family stability, and stimulate the economy; and

WHEREAS, a historic lack of public investment in child care has resulted in unaffordable costs and insufficient availability, especially in low-income areas; and

WHEREAS, in Los Angeles, there are only enough licensed child care slots to serve 4 percent of the City's infant and toddler population and almost 60 percent of families live in child care deserts, where there are three times the number of children as licensed slots; and

WHEREAS, child care providers are struggling to keep their programs open due to staffing shortages, rising operational costs, and poverty-level wages; and

WHEREAS, outdated child care subsidy reimbursement rates from the State have not kept up with the actual operating costs of child care; and

WHEREAS, in 2023, Child Care Providers United, a California child care provider union, entered into a contract with the State to develop an alternative methodology for determining the subsidy reimbursement rates for child care providers; and

WHEREAS, the State agreed to a new methodology, but risks delaying any changes to the State's child care reimbursement rates until 2027 if it does not include the alternative methodology in the Child Care Development Fund plan to the Federal Administration for Children and Families by July 1, 2024; and

WHEREAS, there is concern among unions and early care and education advocates that the Governor's administration and State legislature may deprioritize child care reimbursement rate reform and implementation amid competing priorities during a budget deficit; and

WHEREAS, if the State does not fully fund or implement the new methodology, child care staff will continue to exit the field and programs will continue to close, further destabilizing child care infrastructure in and beyond Los Angeles;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that by adoption of this Resolution, the City of Los Angeles hereby includes in its 2023-24 State Legislative Program, sponsorship and support of any legislative and/or administrative action that would ensure the development, funding, and implementation of the alternative methodology to update child care subsidy reimbursement rates in California.
