  - FUNDING FOR PUBLIC ACCESS PROJECTS (CAPITAL): The plan allocates a minimum of ten percent (10%) of the Harbor Department's annual Operating Income to build LA Waterfront public access projects and provide Port-related community benefits.
  - II. PROJECT PLANNING: The Harbor Department shall engage the local City Council Office on an annual basis no later than March of each year to determine the scope, range and budget of Public Access Projects for the next fiscal year, consistent with the Tidelands Trust. The Council Office shall engage in a public process to report back on community recommendations for the Public Access Projects to the Harbor Department.
    - The report on community recommendations for the Public Access Projects shall then be considered and incorporated in the Harbor Department's annual budget planning process. The Harbor Department and the Council Office shall endeavor to plan for multi-year expenditures and projects, to the extent permissible by law and this policy.
  - III. OPERATING INCOME: For purposes of calculating Operating Income for this plan, revenue does not include purpose-directed funds collected from third parties. Examples include, but are not limited to, environmental document reimbursements, Marine Oil Terminal Engineering and Maintenance Standards reimbursements, Clean Truck Program Fees, and Harbor Maintenance Tax funding.
  - IV. CAPITAL IMPROVEMENT PROGRAM: Harbor Department reporting and selection of Public Access Investment Plan projects shall be aligned with the Harbor Department's overall five-year Capital Improvement Program budget process. The process includes community input on project selection, consistent with the process outlined above. The community input process will continue with annual reporting and engagement coupled with more in depth project prioritization processes, when necessary, based on status of budgetary allocation for existing projects and funding availability for new projects.

- V. ANNUAL BUDGET PROCESS: Implementation of the plan and its guidelines are subject to the Board of Harbor Commissioners approval. The percentage of Operating Income allocated annually and specific amount allocated to projects per year will be determined by the Board of Harbor Commissioners with consideration of the Section III Project Planning process during the Harbor Department's annual budget process with consideration to the Harbor Department's economic and financial outlook, pursuant to sections IX and X.
- VI. PLAN MODIFICATION: In the event of needs to modify the plan as proposed including, without limitation, general economic trends, declining financial outlook, legal issues, and the extent that public access projects are needed, the Harbor Department will notify public stakeholders to facilitate public comment, and may subsequently take Board action to adjust the percentage of operating income downward.
- Instruct the City Administrative Officer, in coordination with the Executive Director of the
  Port of Los Angeles, the Chief Legislative Analyst, the City Attorney, and the City Clerk
  to report with proposed amendments and processes needed to establish a "Port of Los

On June 13, 2023, 25-year-old Noah Martinez was near the 3000 block of Emery Street when he was shot. Despite medical efforts, Mr. Martinez succumbed to his injuries at the scene. The motive for this homicide still remains unclear. Detectives have canvassed for witnesses and additional evidence, but no witnesses have been identified in this case. It is their belief that a monetary reward might provide an incentive for reluctant witnesses to come forward with the objective to solve this murder and provide the family with a sense of justice and closure.

The person or persons responsible for this crime represent an ongoing threat to the safety of the people of Los Angeles; therefore, it is appropriate for the City of Los Angeles to offer a reward for information leading to the identification, apprehension and conviction of the person or persons responsible for the death of Noah Martinez.

I THEREFORE MOVE that by adoption of this Motion, the City Council provide an offer of reward for information leading to the identification, apprehension, and conviction of the person or persons responsible for the death of Noah Martinez on June 13, 2023, and in support thereof, make the following findings pursuant to Division 19, Chapter 12, Article 1 of the Los Angeles Administrative Code:

- 1. That the death of Noah Martinez was caused by the willful misconduct of one or more persons.
- 2. That this offer of reward is consistent with and taken for the immediate protection of the public peace, health and safety of local residents, as well as visitors to the City, and is consistent with the need to arrest and convict the person or persons who, because of not being apprehended, could by their actions further terrorize and present a continuing and immediate menace to the rights of persons in the City.
- 3. That what happened to the victim is an especially disturbing crime and therefore, as a matter of public policy, the City hereby offers a reward as an added inducement for persons to come forward with information leading to the identification, apprehension and conviction of the person or persons responsible for the death of Noah Martinez.
- 4. That the sum of \$50,000 shall be the aggregate maximum sum of any payment or payments of a City reward in this instance.
- 5. That the offer of reward shall be in effect for six months from the date of the advertisement of the reward by the City Clerk.

#### **MOTION**

#### **PUBLIC WORKS**

On May 31, 2024 the Chief Legislative Analyst (CLA) released a report, as directed by Council File 21-0329-S4, on the execution and costs of Los Angeles Municipal Code (LAMC) 41.18, which regulates where unhoused Angelenos can sit, sleep, lie, or store belongings, as well as the effectiveness of the "Street Engagement Strategy."

Inclusive of data from the Los Angeles Police Department (LAPD), the City Administrative Officer (CAO), and the Los Angeles Homeless Services Authority (LAHSA), the report identifies several areas of concern in the administration of LAMC 41.18 that require additional action by the City Council. Central to these concerns is the enforcement of the ordinance, and relatedly, the conditions under which new 41.18 zones are created.

According to the CLA report, there are currently 2,443 areas designated as 41.18 zones throughout the City. These include 1,245 school zones and 884 day care centers, as well as 314 sites created by the City Council through the resolution process. As the report shows, enforcement at each of these locations has been inconsistent, due in part to the large number of zones LAPD is expected to enforce and unclear protocols around prioritization of zones.

Further complicating enforcement is the process by which new 41.18 zones are created by the City Council. With the large number of existing zones already stretching LAPD resources, the addition of new 41.18 zones should be thoughtful and consistent with the City's Street Engagement Strategy.

Without proper protocols in place, including credible offers of housing when a new 41.18 zone is established, this report shows that individuals may end up repopulating the newly-created 41.18 zone, moving from one block to the next, or relocating into neighboring Council Districts. This approach is an ineffective use of City resources and is detrimental to our efforts to reduce street homelessness.

WE THEREFORE MOVE that the City Council direct the Los Angeles Homeless Services Authority (LAHSA) and the City Administrative Officer (CAO), and with input from the Los Angeles Police Department (LAPD), Bureau of Sanitation (LASAN), Bureau of Streets Services (BSS), and the Department of Transportation (LADOT), report back within 90 days on a plan to develop a uniform tracking system for City-directed encampment engagements — including but not limited to 41.18-driven engagement and enforcement, CARE and CARE+ operations, and RV operations — that accounts for uploading client rosters, unique data identifiers, protocols for sign posting notifications, and the ability for the tracking system to integrate with other relevant regional data systems such as the Homeless Management Information System (HMIS);

**WE FURTHER MOVE** that the City Council direct LAHSA and the Chief Legislative Analyst (CLA), with assistance from the CAO and with requested input from the Los Angeles County Homeless Initiative and the Los Angeles County Departments of Mental Health (DMH) and Health Services (DHS), report back on the feasibility of tying dedicated, funded components for services and/or interim housing to LAMC 41.18(d)-directed engagement for individuals initially identified at the designated location for the 14 days after the installation of signs, per the guidelines of the Streets Engagement Strategy;

WE FURTHER MOVE that the City Council direct the CAO and City Clerk to include as part of every Council 41.18(d) resolution the types of shelter/interim housing beds that will be offered at the designated area(s), the proximity to the closest adjoining Council District and existing 41.18 location(s), and data on shelter bed occupancy in the relevant Council District from the preceding 3 months derived from the City-funded shelter site occupancy reports as outlined in Council File 23-0423;

**WE FURTHER MOVE** that the City Council direct the CAO and CLA, with requested assistance of LAHSA and the City Attorney, to revise the September 2, 2021 "Attachment C - Street Engagement and Management" procedures to require a credible offer of housing to individuals initially identified at a designated 41.18(c) location as a prerequisite before the initiation of enforcement action;

**WE FURTHER MOVE** that the City Council request the LAPD to update the September 26, 2022, Office of the Chief of Police Notice, "Enforcement Guidelines for Los Angeles Municipal Code 41.18 (As Amended) - Sitting, Lying, or Sleeping, or Storing, Using, Maintaining, or Placing Personal Property in the Public Right-of-way" to prioritize schools, day care centers, and interim housing / shelter facilities for 41.18 enforcement and monitoring;

#### RESOLUTION

WHEREAS, on October 7, 2023, 1,200 Israelis were killed in a surprise attack by Hamas, in which approximately 240 Israelis were also taken captive; and

WHEREAS, since October 7, more than 37,000 Palestinians, the vast majority of whom were women and children, as well as hundreds of humanitarian workers, healthcare providers, and journalists from various nations have been killed and more than 82,000 people have been wounded by Israeli military forces in Gaza; and

WHEREAS, the City of Los Angeles (City) profoundly mourns this senseless and inhumane loss of civilian life in Palestine and Israel, and is deeply disturbed at the sustained violence unfolding in the region; and

WHEREAS, according to a recent Integrated Food Security Phase Classification report and as shared by the United Nations and World Food Programme, 1.1 million people in Gaza are experiencing catastrophic food insecurity and famine is imminent, and it is estimated that one in six children in Gaza is malnourished, and that more than 155,000 pregnant or breastfeeding caretakers are at high risk of malnutrition; and

WHEREAS, over 20,000 babies have been born in Gaza since October 7, and women are giving birth prematurely due to extreme stress, trauma, and shock; and

WHEREAS, 2.3 million Gazans have been internally displaced from destroyed homes, hospitals, refugee camps, and places of worship, and this week, more than one million Gazans were forcefully displaced from Rafah, previously a humanitarian safe zone; and

WHEREAS, world leaders, government officials, humanitarian organizations, labor unions, student demonstrators, news publications, and local jurisdictions have called for an immediate and permanent ceasefire; and

WHEREAS, President Joe Biden has called for an immediate and permanent ceasefire, and has laid out a plan through which this can be executed; and,

WHEREAS, all parties need to comply with obligations under international law, including rigorous humanitarian standards.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the City joins the call for an immediate and permanent ceasefire, the immediate and unconditional return of all hostages, and the safe and immediate passage of unhindered humanitarian aid and medical care to Gaza; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the City will not tolerate any form of harmful and racist language, especially antisemitic, anti-Palestinian, and Islamophobic hate speech toward anyone; and

FINALLY, BE IT RESOLVED that the City supports peaceful diplomacy and an end to the conflict that honors all peoples'

right to dignity, safety, and justice.
