 - g. Clarify the definition of a City project to which Measure HLA applies.

8. INSTRUCT the LADOT to report on any impacts to Los Angeles County Metropolitan Transportation Authority (Metro) or other outside transit agency projects in the City due to the adoption of Measure HLA.
9. INSTRUCT the CAO to report to the Transportation Committee on August 7, 2024, the Public Works and the Budget, Finance and Innovation Committees on all available funding sources to meet Measure HLA's mandate, including their restrictions and budget capacity.
10. INSTRUCT the LADOT and DPW, with the assistance of the CAO, to report to the Transportation Committee on August 7, 2024, and the Public Works Committee on existing or needed staffing resources to effectuate the implementation of Measure HLA, and hiring timelines if additional staff will be required.
11. INSTRUCT the CAO, with the assistance of the LADOT and Information Technology Agency, to report to the Transportation Committee and the Budget, Finance and Innovation Committee on development of the Open Data Portal/project website that must be available to the public by April 2025, per LAMC 85.11(b)(2) which includes an assignment of departments responsible for reporting.
12. INSTRUCT the CAO, with the assistance of the LAFD and LAPD, to report to the Transportation Committee on August 7, 2024, with the number of responses for vehicle crashes, including responses for crashes with injuries, severe injuries, and fatalities, as well as the staff time and associated staffing

costs associated with said responses, annually, for the past five years (2019-23).

13. REQUEST the City Attorney, with the assistance of the CAO, to report to the Budget, Finance and Innovation Committee on:
 - a. The litigation resources and personnel needed may result from implementation of LAMC 85.11(c).
 - b. The amount paid out in judgments against the City and in claims related to traffic fatalities or injury, annually, for the past five years (2019-23).

14. INSTRUCT the LADOT and DPW, and other departments as necessary, to develop "Measure HLA Improvements Standards and Guidelines" for Base Elements that satisfy the intent of Measure HLA as well as Optional Elements for improvements made in the public right-of-way on the BEN, BLN, PED, Neighborhood-Enhanced Network (NEN), and TEN. These guidelines should be added as a supplement to the Complete Street Design Guide, and updated from time to time along with the rest of that document. Base Elements and Optional Elements that already exist in the Complete Street Design Guide should be cross-referenced, and new entries in the Complete Street Design Guide should be created for Base Elements and Optional Elements which do not already exist in the Complete Street Design Guide.

15. INSTRUCT the LADOT and DPW to ensure that Standard Plans are updated or developed for any base elements or optional elements, as identified in the Measure HLA Improvements Guidelines and described in Recommendation No. 14, detailed above.

16. INSTRUCT the LADOT and DPW to identify a standardized timeline necessary for Measure HLA project planning (including separately obligated design of the Americans with Disabilities Act required curb ramps), design, utility work, environmental clearance, and community engagement.

17. INSTRUCT the LADOT and DPW to report on a recommended methodology to develop a shared five-year work plan that implements MP2035 in compliance with HLA and incorporates the obligations and constraints each department manages.
18. INSTRUCT the LADOT and DPW to develop a shared workplan for street resurfacing and Mobility Plan improvements.
19. INSTRUCT the LADOT, DCP, and DPW to develop and report with formal community outreach and engagement policies for Projects on a Mobility Corridor that may result in closures of or disruption of access to the public right-of-way.



The Department of Recreation and Parks (RAP) oversees over 16,000 acres of parkland, offering extensive recreational, social and cultural programs at 559 park sites, including maintaining and operating hundreds of athletic fields, 411 playgrounds, 319 tennis courts, 123 recreation centers, over 130 outdoor fitness areas, 59 swimming pools and aquatic centers, 29 senior centers, 27 skate parks, 13 golf courses, 12 museums, and 13 dog parks throughout every Los Angeles neighborhood. They also contribute to the City's urban wilderness and open spaces by maintaining and caring for the park's urban tree canopy, 13 lakes, and 92 miles of hiking trails that contribute to LA's vast natural resources.

RAP is one of the City's most comprehensive social service providers, offering an array of diverse and comprehensive recreational programs to serve youth, adults and seniors. They work to restore and enhance the safety and enjoyment of park patrons; increase recreational programming; support greater park access and equity and implement increased sustainability practices and projects.

Over the last 30 years RAP utilized Proposition K (Prop K) resources to improve and expand facilities. Prop K was approved by the voters of the City of Los Angeles on November 5, 1996. It created \$25,000,000 per year for acquisition, improvements, construction, and maintenance of City parks and recreation facilities.

Prop K provided funding for 183 specified projects throughout the City's parks. It also allowed for approximately a third of the funding to be available for a competitive bid process for public agencies, City departments, and non profit organizations that enhance park space throughout the City.

As Proposition K will sunset in 2026 it is important that as a City we begin a new evaluation of our Department of Recreation and Parks facilities and what improvements are needed in each community.




Nevertheless, the California Grizzly became a symbol of resilience and strength. The California State Flag, also known as the "Bear Flag," is the oldest unofficial state symbol. In 1911, the California Legislature passed a bill that established its basic design featuring a red star, stripe, grizzly bear, and wording. The bear symbol became a permanent part of the State Seal in 1849, and, in 1953, the California Grizzly was designated the official State Animal.

The last known California Grizzly in Southern California resided in the Seventh Council District, in the area now known as Sunland Park. As an integral part of our nation's history, the California Grizzly symbolizes both the untamed wilderness that once covered this land and the resilience of its inhabitants in the face of profound cultural and environmental changes.

I THEREFORE MOVE that the Department of Cultural Affairs, with the assistance of the Department of Recreation and Parks, and any other relevant departments, report back with recommendations for establishing a permanent memorial at Sunland Park. The report should include a proposal for alternate forms of memorialization or marker of the California Grizzly, its associated costs, and recommendations for securing funding from philanthropic donations or grants to support its creation.



WHEREAS, California Vehicle Code Section 22507 authorizes cities to restrict the parking of vehicles, including but not limited to, vehicles that are six feet or more in height, on identified City streets during certain hours; and

WHEREAS, the Los Angeles Municipal Code Section 80.69.4 allows the Council to authorize by resolution, the streets upon which the parking of oversized vehicles shall be restricted between 2:00 a.m. and 6:00 a.m.; and

WHEREAS, there is an increased problem with oversized vehicles that park overnight in Council District 3 where these large vehicles are often parked overnight and immediately adjacent to residential buildings, which constricts travel lanes and creates dangerous situations;

NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, that the City Council, pursuant to the Los Angeles Municipal Code Section 80.69.4, hereby prohibits the parking of vehicles that are in excess of 22 feet in length or over 7 feet in height, during the hours of 2:00 a.m. and 6:00 a.m. along both sides of the following street segments:

- Keswick Street between Oso Avenue and Winnetka Avenue.
- Enadia Way between Quartz Avenue and Jumilla Avenue.
- Jumilla Avenue between Hart Street and Enadia Way.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that upon the adoption of this Resolution, the Department of Transportation be directed to post signs giving notice of a "tow away, no parking" restriction for oversized vehicles, with the specific hours detailed, at the above locations; and

In 2021 the Los Angeles City Council began discussions to create a Guaranteed Basic Income program in our City. The following year BIG:LEAP emerged: a \$38 million dollar program that was the largest of its kind in the nation. The program was developed and implemented by the Community Investment for Families Department (CIFD) under consultation from the Council, Mayor, and our research partners.

BIG:LEAP gave over 3,200 Angelenos \$1000 a month, for 12 months, no strings attached. Applicants needed to reside in the City, be 18 years or older, have a dependent child or be pregnant at the time of application, have an annual income below the federal poverty level, and have been financially or medically impacted by the COVID-19 pandemic. Over 50,000 people applied.

The first payments to participants began in January of 2022, with final payments disbursed in March of 2023. During this time participants, as well as a control group, were part of a study by the City's research partners at the Center for Guaranteed Income Research at the University of Pennsylvania, along with local partners at both the University of Southern California and the University of California Los Angeles.

The study found several positive results in terms of participants' financial well-being, food security, parenting, sense of community, and reducing intimate partner violence and fear of community violence.

Participants prioritized securing housing first. With nearly half of participants spending upwards of 70% of their monthly income on housing expenses, they credited guaranteed income with keeping them from needing to access other housing services, preventing financial exhaustion, and serving as a buffer while waiting for other housing support. It also enabled participants a degree of safety and flexibility in their housing, allowing some to leave unsafe housing situations and relationships.

In fact, data indicated that the recurring unconditional cash reduced or prevented the incidence of intimate partner violence (IPV), with recipients reporting lower levels of psychological abuse, sexual abuse, and coercive control across each time point.

The study also found that recipients reported an increasing sense of financial well-being, with household's ability to cover a \$400 emergency expense improving significantly for the treatment group. As well as improvements in food security and an increase in health promoting behaviors.

Not only did the recipients themselves benefit from the direct cash, but their children did as well. Far more guaranteed income recipients reported that their children participated in enrichment activities, such as sports, lessons, and clubs, compared to the control group. They also said that because basic needs were met and time scarcity lifted, they were able to have more engaging relationships with their children, which led to positive shifts in their children's academic performance, coping skills, and behavior.

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The results of the BIG-LEAP study show us that guaranteed income is a simple yet incredibly effective way to interrupt cycles of poverty and build community wealth, giving families the agency to best meet their own needs, set goals and contribute to their communities. Despite extreme financial pressures and profound effects of the COVID-19 pandemic, historically high inflation and rising housing costs, recipients of guaranteed income were able to stay in their homes, escape violent living situations, invest in enrichment experiences for their children, and have more food security for their families. These unconditional, regular, and direct cash payments to individual participants provided an income floor for those without one, strengthening the social safety net and expanding access in the process.

Given the success of this program and the findings that were made in the study, the City should continue its investment in a guaranteed income program, as a means to combat poverty and the homelessness crisis facing our region.


I THEREFORE MOVE that the City Council instruct CIFD to report back with recommendations and program parameters for a \$4-5 million guaranteed income program, specifically targeting individuals experiencing Intimate Partner Violence (IPV) and Transitional Age Youth (TAY); the report should also include information on other guaranteed income pilots, including Chicago which is pairing guaranteed income with transitional housing resources.

I FURTHER MOVE that CIFD, with assistance of the Chief Administrative Office (CAO) and Chief Legislative Office (CLA), report on potential funding sources for the program, including Council Office discretionary resources and Homeless Housing Assistance and Prevention (HHAP) funding.

NEIGHBORHOOD & COMMUNITY
ENRICHMENT

Los Angeles has various Neighborhood Councils that were created to connect its diverse communities to City Hall. They were established in 1999 by an amendment to the City Charter. Together these Neighborhood Councils form the grassroots level of City government. Although Neighborhood Council board members are volunteers, they are public officials elected to office by the members of their community.

The Neighborhood Council system tailors City municipal government to its individual communities, ensuring that recognition and accommodation of these communities' diversity is built into City governance.


Every Neighborhood Council is held to the local, state, and federal standards that other City offices and agencies must observe. Each Neighborhood Council is uniquely tailored to the communities' specific needs. Each Neighborhood Council has a governing board, structured with seats representing the particular type of stakeholders that they serve. Some Neighborhood Councils have seats for renters while others have seats for equestrians. Boards range in size from 7 to 35 members. Board terms vary as well with most consisting of two- year terms and others consisting of four-year terms. The current challenge faced by Neighborhood Councils is the recurrence of the same individuals serving on their governing boards. Implementing term limits would facilitate the evolution of leadership, ensuring alignment with current events and the evolving needs of the constituents they represent.


Youth development and participation in local activities and government is vital in our communities. In order to increase youth participation and youth leadership in local issues, the City recently established the Youth Development Department. As such, youth participation in Neighborhood Councils should be promoted to keep Neighborhood Councils in touch with the needs of the youth who are vital members of the community as well.

Relative to increasing youth participation, the City should also consider the feasibility of implementing term limits for board members. In this manner, Neighborhood Councils may facilitate greater member participation and leadership development. Presently, the Neighborhood Council bylaws provide for a youth seat on the governing board as an optional provision. To enhance youth participation, it is advisable to mandate the inclusion of a youth seat.

I THEREFORE MOVE that the Board of Neighborhood Commissioners, with assistance of the Department of Neighborhood Empowerment, the Youth Development Department and the City Clerk, be requested to provide recommendations on potential methods and options to amend the Neighborhood Council Bylaws (Bylaws) to ensure youth participation in Neighborhood Councils including the designation of a youth seat on each Neighborhood Council board to increase diversity and allow for leadership growth;

I FURTHER MOVE the Board of Neighborhood Commissioners, with assistance of the Department of Neighborhood Empowerment and the City Attorney, be requested to report to the Council on potential options to amend the Bylaws to include term limits for Neighborhood Council board members in order to facilitate greater member participation and leadership development.


On February 26, 2024, Council adopted CF 24-0079 to create a Copper Wire Task Force to address the rampant theft of copper wiring from city street lights. Since that time, the Los Angeles Police Department has modified the task force to become the Heavy Metal Task Force (HMTF) due to the prevalence of theft of items beyond copper wire from city street lights. One of these items is telecommunications cable.

The HMTF has conducted numerous operations resulting in over 80 arrests. During these arrests, many of the individuals have been found to be in possession of telecommunications cable. This cable is available for sale only to those in the telecommunications industry and is something an average member of the public would not be able to acquire. Telecommunications cable is the black cabling that hangs below power lines throughout the city. Inside of this cabling are copper wires that are specifically manufactured to transmit voice data. Thieves cut the wiring in order to remove the copper wiring from the cables and sell them to metal recyclers. However, because the telecommunications cable is often tied together with fiber optic cables, cutting the telecom cable also interrupts fiber optic communication that provides emergency services.

While it might seem that theft of telecommunications cabling only affects the utility companies, the reality is that schools and businesses, particularly in low income communities, rely on the voice and data services provided by the telecommunications industry. Moreover, due the fact that burning or melting the cable results in the production of hazardous materials, only certain metal recyclers are allowed to dispose of telecommunications wire.

I THEREFORE MOVE that the City Attorney be REQUESTED to prepare and present a draft ordinance, with an urgency clause, prohibiting the possession of telecommunications cable by any individual or business except for telecommunications companies and their approved subcontractors and recyclers.

On February 26, 2024, Council adopted CF 24-0079 to create a Copper Wire Task Force to address the rampant theft of copper wiring from city street lights. Since that time, the Los Angeles Police Department has modified the task force to become the Heavy Metal Task Force (HMTF) due to the theft of items beyond copper wire from city street lights. The HMTF has conducted numerous operations that have resulted in over 80 arrests.

During many arrests, suspects are in possession of substantial amounts of copper wire. However, because copper wiring from city street lights is so similar to wiring used in homes and businesses, it is extremely difficult to determine the provenance of the stolen wire.


Currently, copper wire installed in city street lighting systems is not marked with any identifying branding, etching, or labeling to identify it as being property of the City of Los Angeles. Developing specifications for properly showing this wire as owned by the city and requiring private entities who work on city street light systems to exclusively use this branded wire can help combat the copper wire theft problem by making it easier to determine who is illegally in possession of city property.

I THEREFORE MOVE that the Bureau of Street Lighting be instructed to develop specifications for the branding, etching, and/or labeling of copper wire that is used in Bureau of Street Lighting systems.

I FURTHER MOVE that the Bureau of Street Lighting, in coordination with the Bureau of Engineering, be instructed to require that any contractor installing or replacing copper wire in city street lighting systems use wire that is branded, etched, and/or labeled consistent with the aforementioned technical specifications developed by the Bureau of Street Lighting.

I FURTHER MOVE that the Bureau of Street Lighting be instructed to issue a Request for Qualifications to solicit proposals for vendors to brand, etch, and/or label copper wire to be installed by the Bureau of Street Lighting.

WHEREAS, California Vehicle Code Section 22507 authorizes cities to restrict the parking of vehicles, including but not limited to, vehicles that are six feet or more in height, on identified City streets during certain hours; and

WHEREAS, the Los Angeles Municipal Code Section 80.69.4 allows the Council to authorize by resolution, the streets upon which the parking of oversized vehicles shall be restricted between 2:00 a.m. and 6:00 a.m.; and

WHEREAS, there is an increased problem with oversized vehicles that park overnight in Council District 10 where these large vehicles are often parked overnight and immediately adjacent to residential buildings, which constricts travel lanes and creates dangerous situations;

NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, that the City Council, pursuant to the Los Angeles Municipal Code Section 80.69.4, hereby prohibits the parking of vehicles that are in excess of 22 feet in length or over 7 feet in height, during the hours of 2:00 a.m. and 6:00 a.m. along both sides of the following street segments:

- Hauser Boulevard between Obama Boulevard and Coliseum Street.
- Venice Boulevard between Redondo Boulevard and La Brea Avenue.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that upon the adoption of this Resolution, the Department of Transportation be directed to post signs giving notice of a "tow away, no parking" restriction for oversized vehicles, with the specific hours detailed, at the above locations; and

In order to address the housing crisis, the City provides millions of dollars in financial assistance to developers of affordable housing. The Los Angeles Housing Department (LAHD) is tasked with administering processes for distribution under various programs, including the Affordable Housing Managed Pipeline and Proposition HHH Program, and bringing requests for funding to Council. LAHD's requests are typically in the form of a report or Motion.

In some cases, LAHD brings reports to Council to recommend financial assistance to projects and provides detailed information through a departmental report with a project summary, known as a Staff Report. The Staff Report includes the project address, description, borrower entity, financing sources, and other information. In other cases, LAHD seeks to administer financial assistance or coordinate project funding through a Motion, in which case less information is provided. When there are actions that follow an initial transmittal, oftentimes Council File numbers are referenced in a Motion instead of restating basic information, such as addresses. This makes it difficult, if not impossible, for the public and the Council to fully understand the extent of the transaction and determine what parties are benefiting from the City's assistance.

It is critical that in any LAHD request to Council, all relevant project information and pertinent consultant entities are disclosed to ensure transparency and minimize potential conflict of interest with Councilmembers making decisions. LAHD should be as explicit as possible and provide information on all known parties that would benefit from the financial assistance. Any consultant that is known at the time of the requested transaction should be disclosed. LAHD should disclose all affected parties in a standardized format, both in the initial transaction and any follow up transactions.

I THEREFORE MOVE that Council instruct the Housing Department to include a Project Disclosure Form, substantially in conformance with the attached template, with all housing transmittals, including reports and Motions, to disclose all relevant project information and pertinent parties that are receiving financial assistance, including the project address, Borrower Entity, General Partner(s), service providers, and all consultants known at the time the Department is seeking Council action ensure transparency of transactions.



In September 2009, the City Council adopted an ordinance establishing a Special Event Permit Procedure (Ordinance No. 180881) including a process to grant limited subsidy requests. The Ordinance provides the framework to effectively ensure that City fees and charges, including salary costs, for special events are accurately determined and recovered. The Ordinance also provides for a mechanism to ensure that limited City funds and resources are available to support special events serving a public purpose.

The Ordinance also requires the Chief Legislative Analyst (CLA) to prepare and submit an annual Citywide List of Special Events for Council's review and approval. A citywide special event is an event of interest to a significant number of City residents from three or more Council Districts. The fee subsidy allows an event sponsor to request a reimbursement of up to 50% of the City costs associated with the event. Event sponsors must show proof of nonprofit or charitable status (IRS Determination Letter) and have an annual operating budget of less than \$5 million. Subsidies may be provided only for non-commercial special events that promote a public purpose and public benefit. Requests for special event fee subsidies are referred to the CLA for review and recommendation. The Bureau of Street Services administers an on-line permit application center to coordinate the permitting process.


The attached revised List of Citywide Special Events has been prepared by the CLA with the assistance and cooperation of Council District offices. Sufficient funds have been made available in the Citywide Special Event account, administered by the City Clerk, in support of subsidy requests.


