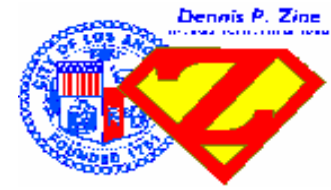

BACK TO THE DRAWING BOARD

On February 27, 2003, the South Valley Area Planning Commission (SVAPC) denied a zone change request by Westmarc Development from RA (1 dwelling unit per 17,500 square feet) to RD6 (1 dwelling unit per 6,000 square feet), which would have made way for 18 detached single family homes on 3.2 acre lot at the southwest corner of Burbank Boulevard and Farralone Street.

This decision brought a great sigh of relief for the Woodland Hills residents who attended the hearing and passionately spoke in opposition of the proposed development. (There were no residents at the hearing who spoke in favor of the project). The decision was also a surprise to many, because in January, the Advisory Agency approved this tentative tract for a maximum of 18 units but required that the homes be one story, not two stories as planned by the developers. That decision upset many as it went against the Woodland Hills Neighborhood Council vote that the project only be approved if it remains as an RA zone – meaning 7 to 8 homes maximum.

Councilman Zine's position was expressed at the SVAPC hearing in which he concluded that the lot should remain zoned as RA to preserve the character and integrity of one of the *last* remaining RA zoned blocks in the immediate area. He was aware that the biggest argument against the project was that of density. Although the developers did make a reduction from 23 to 18 homes, they were still asking for a density that was three times greater than what exists on the same block. Other arguments made against the project were that the design, architecture and configuration of the homes was entirely out of character with the immediate neighborhood.

Many of the residents did state they are not against this lot being developed. It is therefore hoped that in the future, should a development plan be proposed, that it blend in nicely with the existing neighborhood.

More Revitalization In Reseda

Through the dedicated guidance of Councilman Zine, the City Council will be considering the zoning approvals to allow for a brand new CVS Pharmacy and a 68 unit apartment complex. The project will be built on the 7400 block of Reseda Boulevard at Valerio Street.

This fresh new project will be replacing a dilapidated used car lot and an unkept vacant lot that had been a nuisance for attracting vagrants, graffiti, and trash. Both the pharmacy and the apartment will have extensive landscaping and architectural features that will greatly improve the neighborhood. Further, there will be sidewalk and street improvements to help improve traffic flow and make the intersection safer.

“This is yet another example of my continued effort to revitalize our neighborhoods and bring new projects to the long neglected areas of our district,” Councilman Zine said. “Working together with the community we can succeed.”

Neighborhood Prosecutor Program Celebrates One Year of Success in Winnetka

On Tuesday, March 11, community residents in the West San Fernando Valley gathered in the home of Mary Jane Casarez on Hartland Avenue in Winnetka to celebrate the one year anniversary of the City Attorney's Neighborhood Prosecutor Program. Representatives from the Winnetka area and city officials came together to celebrate a success story. For more than three years, the residence at 20331 Hartland Avenue was seen as a neighborhood eyesore. The tenants had a criminal record, and had an apparent disregard for their neighbors. The home violated numerous building and safety codes, and was a hazard to many. Neighborhood Prosecutor Mike Pizzuti worked with the Council Office and with the other City Departments to eliminate this problem. Today, the home has been cleaned up, the tenants have been evicted, and the neighboring community has been relieved of this large nuisance. New tenants are living there, and the community is happy with the aesthetics of this home. During this event, City Attorney Rocky Delgadillo, joined Senior Lead Officer Karen Widman-Rodriguez, Building and Safety's Frank Bush, Neighborhood Prosecutor Mike Pizzuti, and Councilman Dennis P. Zine's Field Deputy, Marisol Espinoza, to also answer questions from Winnetka residents. Twenty-five constituents of the Third Council District had the opportunity to voice their concerns to all the City Departments that were represented. The Council Office presented a certificate of congratulations to City Attorney Rocky Delgadillo for the One Year Anniversary of the Neighborhood Prosecutor Program. “POLICE BELONG ON THE STREET” ZINE PUSHES FOR MORE CIVILIAN OVERSIGHT OF LAPD CONSENT DECREE

LOS ANGELES (April 2)--- In Council action today, Los Angeles City Councilman and former LAPD sergeant Dennis P. Zine led his colleagues in approving more than 50 positions to monitor the LAPD Consent Decree. During the debate, Zine stressed the need for more civilians to do the audit functions required by the federal court.

‘Our city-wide priority is to have the nation’s best police force. With that force we can once again have the safe streets we all want. To do that we need more officers on the street, not at a desk, said the 33-year LAPD veteran. We all want to make the consent decree work, but we must not raid black and whites to do it. What we accomplished today. I believe, is the start of a process which will put more civilians into oversight positions which monitor the consent decree, and keep our highly trained police officers in the streets protecting and serving the public.’

We can get the qualified personnel we need without shrinking our ranks of uniformed officers on the street preventing and fighting crime” said Zine, We need to look for other areas where civilians can work effectively’

Zine acknowledged that a unique background is required for any person who will perform the necessary monitoring of the consent decree. That is why line is stressing the need for the City to hire qualified retired police personnel.

Currently! of the 51 positions approved for LAPD, civilians will fill 28 positions. Zine recommended to the LAPO officials present to also fill the remaining 23 positions with civilians or police agency retirees as best as possible.

As chairman of the Council Personnel Committee, Zine oversees requests for exemptions from the City’s hiring freeze. While consent decree positions bypass the committee system, Zine has pledged to scrutinize every consent decree request made by the LAPO.

The Police Department will return to the Personnel Committee and Council within 120-days to report back on the efforts made to hire more civilians to monitor the LAPD consent decree.

Zine was joined during Tuesday’s Personnel Committee and during the Council debate today by freshman Councilman Bernard Parks, the former LAPD chief of police, in calling for more civilian monitors of the consent decree.

Mayor Hahn, U.S. Public Health Officials Discuss Measures to Prevent Transmission of SARS at LAX

LOS ANGELES--April 4, 2003--Following advisory alerts announced by health authorities around the world. Mayor Jim Hahn today announced that the City will provide assistance to U.S. Public Health Officials to inform travelers and others about the Severe Acute Respiratory Syndrome (SARS); a respiratory illness that has been reported in Asia, North America and Europe.

Although no cases have been reported at Los Angeles International Airport (LAX), Mayor Hahn wanted to reassure people that Los Angeles is taking appropriate measures to keep passengers *safe* in their travel through Los Angeles.

"I have requested Los Angeles World Airport officials to provide short-term resources to assist health officials in the screening and education of travelers. Qualified LAWA employees will distribute the multi-language Health Alert Notice,' so that officials can focus on screening passengers," said Mayor Hahn. In response to Mayor Hahn's request, LAX is providing staff to assist public health officers with distributing informational leaflets on SARS in the Tom Bradley International Terminal (TBIT).

LAX is the largest origination and destination airport in the country. It serves as a hub to approximately 25 daily international nonstop and direct flights to Asia, including China, Taiwan, Hong Kong, Singapore, Japan, Korea, Philippines, Thailand and Malaysia.

"Vigilance in rapidly detecting and appropriately caring for suspect cases of SARS with proper infection control is our best defense in combating this global epidemic. We are delighted to receive the Mayor's support in this important public health response at our ports," said Rational Center for Infectious Diseases at the Centers for Disease Control Deputy Director Marty Centrum.

'Respiratory illnesses are very common in Los Angeles County at this time of the year," said Director of Public Health and County Health Officer Dr. Jonathan Fielding. 'Therefore, the mere presence of these symptoms should not be a cause of heightened concern. However, due to the potential impact of SARS, we have significantly enhanced our surveillance and are in close contact with hospitals throughout Los Angeles County.

Currently, the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services and its Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) are working with LAX operations staff, the Los Angeles Fire Department, and the Los Angeles County Department of Health Services to ensure that travelers coming from identified areas in Asia are informed about possible exposure to SARS and are educated about what they should do if they begin to exhibit any of the SARS symptoms.

The World Health Organization encourages precautionary measures at U.S. airports, ports, airlines and health organizations to stem the Spread of SARS. To date, reported cases in the U.S. have been kept to approximately 85, with no reported deaths.

"We advise travelers to educate themselves on SARS and the symptoms associated with it, particularly if they plan to travel to any of the risk areas," Mayor Hahn stated. Everyone should engage in good hygiene practices,

Frequently Asked Questions.

The federal public health officials are the first line of defense before any cases of passengers reporting or exhibiting SARS-like symptoms come into contact with the general public at LAX. They are supported by over a thousand officers from other federal inspection agencies at LAX, including the U.S. Immigration & Naturalization Service, the U.S. Customs Service and the U.S. Department of Agriculture, who are also monitoring arriving international passengers for issues of public health concern. The CDC Media Relations Office has a 24-hour, live operator at (404) 639-3286, and its website address is www.cdc.gov.

Following are some questions-and-answers based upon media inquiries we have received:

Q1: What is the impact of SARS on operations at LAX? In general, the number of operations (i.e., landings and takeoffs) has not been affected. There have been nearly 1,750 operations daily at LAX. This number has not changed during the last three weeks since before the war and SARS. However, the passenger loads per flight at the Tom Bradley International Terminal where nearly 40 airlines operate, has dropped from the mid-70 percent level three weeks ago to the low-50 to mid-50 percent range this week.

Q2: Does the airport recommend passengers wear face masks while traveling? There is no U.S. Dept. of Health and Human Services/CUC advisory to this effect, That is the prerogative of the passenger. The CDC does advise the general public to practice good hygiene such as washing their hands frequently with soap and water, similar to general advice given to avoid contracting other types of flu. It is recognized that people may choose to be cautious in taking additional means to alleviate their fears about being exposed to infected droplets (i.e., sneezing, coughing, etc.) and wear such masks during a flight.

Q3: How many public health workers are assigned to LAX? The U. S. Dept. of Health and Human Services has always had a presence at LAX -- even before Sept. 11. The federal agency has augmented their LAX staff with additional workers from its local offices in order to monitor and distribute the Health Alert Notices to arriving international passengers from Asian countries. They are also complemented by the over 1000 federal U.S. Customs, INS, Agriculture and other federal agency officials who process international arriving passengers on a daily basis. Please call the U.S. Dept. of Health and Human Services/CDC in Atlanta for a specific answer to this question.

Q4: Does the airport recommend passenger's fly/postpone their travel plans to Asia? Whether or not a passenger decides to fly is an individual decision.

Q5: What is being done to protect LAX workers? Public health officials at LAX are meeting inbound flights from Asia and distributing information to passengers. Passengers exhibiting SARS-like symptoms would be assessed and isolated from the general public, if needed. Public health officials at LAX are conducting briefings with airline, other federal agencies and airport personnel and providing information that can be distributed to their respective employees. In general, airport workers are being advised to follow good hygiene practices, such as washing their hands frequently with soap and water.

Q6: Where else can the public get information about SARS? The CDCs Office of Communication is conducting several media conferences and the complete transcriptions are made available on its website at www.cdc.gov. Press releases and Frequently Asked Questions are also available on its website. CDCs emergency hotlines with live operators are being heavily used for SARS inquiries: in English at (888) 246-2675; in Spanish at (888) 246-2057; and TTY at (866) 074—2646.

Q7: What are the procedures to call a quarantine? Quarantines at LAX would be announced and can only be called by the public health service. There are federal, state and local quarantine laws regarding restricting peoples movements. Please contact federal, state and local public health services.

Q8: Are there any travel restrictions? It is recognized that the World Health Organization has issued a travel restriction advisory regarding Guangdong Province and Hong Kong, and the OW issued a travel restriction advisory last weekend. Please see both of their websites for these media advisories.

Unwanted Telemarketing Calls

Attorney General Bill Lockyer Announces Internet Sign-ups Available Now. My office is offering a convenient and secure way using the Internet to pre-register for the free nationwide Do Not Call program that the FTC will begin operating this summer.

Californians can now pre-register here for the nationwide Do Not Call list that the Federal Trade Commission (FTC) is expected to launch this summer. California is joining in the national Do Not Call registry which is FREE to consumers. If you sign up today, you can stop unwanted telemarketing calls beginning in October under the nationwide program.

Currently, pre-registration is available only through the internet. However, if you can't find an answer to your question (see Frequently Asked Questions), the Do Not Call Unit is available to assist you on the Do Not Call program.

We will deliver the pre-registered California telephone numbers to the FTC as soon as the federal agency is ready to receive them – most likely in July 2003. Only California residential and mobile telephone numbers are eligible for this program. Business telephone numbers are excluded.

Beginning October 2003, telemarketers must stop calling consumers whose telephone number is on the national Do Not Call list. While most telemarketer calls will be prohibited, there are certain exceptions. For example, charities, and companies that have an established relationship with a consumer will still be allowed to make calls.

Signing up through the California Department of Justice web site means that your information won't be used for any purpose other than to get onto the FTC Do Not Call list. Don't be fooled by bogus registration sites.

The FTC will begin taking registrations by telephone in July 2003.

COUNCIL PASSES ZINE RESOLUTION TO SUPPORT U.S. TROOPS IN IRAQ

The Los Angeles City Council today unanimously passed a resolution by Councilman Dennis P. Zine, Third District, placing the City of Los Angeles on record as a strong supporter of the United States Armed Forces now engaged in hostilities in Iraq.

"I am very proud to author this resolution and to have six of my colleagues sign on as seconds," Zine said following the Council Vote. "I am particularly grateful." Zine said, to have the support of Councilmen Hal Benmon and Nate Holden, the two members the City Council who served our nation in the Uniform of the United States.

"While the Council may have disagreed on the policy which has lead us to this conflict, when it comes to the men and women in uniform, the City Council and I believe the entire City is 100% behind the troops."

Under Council rules, no more than seven members may sign on to any single motion or resolution to be presented to the Council, The resolution now goes to the Mayor for signature.

WHEREAS, The people of Los Angeles, as do the people of the United States, believe in and strive for a world at peace; and

WHEREAS, The people of Los Angeles, as do the people of the United States, hold the men and "women of the United States Armed Forces in the highest esteem: and

WHEREAS, More than 500 members of the Los Angeles City Family are away from us on active duty in Armed Forces of the United States: and

WHEREAS, Many more residents of Los Angeles are active or reserve members of the United States Armed Forces: and

WHEREAS, Now these cherished men and "women have been ordered into harm's way: and

WHEREAS, The people of Los Angeles, as do the people of the United States and indeed all the world, yearn for a swift end to this conflict: and

WHEREAS, The people of Los Angeles, as do the people of the United States, ardently desire a speedy and safe return home for all of our military men and women:

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Los Angeles City Council, subject to the approval of the Mayor, expresses its deep and unbounded pride in the men and women of the United States:

Armed Forces, and its fervent hope for a swift conclusion to this conflict: and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Los Angeles City Council looks forward to the safe return home of the men and women of the United States Armed Forces.

HOMELAND SECURITY FUNDS MOTION

WHEREAS, The Los Angeles area is teeming with potential targets for domestic and international terrorism, including Los Angeles International Airport and the Port of Los Angeles, which must be protected; and

WHEREAS, The Los Angeles Police and Fire Departments, as well as other vital City Departments, have been charged with providing protection and “First Responder” services for the people of Los Angeles; and

WHEREAS, The cost of this extra protection for the residents of Los Angeles exceeds the City’s available revenues; and

WHEREAS, The President of the United States has sent a supplemental budget request of nearly \$75 billion to the Congress to cover the cost of prosecuting the war in Iraq and the necessary security steps being taken across the nation to help safe-guard the people and facilities of the United States from terrorists assaults; and

WHEREAS, Any official position of the City of Los Angeles with respect to legislation, rules, regulations or policies proposed to or pending before a local, state or federal governmental body or agency must have first been adopted in the form of a Resolution by the City Council with the concurrence of the Mayor;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, That the Los Angeles City Council, subject to the approval of the Mayor, must take every step possible to secure through the Congress and the Department of Homeland Security the funds necessary to provide the protection needed throughout the Los Angeles Area; and
