## Why Syringe Exchange?

 SEPs allow injection drug users to trade used syringes, which are a source of HIV and Hepatitis infection, for clean syringes

 The City and County have a vested interest in the health and safety of ALL its residents

# Why Syringe Exchange? continued

- Effective at reducing HIV risk
- Does not increase drug use
- Does not increase crime or bring additional drug users to neighborhoods
- Takes contaminated syringes off of the streets
- Cost effective

# History of Syringe Exchange in Los Angeles

## • Early 1990s

- Started by a group of AIDS Activists, drug users and artists from the ACT UP movement
- Clashes with law enforcement and public officials
- Clean Needles Now starts program to serve Hollywood, Pico Union/MacArthur Park.

# History of Syringe Exchange in Los Angeles continued

### • Mid 1990s

- SEPs formally begin working with law enforcement, City AIDS Coordinator's Office and other public officials.
- Tarzana Treatment Centers starts program to serve San Fernando Valley.
- Minority AIDS Project starts program to serve South Los Angeles.
- Bienestar Human Services starts program to serve North and East Los Angeles.

# History of Syringe Exchange in Los Angeles continued

## • Late 1990s

- Homeless Healthcare Los Angeles starts program to serve Downtown Los Angeles.
- Asian American Drug Abuse Program starts program to serve Central/South Los Angeles.
- Common Ground, in collaboration with CNN starts program to serve Venice.

#### SUBJECT: SYRINGE EXCHANGE PROGRAM

Since 1994, the Department has worked in partnership with the residential and business communities, non-profit agencies, and social service organizations of the City to assist in the fight against Acquired lumnune Deficiency Syndrome (AIDS), Human Immunodeficiency Visus (IIIV) and Hepatitis C, by establishing the Syringe Exchange Program.

In 2002-03, the City-sponsored Syringe Exchange Program removed nearly one million used, potentially lethal, syringes from the streets of Los Angeles. A study conducted by the United States Surgeon General showed that syringe exchange programs are an effective public health intervention factic that reduces the transmission of AIDS, HIV and Hepathis C, and that they do not encourage the use of illegal drugs. In addition, several studies have concluded there is little evidence to support an increase in drug-related crime as a result of syringe exchange programs.

The Mayor has declared a Local Public Health Emergency regarding the AIDS/HIV epidemic and endorsed the establishment of a clean syringe exchange program in the City. This Notice reaffirms the Department's commitment to reduce the spread of AIDS, HIV and Hepatitis C, and reminds all Department personnel of the existing procedures regarding the Syringe Exchange Program in the City.

#### PROCEDURE:

- 1. SYRINGE EXCHANGE PROGRAM GENERAL PROVISIONS. The Syringe Exchange Program in the City of Los Angeles has been operating for over a decade under the sanction of the City Council. The Syringe Exchange Program is designed to allow intravenous drug users to trade used syringes, which are a major source of HIV infection, for clean syringes. Participants in the City sponsored Syringe Exchange Program must be at least 18 years of age or older and must possess a valid syringe exchange ard bearing their participant code number (see attachment 1). Syringe a cardhage sites are located throughout the City (see attachment 2 and 3) and are monitored by the City AIDS Coordinator's Office.
- II. OFFICER'S RESPONSIBILITIES. Officers who encounter participants of the Syringe Exchange Program at a designated Syringe Exchange Program location shall generally adhere to the following guidelines:
