VOTER REGISTRATION

Information regarding voter registration is available from the County Registrar-Recorder Office. The office is open 8 a.m. to 5 p.m., Monday through Friday, except for holidays. Citizens can also contact the office for information by calling **(562) 466-1310, TDD (562) 462-2259 or toll free (800) 481-VOTE.**

VISION IMPAIRED VOTERS

Cassette tapes containing information on the City of Los Angeles ballot measures for municipal elections are available approximately two weeks before the election at **The Braille Institute**, 741 N. Vermont Ave., Los Angeles, CA 90029.

TDD SERVICES FOR THE HEARING IMPAIRED

The City has a Voice/Telecommunications device (TDD), so that anyone with a hearing impairment can ask questions concerning registration. The Voice/TDD number is (213) 978-0362.

REGISTRATION SERVICES



As a L.A. County resident, you may register to vote if you are a citizen of the United States and will be at least 18 years of age at the time of the next election. To be eligible to vote in City elections (as opposed to State or Federal elections) you must also be a resident of the City of Los Angeles.

Your registration must take place at least 29 days before an election to be eligible to vote in that election.

RE-REGISTRATION

If you have moved, changed your name, or wish to change your political party, you must "re-register" to vote.

REGISTRATION-BY-MAIL

You may register by completing a brief, postage paid, *Registration-By-Mail Form*. It is available throughout the Los Angeles area, including most county buildings, city halls, fire stations, libraries, state motor vehicle offices, banks and post offices. You may also request a **Registration-By-Mail Form via 24-hour hotline at (562) 462-1310.**

PERMANENT VOTE-BY-MAIL

California law (Section 3201 of the California Elections Code) permits voters with certain specified disabilities to apply for permanent Vote-By-Mail voter status. VOTING SERVICES

ASSISTANCE IN VOTING

Under California law, any voter who needs help in casting a ballot is entitled to assistance from a poll worker. The voter may also select a person of his or her choice to provide assistance.

ACCESSIBLE POLLING PLACE

It is City policy to have as many polling places as possible that are easily accessible to all voters.

CURBSIDE VOTING

Any voter who comes to the polls and cannot reach the voting area because of architectural barriers or physical limitations may request to vote "curbside" (outside of the polling place). When notified that an individual has requested curbside voting, a poll worker will bring the ballot and punching device to the voter, assist the voter if necessary, and place the voter's ballot in the ballot box.

LANGUAGE ASSISTANCE

A precinct board member or a volunteer can assist the voter by translating the voting instructions or calling a language assistance operator at **1-800-994-VOTE**. Voting materials available on request in Chinese, Japanese, Spanish, Tagalog, Vietnamese and Korean.

VOTE-BY-MAIL

If you are unable to vote at the polls on Election Day, you may apply for a *Vote-By-Mail Ballot*. To apply, either make this request in person or in writing to: **Los Angeles City Clerk, Election Division, P.O. Box 54377, Los Angeles, CA 90054-0377**. For more information, call (213) 485-4615. If you decide to apply in person, visit the Election Division no earlier than the 29th day, and no later than 5 p.m. on the day before an election. For specific dates in each election, call the **Election Division Office at (213) 978-0444.**
