

The Road to Reform LA tour continues in May and June providing community members the opportunity to make public comments regarding governance reform. Each meeting will include a briefing from the Office of the Chief Legislative Analyst (CLA), presenting the issues arising from a specific area of redistricting reform, including size and number of Council districts, the process to be used in selecting members of an independent

redistricting commission, what criteria or requirements a commission should consider in drawing district maps, and the support systems a commission may require, including a City data bureau to collect and analyze data regarding the City's population and its needs.

Should the City of LA increase the number of Councilmembers in an effort to decrease the amount of people each serves? Redistricting commissions in the past have been accused of being too politicized. Each Councilmember was allowed to appoint members to the body.
