- A) In 2023, the California State Water Board proposed new rules for Direct Potable Reuse (DPR), which allows for the treatment of sewage into high-quality drinking water that can be piped directly to customers. These rules, developed over years of public and expert review, set extremely high standards for removing chemicals, pathogens, and other contaminants to ensure the water is safe to drink. After a final review period, the rules were approved by the board in late 2023 and are expected to go into effect in 2024, allowing projects in cities like San Diego to move forward.

 Generally speaking, 70% of the City's water comes in through the Filtration Plant in Sylmar. That's a blend of LA Aqueduct and Metropolitan Water District (MWD) State Water Project (SWP).  - From one of the Amendments in this 2024 motion is the following summary: "The extension is required to retain Kiewit for the commissioning of the San Fernando Groundwater Basin Remediation Program's (Project) Tujunga Well Field Response Action Treatment Facility (TJ Facility). Due to the emergence of Per- and Polyfluoroalkyl Substances (PFAS) contaminants in the Tujunga Well Field, the permitting of the TJ Facility has been impacted. LADWP is working with the Division of Drinking Water (DDW) to evaluate treatment and operational modifications to mitigate the new contaminants and secure the permit to operate the TJ Facility. Amendment No.3 would enable LADWP and Kiewit to commission the facility within the project warranty period. The TJ Facility DDW permit to operate this facility is expected to be approved in the fourth quarter of 2025."

 This is from the 2019 Motion:

"The primary source of local water in Los Angeles is groundwater and the largest supply of local groundwater is the San Fernando Groundwater Basin [SFB). However, chemical contamination of the SFB, prolonged drought, and increased urbanization have severely impacted the ability of the Los Angeles Department of Water and Power (LADWP) to extract water from the SFB. As a result, the number of active wells has dropped by approximately 50% and the contamination continues to spread as the groundwater travels through the basin."
