In addition to increasing the number of stations, the Committee noted that a stakeholder requested that the charging stations include theft deterrence to prevent theft of charging cables. At the October 25 Public Safety, Housing & Transportation Committee meeting, LADWP told us: Most of the opportunities that we are anticipating involve private infrastructure and that's the vast majority of the infrastructure that LADWP tries to build in the City. LADWP's Electric Transportation Programs Team runs a rebate program and they've been authorized by their Board to offer up to \$40 million per year. That's probably the best place where we want to start and the role that the RVNC could have is in connecting to LADPW the owners of those properties that we've identified or whoever is paying the electrical bill there. They would be the ones who would apply for LADWP's rebate. The way the program works is there is a space for the owners to say they will assign the rebate over to a third-party. There are multiple companies in Los Angeles that will prepare a design and they'll say if you assign the rebate over to them then they'll install the charging stations free of charge to you.

N. Discussion and possible action regarding HCID's rollout of a database of all low-income housing created in projects using density bonus or Transit Oriented Communities incentives. In response to our analysis showing some building permits being issued to projects that ostensibly did not appear on LAHD's list of covenanted projects, LAHD initiated a review of those projects and asked LADBS for information regarding LADBS' receipt of LAHD clearance for low income units. As discussed at the March 28 meeting of the Public Safety, Housing & Transportation Committee and as explained and adopted at the April 18 General Board meeting, we are completing the data analysis and working with the City to fill any data gaps, presenting it at the RVNC May 13 town house educational outreach event, inviting representatives from the Council Districts and making them aware of the benefits that could come from this project, and describing our plans for publishing it after the May 13 event. Other NCs have asked the City Council to reconsider its final vote of May 13, 2022 and refer the matter back to committee with instructions to come back with alternatives that respect the volunteer nature of NC Board and/or Committee participation. At the March 18 General Board meeting, this item was postponed while we developed a proposed community impact statement.
- T. As recommended by the PSHT Committee, discussion and possible action to approve a community impact statement for <u>Council File 23-0243</u>, Federal Immigration Enforcement / City Resources, Property, Personnel / Prohibit Use / Compliance Monitoring Report (Hernandez Raman Soto-Martinez Hutt Price). Motion is requesting the City Attorney to prepare and present a draft ordinance within 60 days to prohibit, to the extent permissible by law, any City resources, property, or personnel from being utilized for any federal immigration enforcement or to cooperate with federal immigration authorities in the execution of their duties connected to federal immigration enforcement.
- U. As a standing agenda item, collect feedback at the end of each meeting as to what worked well and what needed improvement.
- V. Consider whether any of the items on the Board meeting agenda (such as the minutes and MER) could be added to the consent calendar.
