Agendize for discussion and possible action at the June 20, 2023 General Board meeting follow-up to the Central LA virtual community workshop to develop a community-driven action plan to improve walking and biking safety focusing on neighborhood schools of Commonwealth Avenue ES, Frank Del Olmo, and Lafayette Park PC.
9. Agendize for the June 20, 2023 General Board meeting discussion and possible action on the 2021-2022 Outreach Plan for the RVNC and on planning for and scheduling of a Board Retreat to set priorities for the RVNC and develop an action plan to accomplish those priorities.
10. As recommended by the Public Safety, Housing & Transportation Committee, agendize for the June 20, 2023 General Board meeting discussion and possible action and a presentation on a map of existing <https://www.google.com/maps/search/electric+vehicle+charging+stations/@34.0671969,-118.2877427,15z/data=!3m1!4b1>) and proposed electric vehicle charging stations within the Rampart Village boundaries, including potentially St. Anne's parking lot, Mijoo Peace Church parking lot, the LAUSD parking lot on First Street, First and Virgil Streets, and between Bimini and Westmoreland on the north or south side of First Street. In addition to increasing the number of stations, the Committee noted that a stakeholder requested that the charging stations include theft deterrence to prevent theft of charging cables. At the October 25 Public Safety, Housing & Transportation Committee meeting, LADWP told us: Most of the opportunities that we are anticipating involve private infrastructure and that's the vast majority of the infrastructure that LADWP tries to build in the City. LADWP's Electric Transportation Programs Team runs a rebate program and they've been authorized by their Board to offer up to \$40 million per year. That's probably the best place where we want to start and the role that the RVNC could have is in connecting to LADWP the owners of those properties that we've identified or whoever is paying the electrical bill there. They would be the ones who would apply for LADWP's rebate. The way the program works is there is a space for the owners to say they will assign the rebate over to a third-party. There are multiple companies in Los Angeles that will prepare a design and they'll say if you assign the rebate over to them then they'll install the charging stations free of charge to you.
11. Agendize for discussion and possible action a status report on the Budget Advocates and consideration of proposing to the Budget Advocates including development of a capital infrastructure plan (please see the following link: <https://investinginplace.org/wp-content/uploads/2022/11/CIP-101.-Memo.110222.pdf>) in the City Budget process. At the November 15 General Board meeting, Ronee said the RVNC should file a community impact statement and then notify the Budget Advocates of the Council File number. Philip subsequently checked the Council File Management System and identified Council File 13-1384 (please see the following link: <https://cityclerk.lacity.org/lacityclerkconnect/index.cfm?fa=ccfi.viewrecord&cfnumber=13-1384>). This Council File was subsequently closed on August 19, 2016, in Council File 14-0600-S24 (please see the following link: <https://cityclerk.lacity.org/lacityclerkconnect/index.cfm?fa=ccfi.viewrecord&cfnumber=14-0600-S24>).
12. Lois Arkin is resigning as Chair of the Planning, Parks, Public Works and Land Use Committee. Agendize for discussion and possible action at the June 20, 2023, General Board meeting to accept applications for co-chairs, and make selections.
13. Agendize for discussion and possible action a status report on the RVNC being one of several Neighborhood Councils to be selected by the EVG-h Workgroup as candidates to be in the Pilot Program as a participant or backup. 14. Agendize for discussion and possible action the HCID rollout of database of all low-income housing created in projects using Density Bonus or Transit Oriented Communities (TOC) incentives. In response to our analysis showing some building permits being issued to projects that ostensibly did not appear on LAHD's list of covenanted projects, LAHD completed a review of those projects with final permits issued and asked LADBS to provide information regarding LADBS' receipt of LAHD clearance for low income units. As discussed at the

March 28 meeting of the Public Safety, Housing & Transportation Committee and as explained and adopted at the April 18 General Board meeting, we are completing the data analysis and working with the City to fill any data gaps, presenting it at the RVNC May 13 town house educational outreach event, inviting representatives from the Council Districts and making them aware of the benefits that could come from this project, and describing our plans for publishing it after the May 13 event. Philip is scheduled to present the data at the June 3 meeting of the Los Angeles Neighborhood Council Coalition and he submitted a workshop application for the 2023 Congress of Neighborhoods. 15. APPROVE May 2023 MER.
16. As recommended by the Public Safety, Housing & Transportation (PSHT) Committee, discussion and possible action to agendize for the June 20 General Board meeting to ask the Councilmember for CD 13 to petition the City Council to designate and enforce under [LAMC Section 41.18](#) a specific area or areas around the Value Schools by resolution based on specific documentation. President David Doyle of the Value Schools Foundation said they will reach out to the other schools to get their support for doing this. A number of parents from the schools stated that there is a need to act quickly because of everything that is at stake. As an example, a student at Central City Value School was assaulted in the alley between Madison and Juanita Streets. There are emails to the Council District going back to 2018. One parent said their 6-year-old child saw a naked woman on the street. The parents at the Everest Value school, which opened in 2022, do not feel safe in the long-awaited new home.
17. Discussion and possible action to agendize for the June 20 General Board meeting concerns raised by Carolyn Burlison about the existing conditions of the 100 block of S. Occidental Boulevard. What was once a beautiful block with flowers planted on the rounders by RVNC, now looks like a slum. Weeds have grown as tall as a person in the island, and homeless encampments have taken over. There is trash everywhere. She has reported through My311, but nothing has been done. In addition, the alley between Beverly Boulevard and 3rd Street has deep potholes that have gotten worse since the rains. She has requested repairs since November, but nothing has been done. This was discussed as a non-agenda item at the May 16 General Board meeting. At the May 23 PSHT Committee meeting, we discussed that we will wait for the Council Offices for CD 1 and CD 13 to respond before we take any action. In the meantime, Carmen Medina and Hector Quezada will discuss a proposal for a plan that our stakeholders would like to pursue.
18. Discussion and possible action to agendize for the June 20 General Board meeting to approve a community impact statement for Council File 23-0002-S52, SB 567 (Durazo) / Homeless Prevention Act / LowIncome Renter Protections / Unjust Evictions / Unreasonable Rent Increases (Raman – Harris-Dawson): Introduced April 12, 2023 and referred to Rules, Elections, and Intergovernmental Relations Committee. Resolution is requesting the City of Los Angeles to include in its 2023-2024 State Legislative Program SUPPORT for Senate Bill 567 (Durazo), the Homelessness Prevention Act, which builds on existing law to better protect California's low-income renters from unjust evictions and exorbitant rent increases.
19. Discussion and possible action to agendize for the June 20 General Board meeting to approve a community impact statement for Council File 23-0002-S51, AB 963 (Schiavo) / End Foster Care-to-Homelessness Pipeline Act / California Infrastructure and economic Development Bank / Housing Construction Loans (Yaroslavsky – Raman): Introduced April 12, 2023 and referred to Rules, Elections, and Intergovernmental Relations Committee. Resolution is requesting the City of Los Angeles to include in its 2023-24 State Legislative Program SUPPORT for Assembly Bill 963 (Schiavo), the End the Foster Care-to-Homelessness Pipeline Act.
20. Discussion and possible action to agendize for the June 20 General Board meeting to approve a community impact statement for Council File 23-0002-S48, SB 376 (Rubio) / Human Trafficking / Victims Rights / Advocate and Support Person / Notifications / Confidentiality (Park – Rodriguez): Introduced April 12, 2023 and referred to Rules, Elections, and Intergovernmental Relations Committee. Resolution is requesting the City of Los Angeles to include in its 2023-24 State Legislative Program SUPPORT for Senate Bill 376 to provide human trafficking victims the right to have a human trafficking advocate and support person present during law enforcement and legal interviews, and notifications of their rights and confidentiality limitations.
21. Discussion and possible action to agendize for the June 20 General Board meeting to approve a community impact statement for Council File 23-0002-S55, AB 645 (Friedman - Santiago - Ting) / Speed Safety System Pilot Program / Automated Speed Enforcement / Vision Zero Policy.
22. Discussion and possible action to agendize for the June 20 General Board meeting to approve a community impact statement for Council File [23-0359](#), Democracy Vouchers Program / City Elections / Representative Decision-Making. This motion would direct the City's Chief Legislative Analyst, in consultation with the Ethics Commission, to research the feasibility of establishing a democracy vouchers program, including options for full public financing, which will help inform the city on paths to empower all Angelenos, regardless of income or background, to have the opportunity to contribute to local campaigns, ensuring that donors, candidates, and officeholders are more accountable and representative of the electorate. A similar program has been in place in Seattle since 2017, resulting in an expanded donor pool that is similar to voters in terms of age, income, and race, a larger and more diverse candidate pool, and increased levels of civic participation, especially among low-propensity voters.
23. Discussion and possible action to agendize for the June 20 General Board meeting to approve a plan for board meeting set up and take down, including inviting guests, interpretation (include in outreach that Spanish
