4. Agendize for the November 21, 2023 General Board meeting board action to recommend one board member to serve as a panelist to sit on a Regional Grievance Panel. 6. Agendize to have the assigned member(s) present the updated Rampart Village Neighborhood Council Inventory Reports to the General Board for final Board review and approval.
7. Agendize for discussion and possible action at the November 21, 2023 General Board meeting follow-up to the Central LA virtual community workshop to develop a community-driven action plan to improve walking and biking safety focusing on neighborhood schools of Commonwealth Avenue ES, Frank Del Olmo, and Lafayette Park PC. We heard from Margot Ocanas, LADOT's Safe Routes to School (SRTS) Director that the SRTS plan for those schools and a total of 21 schools in the area was funded for \$32 million in CalTrans Active Transportation Program, Cycle 6. Although the scramble crosswalk at Third Street and Vermont Avenue was removed from the application, it includes a scramble crosswalk during designated hours at 1st Street and New Hampshire Avenue. As Philip discussed with Margot on October 4, we understand that she will communicate with the Vision Zero Program to understand why they are saying the scramble crosswalk at Third Street and Vermont Avenue doesn't meet their guidelines.
8. Agendize for discussion and possible action safety around the Value charter schools located at 240 N. Madison Avenue and 221 N. Westmoreland. At the October 17, 2023, General Board meeting, David Nguyen from the Mayor's Office of Community Engagement and Nick Marcone from the Mayor's Office of Housing and Homelessness Solutions reported that over 100 people were relocated from encampments to interim housing through Inside Safe, a citywide, voluntary, proactive housing-led strategy to bring people inside from tents and encampments, and to prevent encampments from returning, on October 11 and 12. To prevent repopulation of encampments after an Inside Safe operation, Nick said they try to keep a footprint in the area and monitor. If they see tents going up, they will continue to outreach to those individuals because once one tent goes up it can be a domino effect. So service providers and the Mayor's outreach team keep an eye out and, if tents pop up, get an idea of who those individuals are and see if they can offer them something to mitigate repopulation.
9. Agendize for the November 21, 2023 General Board meeting discussion and possible action on the 2021-2022 Outreach Plan for the RVNC and on planning for and scheduling of a Board Retreat to set priorities for the RVNC and develop an action plan to accomplish those priorities.
10. As recommended by the Public Safety, Housing & Transportation Committee, agendize for the November 21, 2023 General Board meeting discussion and possible action and a presentation on a map of existing <https://www.google.com/maps/search/electric+vehicle+charging+stations/@34.0671969,-118.2877427,15z/data=!3m1!4b1>) and proposed electric vehicle charging stations within the Rampart Village boundaries, including potentially St. Anne's parking lot, Mijoo Peace Church parking lot, the LAUSD parking lot on First Street, First and Virgil Streets, and between Bimini and Westmoreland on the north or south side of First Street. In addition to increasing the number of stations, the Committee noted that a stakeholder requested that the charging stations include theft deterrence to prevent theft of charging cables. At the October 25, 2022 Public Safety, Housing & Transportation Committee meeting, LADWP told us: Most of the opportunities that we are anticipating involve private infrastructure and that's the vast majority of the infrastructure that LADWP tries to build in the City. LADWP's Electric Transportation Programs Team runs a rebate program and they've been authorized by their Board to offer up to \$40 million per year. That's probably the best place where we want to start and the role that the RVNC could have is in connecting to LADPW the owners of those properties that we've identified or whoever is paying the electrical bill there. They would be the ones who would apply for LADWP's rebate. The way the program works is there is a space for the owners to say they will assign the rebate over to a third-party. There are multiple companies in Los Angeles that will prepare a design and they'll say if you assign the rebate over to them then they'll install the charging stations free of charge to you.
11. Agendize for discussion and possible action the HCID rollout of database of all low-income housing created in projects using Density Bonus or Transit Oriented Communities (TOC) incentives. In response to our analysis showing some building permits being issued to projects that ostensibly did not appear on LAHD's list of covenanted projects, LAHD completed a review of those projects with final permits issued and asked LADBS to provide information regarding LADBS' receipt of LAHD clearance for low income units. On June 21 Building and Safety Commissioner Joselyn Geaga-Rosenthal forwarded to the General Manager of LADBS an email message from Philip and the General Manager said he would check with Celeste Nguyen who told Philip on June 27 that she requested their Systems Group to expand the existing report based on his email request. On September 1, Philip provided to CD 13 the following data visualization and asked for their feedback and we plan to raise this issue again when the Councilmember visits us at our November 21 General Board meeting: [extract of join of](#)

12. Discussion and possible action to approve a letter of support for a proposed development located at 520 S Lafayette Park Place. This item was postponed from a prior meeting to allow board members to take the Planning 101 Training.
13. Discussion and possible action to agendaize for the November 21 General Board meeting concerns raised by Carolyn Burleson about the existing conditions of the 100 block of S. Occidental Boulevard. What was once a beautiful block with flowers planted on the rounders by RVNC, now looks like a slum. Weeds have grown as tall as a person in the island, and homeless encampments have taken over. There is trash everywhere. She has reported through My311, but nothing has been done. In addition, the alley between Beverly Boulevard and 3rd Street has deep potholes that have gotten worse since the rains. She has requested repairs since November, but nothing has been done. This was discussed as a non-agenda item at the May 16 General Board meeting. At the May 23 PSHT Committee meeting, we discussed that we will wait for the Council Offices for CD 1 and CD 13 to respond before we take any action. In the meantime, Carmen Medina and Hector Quezada will discuss a proposal for a plan that our stakeholders would like to pursue. Hector said he has spoken with Carmen and he will provide an update.
14. Discussion and possible action to agendaize for the November 21 General Board meeting to address resumption of PATH Neighborhood Watch Committee meetings. On September 18, Zeke Sandoval, PATH's Public Policy Manager informed Philip that PATH is close to hiring a new Community Affairs associate and he's looking forward to attending our meeting soon to talk more about PATH's expanded outreach work in CD 13 and the Neighborhood Watch Committee.

This motion was passed at the October 17, 2023 General Board meeting and this item remains on the agenda in order to address any additional requirements that may come down from City Council's consideration of Council Files 23-1113 and 23-1114.
20. As recommended by the PSHT Committee, discussion and possible action to agendaize for the November 21 General Board meeting to approve a proposal to organize and conduct a CERT training for the RVNC.
21. Discussion and possible action to agendaize for the November 21 General Board meeting approval to support follow-up to the first Play Street event, which occurred on September 9 as part of the 100-year anniversary of Commonwealth Avenue Elementary in Historic Filipinotown. 22. Discussion and possible action to agendaize for the November 21 General Board meeting approval of including in the announcements at the beginning of the meeting that board members are asked to put their cell phones on silent and leave the room to answer any urgent calls.
23. Discussion and possible action to agendaize for the November 21 General Board meeting to present an update on the LAEV Digital Storybook and to approve a request for additional funding to cover the compensation of an artist to complete the project.
24. As recommended by the PSHT Committee, discussion and possible action to agendaize for the November 21 General Board meeting to approve a community impact statement for Council File 23-0002-S75, Ending Homelessness Act of 2023 (H.R. 4232) / End Homelessness / Reduce Poverty / Housing Choice Voucher Program (Hutt – Harris-Dawson – Hernandez). Resolution is requesting that the City of Los Angeles include in its 2023-2024 Federal Legislative Program SUPPORT for H.R. 4232, the Ending Homelessness Act of 2023, which would end homelessness and significantly reduce American poverty through the entitlement of the Housing Choice Voucher program.

- 4233, the Housing Crisis Response Act of 2023, which would provide \$150 billion in fair and affordable housing investments across the country.

Discussion and possible action to agendaize for the November 21 General Board meeting to approve a community impact statement for Council File 23-0002-S48, SB 376 (Rubio) / Human Trafficking / Victims Rights / Advocate and Support Person / Notifications / Confidentiality (Park – Rodriguez): Introduced April 12, 2023 and referred to Rules, Elections, and Intergovernmental Relations Committee. Resolution is requesting the City of Los Angeles to include in its 2023-24 State Legislative Program SUPPORT for Senate Bill 376 to provide human trafficking victims the right to have a human trafficking advocate and support person present during law enforcement and legal interviews, and notifications of their rights and confidentiality limitations.
 27. Discussion and possible action to agendaize for the November 21 General Board meeting to approve a community impact statement for Council File 23-0731, Rental Unit / Tenancy Termination Notices / Rent Stabilization Ordinance (RSO) / Just Cause Ordinance (JCO) / City Filing Requirement (*Hernandez – Hutt – Soto-Martinez*): Introduced June 28, 2023 and referred to Homelessness Committee. Motion is requesting that the City Attorney's office, with the assistance of LAHD, to prepare and present a draft ordinance that would require all notices to terminate a tenancy for any rental unit subject to the RSO, JCO, or other applicable laws in the City of Los Angeles be filed with the LAHD, Mayor's Office, and Council District three business days prior to the service on the tenant.
 28. Discussion and possible action to agendaize for the November 21 General Board meeting to approve a community impact statement for Council File 23-0919, 5-Year Capital Infrastructure Plan / Public Right-of-Way Projects / Mobility Equity Goals.
 29. Discussion and possible action to agendaize for the November 21 General Board meeting to approve a plan for board meeting set up and take down, including inviting guests, interpretation (include in outreach whether Spanish interpretation will be provided for the November 21 General Board meeting), printing the agenda and other documents, sound system, video system, Zoom and recording (including a return to Zoom or hybrid meetings), and ordering and picking up food and beverages and eating utensils.
