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Every person wishing to address the Board must dial 669.900.6833, and enter 843 9934 5554 and then press # to join the meeting. When prompted by the presiding officer, to provide public input at the Neighborhood Council meeting the public will be requested to dial *9 or use the Raise Hand option, to address the Board on any agenda item before the Board takes an action on an item. Comments from the public on agenda items will be heard only when the respective item is being considered.

Comments from the public on other matters not appearing on the agenda that are within the Board's jurisdiction will be heard during the General Public Comment period. Please note that under the Brown Act, the Board is prevented from acting on a matter that you bring to its attention during the General Public Comment period; however, the issue raised by a member of the public may become the subject of a future Board meeting. Public comment is limited to 2 minutes per speaker, unless adjusted by the presiding officer of the Board.

SB 411 Updates:

In the event of a disruption that prevents the eligible legislative body from broadcasting the meeting to members of the public using the call-in option or internet-based service option, or in the event of a disruption within the eligible legislative body's control that prevents members of the public from offering public comments using the call-in option or internet-based service option, the eligible legislative body shall take no further action on items appearing on the meeting agenda until public access to the meeting via the call-in option or internet-based service option is restored. Actions taken on agenda items during a disruption that prevents the eligible legislative body from broadcasting the meeting may be challenged pursuant to Section 54960.1.

(C) The eligible legislative body shall not require public comments to be submitted in advance of the meeting and shall provide an opportunity for the public to address the legislative body and offer comments in real time.

- (D) Notwithstanding Section 54953.3, an individual desiring to provide public comment through the use of an internet website, or other online platform, not under the control of the eligible legislative body, that requires registration to log in to a teleconference may be required to register as required by the third-party internet website or online platform to participate.
- (E) (i) An eligible legislative body that provides a timed public comment period for each agenda item shall not close the public comment period for the agenda item, or the opportunity to register, pursuant to subparagraph (D), to provide public comment until that timed public comment period has elapsed.
 - (ii) An eligible legislative body that does not provide a timed public comment period, but takes public comment separately on each agenda item, shall allow a reasonable amount of time per agenda item to allow public members the opportunity to provide public comment, including time for members of the public to register pursuant to subparagraph (D), or otherwise be recognized for the purpose of providing public comment.
 - (iii) An eligible legislative body that provides a timed general public comment period that does not correspond to a specific agenda item shall not close the public comment period or the opportunity to register, pursuant to subparagraph (D), until the timed general public comment period has elapsed.

- B. Discussion and possible action to have the assigned member(s) present the updated Rampart Village Neighborhood Council Inventory Reports to the General Board for final Board review and approval.
- C. Discussion and possible action as follow-up to the Central LA virtual community workshop to develop a community-driven action plan to improve walking and biking safety focusing on neighborhood schools of Commonwealth Avenue ES, Frank Del Olmo, and Lafayette Park PC. At LA Metro's presentation at our July 16 General Board meeting on the Vermont Transit Corridor Project, Philip asked Metro to consider a scramble crosswalk at 3rd Street and Vermont Avenue in their planning for the Bus Rapid Transit which has a proposed station at that intersection. Philip said on August 22 he attended the Metro Active Transportation Program Cycle 2 workshop and submitted a question requesting feedback regarding whether a study of crash patterns and volume threshold requirements at Vermont Ave/3rd St and investigation of appropriate countermeasures, potentially including a scramble crosswalk, would be eliqible for and potentially a priority for MAT Cycle 2.
- D. Discussion and possible action to follow up on an action plan for the 100 block of S. Occidental Boulevard. At our March 19 General Board meeting, Diana Vicente, CD 1 Field Representative, told us that they want to bring to us a proposal for their Climate Fellows to plant native vegetation in the Occidental medians and they will convey this to CD 13. - E. APPROVE the Monthly Expenditure Reports for August 2024.
- F. Discussion and possible action to revisit a funding contribution of up to \$1000 for the 2024 Congress of Neighborhoods, to ensure required specificity, and to complete and submit the Neighborhood Council Funding Contribution Form, Congress of Neighborhoods/Budget Advocacy Special Accounts.
- G. Discussion and possible action to nominate and approve the selection of Gaines Newborn and any other applicants to the Parks, Planning, Public Works and Land Use (PPPWLU) Committee.
- H. Discussion and possible action to approve a specific BAC listing St. Anne's as meeting space for \$3900 and office space for \$6645, the amounts of rent approved by the RVNC. Please note that we are no longer able to use the BAC approving the Admin Packet for this purpose.
- I. Discussion and possible action to approve an expenditure of \$440 to relocate the RVNC banners on Temple Street before March 31, 2025. We can leave them down at no cost, or schedule to relocate them.
- J. Discussion and possible action to approve an amount up to \$250/month for our meeting note-taker (currently Emily Atalay) to take the minutes for the Executive Committee meetings in addition to the General Board meetings. Lara said she would gather the documentation needed to add At work Personnel Services as a vendor so we could pay their invoices. According to DONE's June 18, 2024 Neighborhood Council Monthly Update, a contract may be required with the vendor since DONE apparently allowed the City-wide contract to lapse.

- K. As recommended by the Public Safety, Housing & Transportation Committee, discussion and possible action regarding the HCID rollout of a database of all low-income housing created in projects using Density Bonus or Transit Oriented Communities (TOC) incentives, including consideration of approving a community impact statement for Council File 23-0426, Affordable Housing / Multilingual Online System / Search and Application. On July 2, Emma Howard, CD 13 planning deputy, told us she would follow up with LAHD and LADBS on this issue in depth. On August 21, she told us the context is the affordable housing registry motion: Council File 23-0426, their colleagues at CD 4 are lead on this effort and she believes that the city is in process in terms of hiring the team that will create the system. Also, she notes that the Housing Element Update would include some registry requirements as part of the Resident Protections Ordinance. On September 9, Philip had a call with Mashael Majid, CD 4 Deputy Chief of Staff Planning, Housing, and Community Development, to discuss these issues.  L. As recommended by the Public Safety, Housing & Transportation Committee, discussion and possible action regarding approval with the following caveats for the RVNC to participate in a research project and in finding residents that will be willing to participate in these workshops, collaborators to help host a workshop, and a community center or another local venue to use for the workshop. The RVNC acts as a conduit and does not take a major role or take the lead for hosting the workshop. If the motion passes, the RVNC would participate in a research project funded by the National Science Foundation studying the risks associated with concrete buildings in Los Angeles constructed prior to modern seismic building codes. Purdue University wants us to help them organize a community workshop at Rampart Village where they have identified a high density of concrete buildings constructed prior to modern seismic building codes. The project goal is to understand:
 - 1. the value of retrofits that would allow buildings to be immediately reoccupied and minimize disruptions to public services after a major earthquake;
 - 2. how these benefits vary depending on the building's function, like whether the building is residential, an office, a school or a grocery store;
 - 3. how people interact with structures, and the impacts a community would experience if different buildings were damaged in an earthquake; and
 - how seismic retrofits should be evaluated and prioritized to develop guidance for public officials.
- M. Discussion and possible action to approve a letter of support to LA Metro as it completes the early planning phase of the <u>Vermont Transit Corridor Project</u>. Metro wants to work with our Neighborhood Council and the project briefing at our July 16 General Board meeting provided insights into project goals and benefits and addressed questions. On July 30, Philip observed a Metro bus hit a bicyclist as it was approaching the southbound bus stop at Vermont and Beverly. The bicyclist was transported by LAFD. Consequently, this gives added emphasis to our need to understand Metro's plans to accommodate bikes on the portion of the Vermont Transit Corridor Project north of Gage Avenue.
- N. Discussion and possible action to approve our following up with CD 10 and Department of Recreation and Parks about the establishment of a Park Advisory Board and the timeline for additional community input for and implementation of the renovations, including that we will consider any requests of our stakeholders for the RVNC to make recommendations to the Park Director for them to be included on the Park Advisory Board. On August 30, Ana Valdez, Shatto Park Director, told us they are definitely working on getting a Park Advisory Board at Shatto up and running by mid-September. They will be reaching out to interested patrons and community members and then holding interviews to see if it's a good fit all around. We understand that the Los Angeles Neighborhood Initiative has furnished to CD 10 and the Department of Recreation and Parks the complete results of the two community meetings held on June 22 and July 13, 2019.
