**Determination to continue to hold meetings virtually**: The Board of Neighborhood Commissioners (BONC) and the Department of Neighborhood Empowerment, with guidance from the Los Angeles City Attorney, have established that BONC has the authority to adopt AB 361 Findings Pursuant to Government Code Section 54953(E)(1)(b)-(c) on behalf of the City's neighborhood councils, and to determine that due to the Covid-19 state of emergency, meeting in person would present imminent risks to the health or safety of attendees. This meeting is being conducted virtually pursuant to that directive.

AB 361 also defines more clearly how legislative bodies, including neighborhood councils, should prepare their agendas to provide for public access. Legislative bodies shall allow a reasonable amount of time per agenda item to allow public members the opportunity to provide public comment. If the agendas are "timed," then the legislative body shall not close the public comment period for the agenda item to provide public comment until that timed public comment period has elapsed. The Department of Neighborhood Empowerment has advised neighborhood councils to not provide timed agendas for this reason. For clarity, UNNC's adopted Standing Rules anticipate five minutes for presentations, and five minutes for questions and answers, on most items; after which a motion and limited debate may follow before the vote. However, any board member may make a motion to extend the amount of time for a presentation or alter the time limits for debate, and/or the Chair and the officers may present an agenda where some presentations are given additional time. In addition, agenda items may be tabled or handled earlier or later than the timing anticipated in the posted agenda. Based on the flexible nature of each of these elements, members of the public should <u>not attempt to time their arrival</u> to a UNNC meeting based on an estimate of when particular agenda item will be called.

## 1) Case No. CPC-2022-4648-CA, Council File No. 17-0447

-- Proposed Oil Drilling Ban (Ordinance): Review of City Planning's new draft oil drilling ordinance that would prohibit new oil and gas extraction, phase out existing extraction operations, and thereby protect the public from a range of risks associated with oil and gas extraction. Rather than just imposing setback requirements, this ordinance goes further, amending the Los Angeles Municipal Code to prohibit all new oil and gas drilling activities and make any existing extraction a nonconforming use in all zones of the City, with the end result of phasing out all oil and gas extraction activities in Los Angeles. In Los Angeles, there are 26 oil and gas fields and over 5,000 oil and gas wells—some active, others idle, and some abandoned. UNNC's footprint includes both active and former oil drilling sites. *The UNNC Planning and Zoning Committee does not recommend full approval of the draft ordinance at this time, and instead recommends the adoption of a letter prepared expressing UNNC's concerns regarding elimination of current community protections and too-short comment period (see letter in online agenda packet).* – **DISCUSSION AND ACTION**

The Garden School Foundation (GSF) and UNNC's Environmental Committee presented a composting workshop in May, 2022 at the GSF garden located at 24th Street Elementary School. California's new law, Senate Bill 1383, mandates that all households divert their food waste from landfills and recycle food waste and other organics into composting solutions. Many UNNC stakeholders are unfamiliar with the basics of composting, including how to sort items and make compost, as well as what to do with finished compost. To meet these challenges, in FY 2022-2023, GSF proposes four additional hands-on home composting workshops, two in the fall and two in the spring, each with different curriculum and learning opportunities, and requests that UNNC continue to take a partnership role, with \$500 funded for each workshop. **Request \$750.00. – DISCUSSION AND ACTION**

**Further AB 361 Updates**: Public comment cannot be required to be submitted in advance of the meeting, only real-time public comment is required. If there are any broadcasting interruptions that prevent the public from observing or hearing the meeting, the meeting must be recessed or adjourned. If members of the public are unable to provide public comment or be heard due to issues within the Neighborhood Council's control, the meeting must be recessed or adjourned.

#### **Telecommunication Relay Services**

Telephone communication is one of the most important forms of communication in society today. Due to advancements in technology, telephone devices have evolved with new services and capabilities. Individuals who are deaf and hard of hearing, and individuals with a speech disability are following these trends and are rapidly migrating to more advanced telecommunications methods, both for peer-to-peer and third-party telecommunications relay service (TRS) communications. Telecommunications Relay Service is a telephone service that allows persons with hearing or speech disabilities to place and receive telephone calls. TRS is available in all 50 states, the District of Columbia, Puerto Rico and the U.S. territories for local and/or long distance calls.





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TRS providers - generally telephone companies - are compensated for the costs of providing TRS from either a state or a federal fund. There is no cost to the TRS user. What forms of TRS are available? There are several forms of TRS, depending on the particular needs of the user and the equipment available: TRS includes: Text to Voice TIY-Based TRS; Speech-to-Speech Relay Service; Shared Non-English Language Relay Service; Captioned Telephone Relay Service; Internet Protocol Relay Service; and Video Relay Service. Don't hang up! Some people hang up on TRS calls because they think the CA is a telemarketer. If you hear, "Hello. This is the relay service ... " when you pick up the phone, please don't hang up! You are about to talk, through a TRS provider, to a person who is deaf, hard-of-hearing, or has a speech disability.

If you have limitations hearing or speaking a specially-trained Communications Assistant (CA) can relay telephone conversations for all of your calls. In California, dial 711to reach the California Relay Service (CRS). If you prefer having your calls immediately answered in your mode of communication, dial one of the toll-free modality- and language-specific numbers below. The call will be routed to the CRS provider.
