Determination to continue to hold meetings virtually: The Board of Neighborhood Commissioners (BONC) and the Department of Neighborhood Empowerment, with guidance from the Los Angeles City Attorney, have established that BONC has the authority to adopt AB 361 Findings Pursuant to Government Code Section 54953(E)(1)(b)-(c) on behalf of the City's neighborhood councils, and to determine that due to the Covid-19 state of emergency, meeting in person would present imminent risks to the health or safety of attendees. This meeting is being conducted virtually pursuant to that directive.

AB 361 also defines more clearly how legislative bodies, including neighborhood councils, should prepare their agendas to provide for public access. Legislative bodies shall allow a reasonable amount of time per agenda item to allow public members the opportunity to provide public comment. If the agendas are "timed," then the legislative body shall not close the public comment period for the agenda item to provide public comment until that timed public comment period has elapsed.

 - John Arnold (Chair) Laura Meyers (CoChair) 1) "Livable Communities Initiative," Council File 21-1230-S2, Proposed CIS: Proposed Community Impact Statement (CIS) regarding the "Livable Communities Initiative" (LCI) proposed for "transit-rich corridors" per Program 131 of the City's recently adopted Housing Element, which may authorize additional incentives and waivers to create multi-family housing. Incentives may include reductions in setbacks, floor area, and other development standards; elimination of parking requirements; minimum density requirements; increased affordability; and encouragement of smaller units to create higher density; with some exclusions for certain fire hazard zones, historic districts, and projects that propose demolition of existing affordable housing. It is unclear how this program will or will not enhance, complement, overlap, or expand other incentivizing programs such as TOC, state and local Density Bonus laws, or CPIO affordable housing provisions. (UNNC's draft/proposed CIS will be in the online agenda packet for the Dec. 1, 2022 Governing Board meeting.) -DISCUSSION AND ACTION
 - 2) Proposed Digital Kiosks on Washington Boulevard between Arlington and La Brea (IKE program): Approve draft letter of questions and concerns regarding "Digital Ad Kiosks" (or IKE, the "Interactive Kiosk Experience") proposed for Washington Boulevard and other locations throughout the City by the Mayor's Office and the City's Tourism Board. Kiosks will be owned and managed by the private media company IKE Smart City. Among the concerns, there has been no outreach to Neighborhood Councils to-date for a program that may have a significant effect (positive or negative) on one of UNNC's major boulevards.  - 3) CPC-2020-2115-DB 1848 S. Gramercy: Discussion and possible action of any new developments to the above project, which UNNC has commented on numerous times over the past several years. The case was continued by the City Planning Commission (CPC) in late October and will go before the Commission again in December. No known changes have been made to the project, though there may be changes (significant or not) currently being negotiated between the applicant and the Planning Department. Further AB 361 Updates: Public comment cannot be required to be submitted in advance of the meeting, only real-time public comment is required. If there are any broadcasting interruptions that prevent the public from observing or hearing the meeting, the meeting must be recessed or adjourned. If members of the public are unable to provide public comment or be heard due to issues within the Neighborhood Council's control, the meeting must be recessed or adjourned.

Comments from the public on agenda items will be heard only when the respective item is being considered. Comments from the public on other matters not appearing on the agenda that are within the Board's jurisdiction will be heard during the General Public Comment period. Please note that under the Brown

Act, the Board is prevented from acting on a matter that you bring to its attention during the General Public Comment period; however, the issue raised by a member of the public may become the subject of a future Board meeting. Public comment is limited to 1 minute per speaker, unless waived by the presiding officer of the Board.

Telecommunication Relay Services

Telephone communication is one of the most important forms of communication in society today. Due to advancements in technology, telephone devices have evolved with new services and capabilities. Individuals who are deaf and hard of hearing, and individuals with a speech disability are following these trends and are rapidly migrating to more advanced telecommunications methods, both for peer-to-peer and third-party telecommunications relay service (TRS) communications.

Telecommunications Relay Service is a telephone service that allows persons with hearing or speech disabilities to place and receive telephone calls. TRS is available in all 50 states, the District of Columbia, Puerto Rico and the U.S. territories for local and/or long distance calls. TRS providers - generally telephone companies - are compensated for the costs of providing TRS from either a state or a federal fund. There is no cost to the TRS user. What forms of TRS are available? There are several forms of TRS, depending on the particular needs of the user and the equipment available: TRS includes: Text to Voice TIY-Based TRS; Speech-to-Speech Relay Service; Shared Non-English Language Relay Service; Captioned Telephone Relay Service; Internet Protocol Relay Service; and Video Relay Service.

Don't hang up! Some people hang up on TRS calls because they think the CA is a telemarketer. If you hear, "Hello. This is the relay service ... " when you pick up the phone, please don't hang up! You are about to talk, through a TRS provider, to a person who is deaf, hard-of-hearing, or has a speech disability.

Telecommunications Relay Service is a telephone service that allows persons with hearing or speech disabilities to place and receive telephone calls. If you have limitations hearing or speaking a specially-trained Communications Assistant (CA) can relay telephone conversations for all of your calls. In California, dial 711to reach the California Relay Service (CRS). If you prefer having your calls immediately answered in your mode of communication, dial one of the toll-free modality- and language-specific numbers below. The call will be routed to the CRS provider.

No part of the conversation that takes place between callers is revealed or recorded in written, verbal, or any other form. CRS CAs do not participate in the conversation and acquire no benefit from information relayed.
